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

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

U.S. Agricultural Exports Decline in 1967 From 1966 Level (see page 6). U.S. agricultural exports totaled \$6,386 million in 1967, 7 percent below the record \$6,881 million in 1966, but 13 percent above the 1961-65 average. The export value of grains and preparations, animals and animal products, and fruits and vegetables fell below the 1966 level, but oilseeds and products, cotton, and tobacco increased. Sluggish economic activity in some of the principal commercial countries contributed to the lower demand for U.S. agricultural products. Also, limited production in the United States and rising production in some foreign countries significantly affected the volume of farm product exports.

U.S. Agricultural Imports in 1967 (see page 16). U.S. agricultural imports in 1967 slowed to \$4,455 million, compared with \$4,491 million in the previous year. Lower values for most complementary (noncompetitive) products accounted for the slight decline, as purchases fell to \$1,756 million from \$1,864 million in 1966. Imports of supplementary agricultural products were fractionally higher at \$2,699 million, as against \$2,627 million a year earlier. Among supplementary commodities, increases occurred in imports of meats, fruits, vegetables, grains and preparations, cotton, sugar, molasses, tobacco, and wines; offsetting reductions took place for animal products other than meat.

Commercial and Government Program Export Highlights (see page 25). U.S. exports of farm products declined 12 percent to \$1,432.8 million in July-September 1967 from \$1,625.0 million a year earlier. Sharp drops in dollar exports of feed grains and wheat and flour and smaller declines in all other major commodity groups, except oil-seeds and products and rice, accounted for the 17-percent decrease in commercial exports to \$1,075.4 million from \$1,302.3 million. An increase of over three-fifths in shipments under the barter program, partially offset by a decline of 15 percent in shipments under the sales for foreign currency program, accounted for the 11-percent rise in exports under Government-financed programs to \$357.4 million from \$322.7 million in the first quarter of the 1966/67 fiscal year.

U.S. Agricultural Exports: July-December 1967 (see page 32). U.S. agricultural exports in the first half of fiscal year 1967/68 totaled \$3,196 million, II percent below those of the same period in 1966/67. Exports of cotton were estimated to be down 30 percent; tobacco, down 15 percent; and fruits and vegetables, down 7 percent. Agricultural exports for December were \$564 million, II percent below those of December 1966. A rather sharp increase in November and December in corn exports boosted this year's accumulated total value to within 3 percent of the level of corn exports for July-December 1966. However, the volume of corn exports was 5 percent larger than the same months in 1966. Rice exports were up 9 percent.

U.S. exports of farm products to the European Economic Community (EEC) totaled \$629 million in July-November 1967, 10 percent below the total for July-November 1966. Exports of variable-levy commodities in July-November 1967 were 6 percent below the \$279 million in the same months of 1966. Exports of non-variable-levy commodities totaled \$367 million in July-November 1967, down 12 percent from \$418 million in the same period of 1966.

U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS DECLINE IN 1967 FROM 1966 LEVEL

U.S. exports of farm products in 1967 fell 7 percent short of the 1966 record level of \$6,881 million. However, the 1967 total of \$6,386 million was 3 percent above the 1965 total, and 13 percent above the 1961-65 average, maintaining the upward trend of recent years (table 2). The value of most commodity groups exported was lower in 1967 than in 1966. Exports of grains and preparations, animals and animal products, and fruits and vegetables fell below the 1966 level. Oilseeds and products, cotton, and tobacco increased. Rice exports rose to a record high level due partly to increased shipments to South Vietnam.

Several events occurred during 1967 that both directly and indirectly affected the level of U.S. agricultural exports. In late spring, the war between Israel and several of the Arab nations sharply reduced agricultural exports to some Arab nations. The Kennedy Round negotiations were conducted in 1967, with concessions by the United States and other subscribing countries under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). Although these agreements did not become effective in 1967, it was the year when the ground work was completed for considerable expansion of trade. The devaluation of the British pound in November 1967 and subsequent devaluation of currencies by several of Britain's trading partners, territories, and dependencies immediately affected U.S. trade. However, devaluation occurred so late in 1967 that any effects on total U.S. agricultural trade for the calendar year would have been slight.

Economic activity has strengthened in several of the principal industrial countries of Western Europe and ir Canada and Japan. Industrial production in the United Kingdom rose slightly during the first half of 1967 and, coupled with a slowdown in the unemployment rate and improved investment plans, the U.K. economy showed signs of an upturn. Although quarterly economic trends in the EEC have indicated only moderate growth, the sluggishness has not been common to all the EEC countries. Italy's economic growth in 1967 continued to improve, largely in the industrial sector. On the other hand, the Gross National Product of West Germany declined slightly in 1967, primarily from a drop in investment. In Belgium, also, economic conditions were sluggish, and growth in GNP has been estimated to be less than 2 percent in 1967 from 1966. The Japanese economy has continued to boom, with forecasts for late 1967 being adjusted upward.

The varying degrees of economic activity in the industrial countries has been reflected in U.S. agricultural exports. In addition, limited production of grain in the United

States, and rising production in several foreign countries, tended to adversely affect U.S. agricultural exports in 1967, resulting in the slight drop from the record high level in 1966.

Animals and animal products: Exports of animals and animal products totaled about \$676 million, down 7 percent from the \$725 million in 1966 (table 3). Practically all categories of animal products declined from 1966. Animal fats, oils, and greases were down moderately (6 percent) from 1966. This decline resulted principally from the smaller value of tallow exports, although the value of lard exports also was down slightly. Increased hog numbers in West European countries, and the corresponding increase in competition in West European markets, resulted in lower prices and contributed to the lower value of lard and tallow exports, although quantity was up 13 percent.

The export value of meats and meat products dropped slightly to \$112 million in 1966 from \$116 million in 1965. Although quantity was slightly higher, value declined due to somewhat lower prices. The volume of hides and skins in 1967 remained about the same as in 1966 but, due to a substantial price decline, the total value copped 17 percent to \$128 million in 1967 from \$155 million in 1966. Increased competition from Argentina, and some increase in the use of synthetic leathers, contributed to the decline. Dairy and poul ry product exports in 1967 totaled \$180 million in 1967, 7 percent below the \$193 million in 1966.

Cotton: Cotton exports in 1967 totaled 4 million bales, about 10 percent more than in 1966. Value for 1967 reached \$464 million, compared with \$432 million in 1966. U.S. cotton exports in the first half of 1967 were sharply higher than those of the last half. The high demand in foreign Free World countries, and the need to rebuild depleted stocks, prompted the high exports, especially in the first and second quarters. The slackening of exports that occurred in the third and fourth quarters resulted from the depletion of U.S. stocks of long-staple cotton. Cotton shipped during July-December was generally short-staple cotton that brought a lower price. During January-June, the average price per exported bale was about \$119, compared with \$113 for the last half of 1967.

Fruits and vegetables: U.S. exports of fruits and preparations totaled \$310 million in 1967, 2 percent less than in 1966. Several factors played a part in the slight reduction that took place in 1967. Third-quarter exports (July-September) were down \$10 million from the corresponding quarter in 1966 due to sharply reduced shipments of canned fruits. Exports of canned fruit cocktail, peaches, and pineapples were down 52 percent from July-September 1966, falling to \$11.5 million. Reduced supplies carried over from the 1966 packing year, and higher prices for most canned fruits accounted for much of the reduction in exports. In addition, increases in production of noncitrus and citrus fruits in foreign countries added to the competition faced by U.S. fruits in principal commercial markets.

Exports of vegetables and preparations declined 7 percent in 1967 from the 1966 total of \$176 million. The value of vegetable exports was lower in each of the quarters in 1967, compared with the corresponding quarters in 1966. Reduced exports of canned vegetables accounted for most of the decline in vegetables and preparations. Exports of canned asparagus, the principal canned export product, droppped 41 percent during the first three quarters of 1967 from the same period in 1966. Although exports of fresh vegetables and dried beans and peas have been higher in 1967, the rise has not been sufficient to offset the decline in canned vegetables.

Grains and preparations: Exports of grains and preparations in 1967 declined to a total of \$2.7 billion, 16 percent below 1966. Feed grain exports were below 1966 levels during the first three quarters of 1967, but increased substantially in the fourth

quarter. Supplies of the principal feed grains -- corn and grain sorghums -- dropped off sharply from 1966. This decline resulted from reduced production in the 1966/67 crop year. In addition, corn production was higher in foreign corn producing countries such as Argentina and South Africa, and in Western and Eastern Europe. Because of short supplies and higher domestic prices, U.S. corn was less competitive in the major feed grain markets. Feed grain exports to the EEC in January-November 1967 were 28 percent below the \$446 million in 1966.

Wheat exports (including flour equivalent) were 22 percent lower, dropping \$330 million to \$1,205 million in 1967. Wheat production in the 1966/67 crop year was down from preceding years, resulting in reduced supplies available for export. The larger wheat crops in Australia were competitive with U.S. wheat sales in commercial markets such as Japan. In addition, food-aid shipments to India were lower. However, larger grain sorghum shipments were made to offset the reduction in wheat shipments. In the fourth quarter, wheat and feed grain exports improved substantially with the harvest of the current crops that added substantially to supplies.

Rice exports in 1967 were up sharply, rising 40 percent or \$91 million higher than the \$230 million in 1966. Much of the increase in rice exports occurred from greatly expanded shipments to South Vietnam. Vietnam's share of rice exports (for January-November) increased from 24 percent of U.S. rice exports in 1966 to 33 percent in 1967 Rice exports in January-November to the Republic of Korea, Indonesia, and Hong Kong also increased, while receipts of U.S. rice by the United Kingdom, Saudi Arabia, and West Germany declined.

Oilseeds and products: Oilseeds and products brightened the export picture in 1967, with exports totaling more than \$1,238 million, I percent above 1966. Exports were higher in the first three quarters of 1967 than in the corresponding quarters of 1966, but lower in the fourth quarter. Soybeans, which account for the major share of the oilseed and product exports, were up slightly for the year, rising I percent to \$765 million. The value of soybean exports was at a higher level in 1967 than 1966 during the first three quarters, but lower during the fourth quarter. The value was lower in the fourth quarter of 1967, despite a larger quantity because prices were lower. The average per bushel export value during the fourth quarter of 1967 was \$2.79, down 10 percent from the average of \$3.10 in 1966's fourth quarter.

Cottonseed and soybean oil exports in 1967 reached a total of \$153 million, the same as in 1966. However, cottonseed oil declined 57 percent in 1967 from 1966. Reduced production of cotton in recent years and the corresponding reduction in cottonseed available for crushing has sharply reduced the supply of cottonseed oil. The total supply for the year ending July 1967 was down a third from the previous period, and the current supply is forecast still lower. However, larger shipments of soybean oil nearly made up for the decline in cottonseed oil exports. Prompted by lower prices in the last quarter of 1967, the quantity of soybean oil exports increased substantially. While total value was up 3 percent in the fourth quarter of 1967 from 1966, quantity increased 28 percent to 269 million pounds from 211 million pounds.

Protein meal exports were valued at \$248 million in 1967, 10 percent above 1966. Demand was strong, particularly in Western Europe. The sharp rise in December brought the fourth quarter total to above that of fourth quarter 1966. This rise was due to the drop in protein meal export prices, which declined from an August average of \$89.50 a ton to \$83.70 in December 1967. This reduced price reflects the lower price for soybeans during fourth-quarter 1967. Soybean meal accounts for the largest part of the protein meal exports.

Tobacco: Tobacco exports in 1967 totaled 572 million pounds and were valued at \$499 million, 4 percent higher than in 1966. During the first half of 1967, tobacco

exports totaled \$21½ million, 47 percent higher than in the first half of 1966. However, during the second half of 1967 the value of tobacco exports totaled \$285 million, 15 percent lower than the corresponding period in 1966. The improved quality of recent flue-cured crops, the United Nations sanctions against Rhodesian tobacco exports, and the export payment program contributed to the high level of exports in 1967.

U.S. AGRICULTURAL IMPORTS IN 1967

by Thomas A. Warden 1/

U.S. imports of agricultural products in 1967 totaled \$4,455 million, slightly below the \$4,491 million recorded during 1966. Imports of complementary agricultural products accounted for the decline, as purchases of these noncompetitive goods fell to \$1,756 million from \$1,864 million in the previous year. Supplementary agricultural imports which are competitive or partially competitive with domestic products rose slightly to \$2,699 million from \$2,627 million a year earlier (table 5).

Following a long-term trend, imports of supplementary products accounted for an increasingly large share of U.S. agricultural purchases abroad. Supplementary products rose to 60 percent of the value of total agricultural imports in 1967, compared with 58 percent in the preceding year. Two major factors have contributed to this trend: the large volume of animal products consumed in the United States and increased use of synthetic materials. For example, synthetic products have displaced natural rubber and carpet wool in many manuf lured items.

U.S. imports of nonagricultural products continued to increase in 1967 as they have for several years. Nonagricultural imports rose nearly 7 percent to \$22,288 million from \$20,869 million in 196t; expanded purchases of machinery, road vehicles, and other manufactured goods contributed substantially to the increase.

Supplementary Imports

U.S. imports of supplementary agricultural products in 1967 were 3 percent above the preceding year's value. Gains were recorded in the following commodity groups: meat, grain products, fruits, vegetables, sugar and related products, cotton, tobacco, and wines. Reductions occurred chiefly in animal products other than meat.

Animals and animal products.—Overall imports of animals and animal products declined slightly in value to \$1,081 million from \$1,160 million in 1966 (table 6). A sharp increase in meat imports offset substantial declines in most other categories, including cattle, dairy products, bides and skins, and apparel wools. An advance in meat imports reflected the generally short domestic supply position for certain types of beef. Beef and veal imports rose to 979 million pounds from 893 million pounds in 1966. Boneless fresh beef accounted for more than 80 percent of the beef imports. Pork imports increased to 307 million pounds from 298 million pounds in the previous year. Most of

the increase in pork imports resulted from higher purchases of canned hams and shoulders. Fresh mutton and lamb shipments were slightly below those of a year earlier. The quantity of meat imports covered by Public Law 88-482 was 895 million pounds, 10 million pounds below the 1967 base quota of 905 million pounds and 100 million pounds below the amount required to "trigger" quotas. The law covers imports of fresh, chilled, or frozen cattle meat, and meat of goats and sheep, other than lamb.

Dutiable cattle imports, mostly those weighing between 200 and 700 pounds, fell to 740,000 head (\$59 million) from 1,081,000 head (\$97 million) a year ago.

Imports of dairy products declined for the first time since 1964. The value of these purchases totaled \$115 million, compared with \$118 million in 1966. Most cheese imports continued their general upward trend except colby types, which fell due to imposition of quota controls in July. Imports of butterfat/sugar mixtures dropped off to \$21 million from the previous year's high of \$24 million. Shipments of butterfat/sugar mixtures reached their maximum in the first half of calendar year 1967 in anticipation of U.S. quota controls. The other major dairy product import, casein, fell to \$25 million from nearly \$29 million in 1966.

Hides and skins.--U.S. imports of hides and skins fell sharply to \$54 million in 1967 from a 7-year high of \$83 million a year ago, mainly due to a reduction in purchases of sheep and goat skins. These 2 types account for three-fourths or more of U.S. hide and skin imports. Cattle hides, calf skins, kip skins, cabretta skins, wild pig skins, horse hides, buffalo hides, deer skins, and kangaroo skins, in order of 1967 values, make up the remainder.

Apparel wools.--Apparel wool imports were down nearly 35 percent in value from the previous year. Purchases amounted to \$102 million compared with \$157 million in 1966. The reduction occurred mainly in fine wools, 58's or finer. Lower prices contributed considerably to the lower value of imports.

Other animals and animal products. -- The value of other animal products was down slightly from 1966. Lower values for crude bristles, horse hair, ground bones, and egg products more than offset higher values for imports of horses, edible gelatin, crude feathers and downs, honey, and beeswax.

Cotton.--Imports of raw cotton increased to nearly 168,000 bales in 1967 from 100,000 bales in 1966. The major types consisted of long-staple and Asiatic (a short-staple cotton). The long-staple type enters the United States mainly in August and September, due to a 95,000 bale quota control based on an August 1-July 31 year. Imports of cotton linters were just under 179,000 bales in 1967, compared with 212,000 bales in 1966; the value fell to \$5.8 million from \$6.0 million.

Fruits and preparations. -- U.S. imports of fruits rose again in 1967 to \$138 million from \$130 million the year before. Advances for olives, melons, apples, and canned pineapples accounted for most of the increase.

Grains and preparations. -- The total value of grains and their products moved up to \$45 million in 1967 from \$42 million a year earlier. This increase took place largely as a result of larger imports of bake y products, barley, and oats.

Oilseeds, oilnuts, and products. -- Overall U.S. imports of oilbearing materials and their products had a value of \$191 million, the same level as 1966. Purchases of copra were somewhat higher than the year before, totaling 610 million pounds (\$46 million), compared with 536 million pounds (\$42 million) in 1966; coconut oil imports were 525 million pounds (\$58 million), compared with 510 million pounds (\$60 million) a year earlier. Olive oil imports increased to \$18 million from \$15 million in 1966. Cocoa butter imports also rose to \$12 million from \$9 million during the same time period.

Sugar and related products.--The value of U.S. sugar imports in 1967 was considerably above the 1966 period. Volume climbed to 4.7 million short tons, from 4.2 million tons, and value increased by 17 percent to \$587 million from \$502 million, as a result of higher sugar prices. Molasses imports were also up sharply from 1966. Inedible molasses purchases totaled 351 million gallons (\$43 million), compared with 314 million (\$31 million) the year before. Maple sirup imports rose to \$4 million from \$3 million, while maple sugar imports fell by \$800,000 to \$2 million.

Tobacco. -- Unmanufactured tobacco imports rose to 197 million pounds (\$129 million) from 179 million pounds (\$127 million) in 1966. Oriental leaf for blending accounted for about three-fourths of U.S. tobacco imports.

<u>Vegetables and preparations</u>.--Imports of all types of vegetables and preparations climbed to \$167 million in 1967 from \$145 million a year earlier. Substantial increases occurred for fresh cucumbers, canned tomato products (especially paste and sauce), and canned mushrooms.

Wines and malt beverages.--The value of U.S. wine imports in 1967 was nearly \$87 million, more than 13 percent higher than a year earlier, and nearly double the 1961 total. Malt beverage imports leveled off at \$23 million, the same as in 1966 and 44 percent higher than the 1961 level.

Miscellaneous vegetable products.--Among the products included in this group, increases were recorded between 1966 and 1967 for hops, broomcorn, spices, and lemon oil. Purchases of feeds and fodders and nursery stock held steady, and declines took place for field and garden seeds, and jute.

Complementary Imports

The value of most complementary commodities in 1967 fell from year-earlier levels, leading to a decline of 6 percent in noncompetitive agricultural imports. Reductions occurred for hard fibers, rubber, silk, and wool, as competition from synthetic materials sharpened. Declines also took place for bananas, coffee, and spices. Among the complementary commodities showing increases were plantains, cocoa beans, cocoa powder, chocolate, powdered coffee, tea, and crude drugs; the advances were moderate except for purchases of powdered coffee, which nearly tripled.

Bananas and plantains. -- The value of U.S. fresh banana imports were slightly lower in 1967 than a year earlier; volume remained at 3.7 billion pounds, while value fell to \$174 million from \$179 million. Imports of fresh plantains were up slightly to 57 million pounds (\$3.0 million) from 56 million pounds (\$2.8 million) in 1966.

Coffee. -- Crude coffee imports totaled 2.8 billion pounds valued at \$963 million in 1967, compared with 2.9 billion pounds valued at \$1,069 million in 1966. Per capita consumption of coffee in the United States has leveled off in recent years, resulting in a relatively stable import volume. Roasted or ground coffee imports amounted to \$1.5 million, slightly under the 1966 total. Imports of coffee essences or extracts, mostly powdered or soluble, rose sharply to \$30 million from \$11 million in 1966.

Cocoa. -- During 1967, U.S. imports of cocoa beans declined to 633 million pounds from 715 million pounds in 1966. Value rose, however, to \$147 million from \$122 million. Higher cocoa bean prices compared with the preceding year reflected short supplies in producing countries. Imports of cocoa powder were also higher in 1967; valuation reached \$11 million, compared with \$7.5 million a year earlier. Prepared chocolate imports, mostly in sweetened block form, totaled \$14 million as against \$11 million in 1966.

Rubber and allied gums. -- The value of U.S. crude rubber imports, mostly in dry sheet form, declined for the third consecutive year to \$170 million. Lower prices accounted for this reduction, as volume increased to 1 billion pounds from 967 million pounds in 1966 and 998 million pounds in 1965. U.S. imports of similar gums, including guttas and jelutong, increased to 11.6 million pounds from 7.6 million pounds.

Carpet wools.--U.S. imports of unmanufactured duty-free wools dropped sharply to 95 million pounds (valued at \$37.5 million) in 1967 from 142 million pounds (\$72.2 million) a year earlier. A decrease in prices caused much of the reduction in the value of imports of rough wools; synthetic fibers continued to replace natural wools in U.S. carpet production.

Commercial and Government Program Export Highlights

JULY-SEPTEMBER 1967

U.S. exports of farm products declined 12 percent to \$1,432.8 million in July-September 1967 from \$1,625.0 million a year earlier. Sharp drops in dollar exports of feed grains and wheat and flour and smaller declines in all other major commodity groups, except oilseeds and products and rice, accounted for the 17-percent decrease in commercial exports to \$1,075.4 million from \$1,302.3 million. An increase of over three-fifths in shipments under the barter program, partially offset by a decline of 15 percent in exports under the sales for foreign currency program, accounted for the 11-percent rise in exports under Government-financed programs to \$357.4 million from \$322.7 million in the first quarter of the 1966/67 fiscal year (table 7).

Commodity Developments

Grains.--U.S. exports of wheat and flour lagged 15 percent behind the level of the corresponding period of 1966, with dollar shipments making up about two-fifths of the total compared with over half a year earlier. The near-record 1967 world wheat crop and reduced purchases by communist countries has tended to slacken world trade and reduce prices. A drop of \$54.9 million in U.S. exports of corn and a decline of \$34.0 million in grain sorghum shipments accounted for most of the \$94.6 million decline in exports of feed grains. U.S. feed grains are expected to meet strong competition from larger feed grain crops in Europe and from large supplies available from surplus-producing countries. Lower prices than a year earlier are expected to make U.S. corn more attractive to foreign buyers. U.S. exports of milled rice fell 7 percent in volume, but higher prices resulted in a slight increase in value. The United States has a record supply of rice, and exports are expected to continue strong in 1967/68.

Cotton. -- U.S. exports of cotton in the first quarter of the 1967/68 fiscal year declined 10 percent in quantity to 749,000 bales and 14 percent in value to \$85.1 million. The 1967 exports included a higher proportion of lower-priced shorter-staple cotton than a year earlier. U.S. exports of cotton are expected to remain at about the same level as a year earlier. Prospective gains in consumption in foreign Free World countries may be slightly less than expanded production in these countries.

Tobacco. -- A decline of over one-fourth in dollar exports of U.S. tobacco, partially offset by larger shipments under the barter and sales for foreign currency programs, accounted for the drop in tobacco exports to \$120.3 million from \$144.5 million a year earlier. U.S. exports of tobacco during 1967/68 are expected to be moderately below the 47-year high of the previous year, but may be higher than all other years since 1955/56.

Oilseeds and products. -- U.S. exports of oilseeds and products totaled \$236.4 million in July-September 1967, compared with \$211.0 million during the corresponding period of 1966. Exports of soybeans, all dollar exports, rose \$30.3 million to \$126.3 million. Shipments of oil cake and meal, of which soybean cake and meal made up 95 percent, advanced \$10.0

million. Soybean oil shipments were up nearly 10 percent in volume, but lower prices resulted in a small value decline. Smaller domestic supplies and higher prices resulted in a substantial reduction in shipments of flaxseed from the 1966 period.

Dairy products. -- Increased donations of nonfat dry milk under Government-financed programs contributed to the small increase in exports of U.S. dairy products. The United States has larger supplies of this product available for donation than a year earlier. Donations of blended food products (corn-soya-milk), which are included in infant's and dietetic foods (classified as dairy products in this report), also contributed to the advance in exports of dairy products.

Animals and products, except dairy.--U.S. exports of animals and products, except dairy products, totaled \$125.1 million in July-September 1967, \$17.1 million less than the year-earlier total. Lower prices for inedible tallow and lard offset quantity increases of 15 and 42 percent, respectively, and were largely responsible for the \$3.2 million decline to \$41.1 million in fats, oils, and greases. Meats and preparations fell \$3.4 million to \$25.3 million, with most of the decline in pork and variety meats. Exports of beef and yeal were slightly higher. Shipments of poultry and eggs dropped \$1.6 million to \$14.7 million. Exports of turkeys rose moderately. Shipments of hides and skins fell 9 percent in volume and 30 percent in value from a year earlier.

Fruits and vegetables and preparations. -- A reduction of about half in the value of U.S. canned fruit exports in July-September 1967 was largely responsible for the decline in shipments of fruits and preparations to \$82.0 million from \$91.6 million a year earlier. Exports of fresh fruits rose moderately. Shipments of oranges, grapefruits, apples, and berries were higher, but shipments of pears, lemons and limes, and grapes declined. Total exports of fruits in 1967/68 are expected to be somewhat smaller than the previous year. Smaller domestic supplies and increased supplies abroad will offer greater competition in world markets.

U.S. exports of vegetables and preparations amounted to \$33.6 million in July-September 1967, compared with \$35.9 million in the corresponding quarter of 1966. Shipments of canned vegetables, especially asparagus and tomatoes and preparations, were lower. Exports of fresh and frozen vegetables rose moderately. Exports of vegetables and preparations from the United States are expected to continue strong in 1967/68. Although shipments of dried beans were larger in the first quarter than a year earlier, exports are expected to be down sharply because of reduced supplies of the varieties preferred by foreign buyers. Supplies of dry peas are substantially above the small supply of last season and movement to foreign markets is expected to be up.

Exports Under Credit Sales Programs

Exports under credit sales programs amounted to \$48.9 million, about 30 percent of the total for the same quarter of 1966. Sharp drops in purchases of corn and grain sorghums were largely responsible for the decline in purchases under the CCC credit sales program to \$39.3 million in 1967 from \$157.6 million a year earlier. Disbursements under Export-to \$39.3 million in 1967 from \$157.6 million a year earlier. Exports under credit sales Import Bank credits and guarantees were 17 percent lower. Exports under credit sales programs are included in "Exports outside specified Government-financed programs" in tables 7, 9, and 10, but are shown separately in table 8.

Yugoslavia and Pakistan were the principal destinations for wheat under the CCC credit sales program. Most of the cotton went to Japan, Poland, and the Republic of Korea. All of the corn under the CCC program was destined for Greece and Poland.

Disbursements under Export-Import Bank credits and guarantees were principally for cotton to Japan, but included relatively small quantities of soybean meal to Hungary and breeding stock to Mexico.

Government Program Developments

Shipments under Government-financed programs advanced 11 percent to \$357.4 million in the first quarter of fiscal year 1967/68 from \$322.7 million a year earlier. Exports under the barter program rose to \$106.5 million from \$65.7 million. Sales for foreign currency fell to \$156.5 million from \$184.2 million. Government-to-Government donations were slightly higher and donations through voluntary relief agencies nearly tripled (tables 9 and 10).

Sales for foreign currency.--Exports in exchange for local currency declined \$27.7 million to \$156.5 million in July-September 1967 from the corresponding quarter of 1966. Shipments of cotton, tobacco, soybean oil, and tallow were higher. Smaller quantities of wheat, feed grains, and rice were exported during the 1967 quarter than a year earlier. India, which was the principal destination for wheat, grain sorghums, and corn, also received soybean oil, tallow, and cotton. Pakistan ranked first as a recipient of soybean oil, second as a recipient of wheat, and received tobacco and tallow under this program. South Vietnam received wheat flour, rice, and tobacco. Israel received grain sorghums, corn, and soybean oil. Tallow, wheat, and cotton went to Korea and tallow and cotton to Ghana under the sales for foreign currency program.

Long-term dollar credit sales.--Exports under long-term dollar credits amounted to \$38.8 million in both July-September 1966 and 1967. Larger shipments of wheat, flour, corn, grain sorghums, soybean oil, and tallow were offset by a reduction in exports of cotton and a slight drop in tobacco exports. No rice moved in July-September 1967, compared with \$8.6 million a year earlier. India and Pakistan received shipments under this program for the first time, purchasing over \$20 million and nearly \$7 million worth of wheat, respectively. Israel purchased feed grains; Yugoslavia, soybean oil; and Spain, corn under the long-term dollar credit program.

Foreign donations. -- Government-to-Government donations advanced over 20 percent to \$18.3 million in the first quarter of 1967/68 from the corresponding period a year earlier. Larger quantities of wheat, corn, bulgur wheat, and nonfat dry milk were exported in the 1967 period. India, Republic of Korea, Brazil, and South Vietnam were the largest recipients of U.S. farm products under this program during the period.

Donations through voluntary relief agencies rose to \$28.2 million from \$10.6 million a year earlier. Substantial increases in shipments of nonfat dry milk and a corn-soyamilk blended food product accounted for most of the gain. Donations under this program were widely distributed to all world areas, especially Asia, Africa, and Latin America.

Barter.--Shipments under the barter program advanced \$40.8 million to \$106.5 million in July-September 1967 from the year-earlier quarter. Most of the increase was in exports of wheat, which rose to \$67.3 million from \$27.9 million in July-September 1966. Exports of wheat to Brazil, India, Korea, and Peru accounted for over three-fourths of the total. More than four-fifths of the tobacco shipments went to Europe, including \$11.4 million to the United Kingdom in addition to purchases of \$31.0 million for dollars.

Export Highlights

U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS: JULY-DECEMBER 1967

U.S. exports of farm products during the first half of fiscal 1967/68 totaled \$3,196 million, 11 percent below agricultural exports for the same period in 1966/67 (table 11). Although exports were down, there was considerable improvement during November and December. Agricultural exports for November were \$668 million (preliminary), the highest monthly level since the record \$698 million in November 1966 and the fourth highest monthly total recorded. (An early estimate of \$609 million was reported in the January 1968 issue.) November exports surpassed those of October 1967 by 26 percent. The upsurge in November's exports resulted principally from a rise in exports of wheat and flour, corn, and rice.

December's exports were \$564 million, 11 percent below those of December 1966. Shipments of animals and animal products in December were 12 percent lower than those of December 1966, as a result of the smaller value of poultry and dairy products, hides and skins, and animal fats and oils. Exports of grains and preparations were \$236 million in December 1967, slightly lower than those of December 1966. This decrease occurred from lower exports of wheat and flour and feed grains. Exports of corn were up substantially from December 1966, but below the level of November 1967. Rice exports rose slightly from those of November 1967. Among the exports of oilseeds and products, the increase in protein meal was more than offset by reduced exports of soybeans, cottonseed and soybean oils. December's cotton exports were about 47 percent below those of December 1966.

Animal and animal product exports in July-December 1967 were \$308 million, 12 percent below the corresponding period for the preceding fiscal year. Most of the commodities making up this group declined, although dairy products were only slightly below hose of July-December 1966. Animal fats and oils, including lard and tallow, totaled \$80 million in July-December 1967, about 14 percent below the corresponding period in 1966. Even though volume was up, this decline took place because prices have been somewhat lower than the corresponding period last year. Increased production of hogs in Western Europe, particularly in Belgium, has provided additional competition for U.S. exports to West European countries. Shipments of hides and skins have declined sharply from July-December 1966, dropping 26 percent to \$54 million. Increased competition in Western Europe, as a result of expanding exports from Argentina and Eastern Europe, and the gradual acceptance of synthetic substitutes for natural leather have decreased demand for U.S. hides and skins. Declining demand has occurred in spite of substantially reduced prices for U.S. hides and skins.

Cotton exports in July-December 1967 were valued at \$187 million, 30 percent below July-December 1966, while volume was down 26 percent to 1.7 million bales. The sharper decline in value compared with volume has resulted from increased exports of short-staple cotton moving at lower prices. For instance, the average per bale price in December 1966 was \$119 million, compared with \$116 million in December 1967.

Exports of grains and preparations in July-December 1967 totaled \$1,381 million, 12 percent below the \$1,568 million in July-December 1966. Although exports of grains and preparations are still running below those of the corresponding period in 1966, the differential has lessened. During November and December, a rather sharp increase in exports of corn has boosted this year's accumulated total value to only 3 percent below the level of corn exports for July-December 1966. In addition to the increases in corn exports, wheat exports have also improved. The November and December exports of wheat and corn reflect increased supplies made available from the record cr.; for the 1967 season and the greatly expanded supplies available for export as the new harvest reaches the ports of export. Rice exports were also surpassing last year's record levels and the total value for July-December 1967, \$131 million, was 9 percent korea in July-November 1967 were valued at nearly \$15 million, up from nil in the same period of 1966 (table 12). Exports to South Vietnam were valued at \$22 million, down about a quarter from July-November 1966.

Oilseed and product exports totaled \$625 million for July-December 1967, down 1 percent from \$631 million in July-December 1966. Exports of soybeans remained near the level of \$398 million for July-December 1966. Although the quantity of exports was up 16 percent, the value increase was muffled by the lower per bushel price for soybean exports in the current fiscal year as compared with the per bushel price in compared with an average export price of \$2.83 in December 1967. U.S. exports of tobacco dropped 15 percent to \$285 million in July-December 1967 from last year's year record level. Smaller foreign demand for U.S. tobacco has resulted from stocks accumulated during the past fiscal year, and larger production from tobacco-producing countries competing with the United States in Western Europe. However, Rhodesian tobacco continues to be excluded from the world market as a result of UN sanctions placed upon that country in late 1966.

Exports of fruits and vegetables were 7 percent below those of July-December 1966. For the same period in 1967, they totaled \$239 million. Exports of fruits and preparations were down 6 percent from July-December 1966, principally from a sharp reduction in exports of canned fruits. Fruit cocktail, peaches, and pineapples totaled \$39 million in 1966, and were down nearly 45 percent to \$22 million in July-December 1967. Partially offsetting this decline were increased exports of dried fruits, fresh citrus and noncitrus fruits, and fruit juices. Vegetable and preparation exports were down 9 percent from July-December 1966, due primarily to reduced exports of canned vegetables -- notably asparagus -- and dried beans and peas. Combined, these commodities were down more than one-fourth, but the decline was partially offset by increased exports of fresh vegetables.

Agricultural Exports to the European Economic Community: July-November 1967

U.S. agricultural exports to the European Economic Community (EEC) totaled \$629 million in July-November 1967, 10 percent below the total for July-November 1966 (table 13). Most of the decline thus far in 1967/68 has resulted from substantially lower exports of non-variable-levy commodities (agricultural commodities not subject to the EEC's variable levies). Although exports of farm products subject to the EEC's variable levies declined, they accounted for a smaller share of the total decrease.

November exports to the EEC improved considerably from those of October, rising 46 percent. Exports of variable-levy commodities were up sharply, mainly due to a rise in exports of feed grains and wheat. Feed grain exports in November nearly doubled those of October. Wheat exports rose nearly \$4 million. November's exports of nonvariable-levy commodities totaled \$108 million, 32 percent higher than those of October 1967. Most of the increase in non-variable-levy commodities resulted from a substantial rise in exports of soybeans and tobacco, which combined were nearly \$23 million higher. Compared with November 1966, exports to the EEC were 9 percent higher than the \$175 million in November 1966. Variable-levy commodities, totaling \$83 million, accounted for most of the increase, rising 32 percent from the \$63 million in November 1966. Exports of non-variable-levy commodities were down slightly from those of November 1966, declining 4 percent. Among the variable-levy commodities, exports of feed grains and wheat rose sharply from November 1966. Dairy products and lard, although small as a proportion of the total, also increased from the level of November 1966. Among the non-variable-levy commodities, tobacco exports were up sharply, reaching \$21 million compared with \$9 million in November 1966. However, exports of cotton, fruits and vegetables, hides and skins, oil cake and meal, soybeans, tallow, variety meats, and vegetable oils declined.

Exports of variable-levy commodities in July-November 1967 totaled \$262 million, 6 percent below the \$279 million in July-November 1966. Exports of feed grains continued to account for the negative difference in exports of variable-levy commodities to the EEC and in July-November 1967 totaled \$176 million, compared with \$193 million in July-November 1966. However, rice exports to the EEC have continued at a higher level in fiscal 1967, totaling \$10 million for the first 5 months. In addition, wheat exports were up 5 percent to \$50 million in July-November 1967 from the like months of the previous fiscal year. Exports of lard in July-November 1967 jumped substantially above those of July-November 1966 due to the sharp rise in November's

total. Exports of poultry and eggs, totaling \$9 million, were down 27 percent from the \$13 million in July-November 1966 due primarily to a rather sharp decline in broilers and fryers and turkeys.

Exports of non-variable-levy commodities declined to \$367 million in July-November 1967 from \$418 million for the first 5 months of fiscal 1966. This decline occurred from lower exports of cotton, fruits and vegetables, hides and skins, oil cake and meal, tallow, lobacco, variety meats, and vegetable oils. Exports of soybeans in July-November 1967 totaled \$120 million, and were about \$7 million higher than those of the same period in 1966.

Explanatory Note

U.S. foreign agricultural trade statistics in this report include official U.S. data based on compilations of the Bureau of the Census. Agricultural commodities consist of (1) nonmarine food products and (2) other products of agriculture which have not passed through complex processes of manufacture such as raw hides and skins, fats and oils, and wine. Such manufactured products as textiles, leather, boots and shoes, cigarettes, naval stores, forestry products, and distilled alcoholic beverages are not considered agricultural.

The trade statistics exclude shipments between the 50 States and Puerto Rico, between the 50 States and the island possessions, between Puerto Rico and the island possessions, among the island possessions, and intransit through the United States from one foreign country to another when documented as such through U.S. Customs.

EXPORTS The export statistics also exclude shipments to the U.S. armed forces for their own use and supplies for vessels and planes engaged in foreign trade. Data on shipments valued at less than \$100 are not compiled by commodity and are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall export totals in this report. The agricultural exports statistics include shipments under P.L. 83-480 (Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act), and related laws; under P.L. 87-195 (Act for International Development); and involving Government payments to exporters. (USDA payments are excluded from the export value.) Separate statistics on Government program exports are compiled by USDA from data obtained from operating agencies.

The export value, the value at the port of exportation, is based on the selling price (or cost if not sold) and includes inland freight, insurance, and other charges to the port. The country of destination is the country of ultimate destination or where the commodities are to be consumed, further processed, or manufactured. When the shipper does not know the ultimate destination, the shipments are credited to the last country, as known to him at time of shipment from the United States, to which the commodities are to be shipped in their present form. Except for Canada, export shipments valued \$100-\$499 are included on the basis of sampling estimates; shipments to Canada valued \$100-\$1,999 are sampled.

IMPORTS Imports for consumption consist of commodities released from U.S. Customs custody upon arrival, or entered into bonded manufacturing warehouse, or withdrawn from bonded storage warehouse for consumption. The agricultural statistics exclude low-value shipments from countries not identified because of illegible reporting, but they are reflected in nonagricultural and overall import totals in this report.

The import value, defined generally as the market value in the foreign country, excludes import duties, ocean freight, and marine insurance. The country of origin is defined as the country where the commodities were grown or processed. Where the country of origin is not known, the imports are credited to the country of shipment.

Imports similar to agricultural commodities produced commercially in the United States and others that are interchangeable in use to any significant extent with such U.S. commodities are <u>supplementary</u>, or partly competitive. All other commodities are <u>complementary</u>, or noncompetitive.

Further explanatory material on foreign trade statistics and compilation procedures of the Bureau of the Census is contained in the publications of that agency.

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
