Gentlemen and Mrs. Klinger:

I am pleased to submit the 1982 Agricultural Crop Report, my first as Agricultural Commissioner, in accordance with Section 2279 of the California Agricultural Code. The gross agricultural value for Merced County crops in 1982 is \$743,030,000 which is \$21,847,000 less or just under a 3% drop from the adjusted 1981 value of \$764,877,000. It has been a difficult year for the agricultural producers in Merced County. Crop losses due to weather related problems throughout the year, combined with depressed prices of most commodities, led to a consecutive second year decline in the value of crops produced here.

Milk production, as usual, is the leading contributor of income at \$194,296,000, followed by poultry at \$79,439,000 and cattle at \$65,284,000. These three commodities represent 45% of the total agricultural value even though fryers and broilers were down \$8 million and cattle over \$6 million due mainly to lower prices. Cotton changed places with alfalfa as the result of a \$9 million decline caused by 10,000 less acres and lower production and price. Other crops showing significant drops in value were cantaloupes at \$6 million, chicken eggs at \$5.5 million, wine grapes at \$4.8 million, cling peaches at \$4.3 million and raisins at \$1.9 million, a crop that was all but lost due to harvest time rains.

On the bright side was alfalfa, fourth in value at \$46,455,000, up \$12 million due to increased acreage, production and price. Fresh market tomatoes were up only slightly even though 1,000 acres more were planted, however, canning tomatoes made a \$3 million gain with an average production over 30 tons per acre and a higher price. Other commodities showing good gains were swine and lima beans up over \$2 million each, apricots and freestone peaches up \$1.2 million each and honeybee products up almost \$1 million.

We have attempted, for the first time, to include Government Payments in the total value of those commodities involved in the various governmental programs.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of my staff who have diligently collected information for this report, especially, Richard Carlson, Agricultural Biologist and Standards Inspector, who was in charge of compiling all of this data. I would also like to thank those individuals, companies, and governmental agencies who gave their time in providing the information needed to make this report possible.

Gentlemen and Mrs. Klinger:

I am pleased to present the 1983 Agricultural Crop Report which is the culmination of the numerous efforts of the agricultural community in Merced County.

The total gross agricultural value for commodities produced in 1983 is \$721,750,000 which is \$21,280,000 less than the 1982 value. This is the third year in a row that gross income has dropped. The main factors for this decline are the weather, which caused interruptions and crop yield reductions throughout the year, lower prices for several commodities, and the government payment-in-kind (PIK) program which idled over 50,000 acres in the County.

I must emphasize that these figures are gross returns to the producer and do not indicate actual net profit.

Milk, by far the leading commodity, was worth \$196,622,000. Poultry was a very bright spot bringing in \$105,175,000 with fryers and broilers up \$7,564,000 and turkeys up \$2,446,000 due to slightly better prices and higher production. Cattle and calves, valued at \$59,775,000, dropped \$5,509,000 as a result of lower prices and number of animals produced.

Cotton changed places with sweet potatoes declining \$12,535,000 as the result of PIK, lower production, and reduction in acreage by 16,500 acres. Other crops showing significant drops in value were walnuts at \$7,130,000 due to price, almonds at \$7,020,000 due to production being down 40%, wheat \$4,046,000 due to a 38% reduction in acreage, cantaloupes \$2,905,000 and rice \$2,718,000 which were both due to lower acreage and price, freestone peaches \$2,417,000 due to reduction in acreage and production, and clingstone peaches \$2,206,000 due to lower production and value.

Chicken eggs rebounded this year, up \$4,624,000 as a result of higher production and year end prices. Sweet potatoes, sixth in value at \$26,405,000 were up \$4,297,000 due to higher production but price was down slightly. Alfalfa gained \$4,031,000 due to higher prices and raisins, all but lost in 1982, were up \$942,000.

Government payments, included last year in the total value of those commodities affected, have been discontinued. However, a table reflecting such information has been retained in this report.

I wish to express my appreciation to my staff, who have diligently collected information for this report, and, particularly, to Richard Carlson, Agricultural Biologist and Standards Inspector, who was responsible for compiling all of this data. I also want to thank the various individuals, companies, and governmental agencies who gave their time providing information needed to make this report possible.

I am very pleased to submit the 1984 Agricultural Crop Report in accordance with Section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code.

After three consecutive years of decline, Merced County's gross agricultural value has shown a significant gain, reaching an all time high of \$840,027,000. This is \$118,277,000 more in value than the 1983 year and surpasses the previous high in 1980 by \$45,930,000. The higher value has been primarily the result of increased acreages and production and not necessarily increased commodity values. The main factors for this increase were the elimination of the government payment-in-kind (PIK) program which idled over 50,000 acres in the County and the extremely good growing conditions which prevailed throughout most of the year. The high summer temperatures did have a detrimental effect on some crops but helped others.

It must be emphasized that values shown do not reflect net income to producers but gross returns with no consideration given for the cost of production.

Marketing of milk continues to rank Number 1 in gross receipts among all commodities in the County at \$208,157,000. Poultry increased again bringing in \$112,090,000 with fryers and broilers up \$4,189,000 and turkeys up \$2,820,000 due to improved prices even though production was down for fryers. Cattle and calves valued at \$67,703,000 increased \$7,928,000 as a result of higher prices and number of animals marketed.

Even though the price was down, the largest single increase in total income was from almonds which produced \$42,656,000 more in value due to the record breaking crop and increased bearing acreage. Other crops showing significant gains in value were market tomatoes at \$18,520,000 due to increased production and price, cantaloupes at \$14,203,000 due to a $41\frac{1}{2}\%$ acreage increase and better price, clingstone peaches at \$12,521,000 as the result of higher production and value but less acreage, and corn grain at \$7,884,000 even with reduced price but a 152% acreage increase.

Cotton rebounded this year despite a lesser price, up \$23,797,000 as PIK was eliminated thus adding 30,600 acres along with higher production. Alfalfa slipped from fourth to sixth in value at \$41,487,000, down \$8,999,000 as a result of lower acreage and price. Even with a higher price, sweet potatoes dropped to eighth at \$22,803,000 due to decreased acreage and production. Sugar beets showed a \$3,577,000 decline because of fewer acres, lower production and value.

I would like to thank the various individuals, companies and governmental agencies who gave their time in providing the information needed to make this report possible. I also wish to recognize my staff, who have diligently collected information for this report, particularly, Richard Carlson, Agricultural Biologist and Standards Inspector, who was responsible for compilation of the data.


