CHARLES E. KELLOGG, world authority in the field of soil classification and geography, has studied soil problems and made recommendations to governments for soil research and land development in England, France, Italy, Greece, Yugoslavia, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Germany, Russia, Siberia, North Africa, the Belgian Congo, Egypt, Iran, Canada, Mexico, Australia, and New Zealand. The author of numerous bulletins and papers on the origin, classification, and conservation of soil, Dr. Kellogg's recent contribution to the UNESCO-FAO Food and People Series, Food, Soil, and People, attracted world-wide attention. He is Chief of the Soil Survey Division in the Agricultural Research Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. His most recent book, Our Garden Soils, was published by Macmillan last April.

L. JAY ATKINSON, formerly in the Division of Farm Management and Costs, BAE, is an economist in the Office of Business Economics of the Department of Commerce. He has worked both in agricultural economics and in the industrial

and general economics field.
