JOHN C. FREY is Assistant Professor of Land Economics at Pennsylvania State College. He formerly worked jointly with the Division of Land Economics and Iowa State College in studying obstacles to conservation farming.

BUIS T. INMAN, Assistant Head of the Division of Land Economics, has represented BAE in cooperative work with the Bureau of the Census in the analysis of tenure and land use data and work with the Iowa State College in studies of obstacles to conservation farming.

SCOTT A. WALKER is Assistant Agricultural Economist in the Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station. He was formerly a cooperative agent of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

HILTON E. ROBISON, Chief of the Section on Farm Economics and Financial Statistics, Agricultural Division, Bureau of the Census, is in charge of the work on classification of farms by tenure.
