

John W. Mellor

John W. Mellor is Director of the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI). Previously, he was Chief Economist at the United States Agency for International Development, and before that, Professor of Economics, Agricultural Economics and Asian Studies at Cornell University. Mellor, a U.S. citizen, was born in Paris, France. He obtained Ph. D., M.S.C., and B.Sc. degrees from Cornell University and a diploma with distinction while a Fulbright Scholar at Oxford University. In 1985, Mellor was the first social scientist to receive the Wihuri Foundation's International Prize "in recognition of his constructive work which has remarkably promoted and developed the securing of nutrient supply for mankind."

Timothy C. Mackey

Timothy C. Mackey is currently the Agricultural Counsellor at the Embassy of Australia, Washington, DC. Mackey earned an undergraduate degree in economics and is a graduate of the Australian National University Law School. For five years prior to his posting to Washington, he worked in the Australian Federal Agriculture Department on agricultural policy matters. He was Branch head in the areas responsible for grains and for policy development. For three years he was the Chairman of the Australian Wheat and Barley Research Council. He worked earlier for several years as Staff Director to various Australian Senate Committees.

William P. Browne

William P. Browne is Professor of Political Science and Director of Public Administration Programs at Central Michigan University. His primary research interest for the past decade has been the agricultural policy process. Browne has authored several articles focused on interest group behavior. His latest book "Private Interests, Public Policy, and American Agriculture," (Kansas, 1988), was completed while serving as a visiting scholar at USDA's Economic Research Service and as a grant recipient of the National Center for Food and Agriculture Policy. His doctorate is from Washington University (St. Louis).

Larry J. Connor

Larry J. Connor is Professor of Agricultural Economics and Assistant for Planning for the Michigan State University Agricultural Experiment Station. He holds a Ph. D. in agricultural economics from Oklahoma State University and went to Michigan State University in 1966. For nine of the 23 years he has been at Michigan State University, Connor was Chairperson of the Department of Agricultural Economics. His administrative, research, and teaching responsibilities at Michigan State University provide him a unique perspective of the needs for change in university undergraduate programs.

David Blandford

David Blandford, a Professor in the Department of Agricultural Economics at Cornell University, chairs the International Agricultural Trade Research Consortium. This Consortium is a group of more than 90 trade research professionals from North America and 9 overseas countries. The Consortium recently sponsored a conference on the GATT negotiations called "Bringing Agriculture into the GATT." The article in this issue which he co-authored with Harry de Gorter, Bruce Gardner, and David Harvey is one product of the conference. Participation in this Consortium activity has provided the authors a unique opportunity to observe the progress of the GATT negotiations and to reflect upon ways to break the current impasse on agricultural trade in the Uruguay Round.
