The Mexican Economy: Twentieth-Century Structure and Growth

Clark W. Reynolds

During the past half-century, Mexico was torn apart by revolution and reconstructed through political and social reform. The entire structure of the economy was changed, partly through direct economic forces and partly through political and social events which were themselves influenced by economic factors. In this pioneering attempt to deal with economic development as social history, Clark Reynolds analyzes the interaction of all these factors and provides as well a vast quantity of basic information on the economic performance of Mexico during this century, including economic history, income distribution, international trade, public finance, and detailed analysis of the development of both agriculture and manufacturing. Mr. Reynolds uses statistics obtained from official and semi-official sources during two years of research and 20,000 miles of travel in Mexico and constructs numerous new statistical indicators of both regional and national economic change. His study will be a basic source book on Mexican economic development and a key case study of a developing country, particularly because of its special treatment of the role of revolution and agrarian reform.
