... About the authors



Karen Brooks is Assistant Professor of Agricultural and Applied Economics at the University of Minnesota. Her undergraduate education was at Stanford University and her Ph.D. in economics was granted by the University of Chicago in 1982. Travels in the Soviet Union over the past fifteen years, and frequent and continual contact with Soviet colleagues have made it possible for Brooks to understand the historical setting for recent Soviet policy changes. She spent August 1989 in Vilnius, Lithuania working on agricultural pricing under an agreement between the Lithuanian Research Institute for Agricultural Economics and The Center for Agricultural and Rural Development of Iowa State University.



James Duncan Shaffer is Professor of Agricultural Economics at Michigan State University where he started teaching economics in 1947. His proposal for a significant change in the organization of agricultural commodity markets and related farm policy follows years of research, extension, consulting and participation in public affairs focused on agricultural markets organization and performance and related public policy in the United States and many other countries.



Luther C. McKinney is Senior Vice President of The Quaker Oats Company. He is also chairman of the Public Affairs Council of the National Food Processors Association. In that capacity, he has been actively involved in food safety and labeling issues. McKinney has a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics from Iowa State University and received his law degree in 1959 from the University of Illinois. In addition to his corporate and industry responsibilities, McKinney farms approximately 1,500 acres in McHenry County, Illinois, producing primarily corn, as well as soybeans, wheat, and oats. He also has a sizeable cattle feeding operation.



Sandra Archibald is a production and resource economist with a Ph.D. from the University of California, Davis. Her research focuses on the interaction of agricultural technology, natural resource use, and regulatory policy. Consulting on pesticide policies with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the National Research Council, and numerous California Department of Food and Agriculture agencies on issues of pesticide policy has provided Archibald with unique opportunities to understand the dynamics of the perceptions that influence food safety policy in the United States. She joined the Food Research Institute in 1983.
