A. Beste Magister-verhandeling

B. Agrekonprys

Die Agrekonprys vir die beste artikel in Agrekon is toegeken aan Mnr H.D. van Schalkwyk en Prof J.A. Groenewald vir hul artikel getiteld "Regional analysis of South African agricultural resource use and productivity" wat in Agrekon, Vol 31(3), verskyn het.

C. Opstelkompetisie

D. Beste gepubliseerde artikel (in 'n reeks van landbou-ekonomiese tydskrifte)

Prof Jerry Eckert en Mev L. Kritzinger-Van Niekerk deel die prys van R1 000 (geskenk deur Standard Bank) vir hul artikel "The horns of a dilemma: Economic discipline and economic development in South Africa", gepubliseer in "Development Southern Africa", Vol 10, No 1 Februarie 1993.

E. Beste gekeurde referaat

Die weners van die prys ('n goue horlosie geskenk deur Volkskas Bank) vir die beste gekeurde referaat gelewer by die konferensie is: Prof B Bester en Mnr S. Kelemebe vir hul referaat getiteld "An assessment of peasant farmers' attitude to risk".

The following prizes were awarded at the annual AEASA conference in September 1993.

A. Best Masters Thesis award

Erica Goedecke of the University of Natal is the recipient of this award (a Kruger Rand sponsored by ABSA Bank) for her thesis "An economic analysis of the effects of changing agricultural labour legislation in South Africa"

B. Agrekon prize

The Agrekon prize for the best article published in Agrekon was awarded to Mr H.D. van Schalkwyk and Prof J.A. Groenewald for their article "Regional analysis of South African agricultural resource use and productivity" published in Agrekon Vol 31 no.3.

C. Essay competition

Mr A.J. Uys of the University of Stellenbosch is the winner of AEASA's first essay competition. His winning essay "Evaluering van 'n voergraanbedryf in die Wes-Kaap" (An evaluation of a feed grain industry in the Western Cape) was published in Agrekon Vol 32 no. 4.

D. Best published article (in a range of agricultural economics journals)

Prof Jerry Eckert and Mrs L. Kritzinger-Van Niekerk shared the prize of R1 000 (sponsored by Standard Bank) for their article "The horns of a dilemma: Economic discipline and economic development in South Africa", published in "Development Southern Africa", Vol 10, No. 1 February 1993.

E. Best contributed paper

The prize for the best contributed paper at the conference (a golden watch sponsored by Volkskas Bank) was awarded to: Prof B. Bester and Mr S. Kelemebe for their paper "An assessment of peasant farmers' attitude to risk".

AGREKON: GUIDE TO AUTHORS

Manuscripts

1. Manuscripts should be written in English or Afrikaans.
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4. Manuscripts in general should be organized in the following order:
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 - Affiliation(s)
 - Present address(es) of author(s)
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 - Abstracts
 - Introduction
 - Material studied, area description, methods, techniques
 - Results
 - Discussion
 - Conclusion
 - Acknowledgments
 - References
 - Summary (if article is in Afrikaans)
 - Tables
 - Figure captions
5. When typing the manuscript, titles and subtitles should not be run within the text. They should be typed on a separate line in lower case, numbered numerically.
6. Upon final acceptance a computer diskette, (double sided, double density) containing the final text, including all corrections and relevant software programme names, should be submitted (WordPerfect 5.1 is preferred, but is not compulsory).
7. Agrekon reserves the privilege of returning to the author for revision accepted manuscripts and illustrations which are not in the proper form given in this guide.

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1. The abstract should be clear, descriptive and not longer than 250 words.
2. At the beginning of each abstract provide the complete bibliographic entry by which the paper will be referenced.
3. Abstracts should be in both Afrikaans and English, regardless of the language in which the contributions is written.

Summary

1. All papers written in Afrikaans should include an English summary directly after the references drawn in the paper.
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3. The summary should be clear, descriptive and not longer than 600 words.

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3. Tables should be numbered according to their sequence in the text. The text should include references to all tables.
4. Each table should be typewritten on a separate page of the manuscript. Tables should never be included in the text.
5. Each table should have a brief and self-explanatory title.

b. For edited symposia, special issues, etc., published in a periodical

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6. Equations should be numbered serially at the right-hand side in parentheses. In general only equations explicitly referred to the text need be numbered.

7. The use of fractional powers instead of root signs is recommended. Also powers of e are often more conveniently denoted by \exp .

- ▶ Notes should also be presented at the end of the text before the references.

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
