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
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

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

Japanese Market--Where We Gained and Lost, and Why (see p. 8). U.S. agricultural exports to Japan in 1971/72 were valued at \$1.2 billion, about equal to the level of a year earlier but more than double that of 10 years ago. Exports of soybeans, tobacco, cattle hides, pork, grapefruit, and lemons showed substantial gains from a year earlier. More than offsetting, however, were the sharp declines in exports of wheat, corn, and alfalfa meal. The longshoremen's strike was partly responsible for the decline in exports of wheat, alfalfa meal, some fruits and vegetables, and safflower seed.

Further expansion in U.S. agricultural exports to Japan is possible because rising incomes are stimulating demand for livestock products, fruits, and tobacco. However, Japanese trade barriers currently impede our export growth. The most damaging of various extant nontariff trade barriers are quantitative import restrictions affecting 23 categories of agricultural products. Also, Japanese tariffs ranging from 20 to 40 percent are imposed on a variety of imported processed and raw agricultural goods.

Record Commercial Sales Boost 1971/72 Exports (see p. 15). Commercial farm exports and total farm exports both achieved records in 1971/72, but the Government-financed share remained at a low level. Exports under Government-financed programs amounted to \$1.12 billion, about 14 percent of the record \$8.05 billion U.S. agricultural exports in 1971/72. This was about the same as the prior fiscal year's record-low share.

Commercial sales for dollars reached \$6.93 billion. Substantial gains in cotton, tobacco, rice, corn, and cottonseed oil bartered for overseas procurement brought these shipments to a record \$874 million. Meanwhile, exports under the CCC and the Export-Import Bank credit sales programs declined 6 percent to \$458 million.

Exports under P.L. 480 totaled \$1.05 billion, up slightly from the year before. Mutual Security (AID) shipments rose to \$67 million from 1970/71's \$57 million. Tallow and rice accounted for three-fourths of AID exports, compared with 84 percent a year earlier.

Shipments under Government-to-government arrangements rose \$90 million to \$228 million; meanwhile, voluntary relief agencies' exports totaled \$152 million, up \$10 million from 1970/71.

Again in 1971/72, wheat, rice, cotton, and soybean oil accounted for two-thirds of U.S. agricultural exports under Government-financed programs.

U.S. Farm Exports to 50 Largest Markets, 1971/72 (see p. 37). While U.S. agricultural exports of \$8.05 billion in 1971/72 went to 165 destinations, 15 countries received 69 percent of the total. The top 50 markets took \$7.5 billion, or 93 percent, of U.S. farm-product exports, ranging from \$1.2 billion for Japan down to \$22 million for Greece. The largest gains in 1971/72 were registered for the USSR, the Netherlands, and Italy. U.S. farm exports declined in only 19 of the 50 major markets in 1971/72, with Yugoslavia, Japan, the United Kingdom, Belgium-Luxembourg, India, and Brazil showing the largest declines. The USSR purchased U.S. products (mostly feed grains and hides) valued at \$158 million, up from \$11 million a year ago. Estimated trans-shipments through Canada, the Netherlands, and Belgium are presented in table format.

U.S. Farm Exports to the COMECON Area Up Sharply (see p. 61). Recent shipments of farm products to the USSR accelerated to \$150 million during July-September 1972. Wheat, feed grains, and soybeans accounted for most of the increase. Another \$30 million worth of U.S. agricultural commodities moved to Eastern Europe. A large feed grain purchase by the USSR last year raised U.S. agricultural exports to \$158 million in 1971/72. Total shipments to the COMECON area in 1971/72 reached \$305 million, nearly 70 percent above a year earlier.


Selected Price Series of International Significance (see p. 70). Most prices advanced sharply in September. The Reuter's commodity price index reached a record high of 636 at the end of September and continued to rise in October. This index and the Dow-Jones spot index were 20 percent above September 1971. Wheat prices led the increase, with the seller's price of U.S. No. 2 Hard Winter wheat f.o.b. Gulf ports at \$2.31 a bushel. Feed grain prices also were strong. Soybean and soybean meal prices in Europe continued to climb even after an increase in the U.S. crop estimate in mid-October. Prices of rice, sugar (world free market and also c.i.f. New York), cocoa beans, and rubber also advanced, while prices of cotton and imported cow meat continued to decline and the coffee price retreated from its August peak.

U.S. Agricultural Exports, July-September 1971 (see p. 75). U.S. exports of farm products totaled a record \$2.08 billion in July-September 1972--a tenth above the previous high set in the same quarter a year earlier. Grain exports, up in value by two-fifths, accounted for the bulk of the increase. Other gains were made in cattle hides, poultry products, meats, fruits, vegetables, and flaxseed. However, the values of soybean products and cotton dropped sharply due to reduced supplies available for export. The USSR and Eastern Europe brought large quantities of agricultural products to make up for poor grain and vegetable harvest.

U.S. Agricultural Imports Down in July-September 1972 (see p. 81). During July-September, agricultural imports were \$1.58 billion, 7 percent below similar months last year. Imports rose slightly from April-June instead of declining seasonally. Agricultural imports for July-September 1971 were influenced by pre-strike inventory accumulation of many commodities. Competitive farm product imports for July-September 1972 were slightly higher than in 1971, due mainly to advances for beef and veal, mutton, cheese, fruits and vegetables, copra, and palm oil. Noncompetitive purchases fell 19 percent.

FATUS TRADE NEWS ROUNDUP

With this issue, Foreign Agricultural Trade of the United States revives the monthly Trade News Roundup, a brief report of current developments with implications -- either short- or long-term -- for U.S. agricultural trade. The roundup was discontinued in 1961. The roundup is based on such sources as reports from U.S. agricultural attaches, U.S. and foreign periodicals, trade journals, and newspapers, as well as research in progress. Reader comment is invited.

USSR grain crop problems continue. Latest Chapter: Slow planting. Late planting, though, doesn't always mean a poor harvest. Seeding of winter crops lagged badly throughout this fall. By October 25, a total of 26 million hectares of winter grain crops reportedly were seeded, about three-fourths of the 34 million hectares planned, and it's estimated that some 5-7 million hectares of the planned area won't get seeded this fall ... Dry weather was the main roadblock. It prevailed over the southeastern part of European USSR ... Fall seeding also lagged in 1969, but a record crop was harvested. On the other hand, the 1972 crop was poor, even though seeding of winter grain in the fall of 1971 was carried out in good time. Still, even if unseeded hectares are sown to spring grains, spring grains yield less than winter grains, which could mean a slightly smaller 1973 grain crop.

A 50-percent drop 1972 Brazilian wheat harvest expected: Heaviest rains in 50 years, frosts, diseases, and pests in Rio Grande do Sul -- the principal wheat producing state -- have reduced prospective production to half of last year's 2.0 million metric tons. This would be the first setback for the wheat program which began in 1967 when output totaled only 365,000 metric tons.

Brazil is already buying wheat under two tenders, one for 150,000 metric tons and one for 200,000 tons. The Brazilians have signed an agreement with Canada for the import of 600,000 metric tons over a 4-year period -- up to 200,000 tons a year. Renewed interest in U.S. wheat imports is likely.

The 1972 grain crop including rice in the EC is now estimated at 80.8 million metric tons -- more than 4 percent above the 1971 record. Most of the increase was due to higher yields. France showed the greatest increase in grain products, 22 percent above the 1967-71 average ... Good yields increased EC barley production 8 percent; larger area increased corn production 10 percent ... Wheat production was up 3.5 percent over 1971; production of oats and rye, down ... The large crop puts the EC close to self-sufficiency in grains in 1972/73 (in net terms) -- likely to lead to increased exports rather than reduced imports, however.

Thailand's 1972 rice and corn crops have been reduced by drought in July and August, floods in September. Production of paddy rice in 1972/73 will fall below the 13.4 million metric tons reported for prior years; estimates of losses range from 2 to 3 million metric tons ... The Thai government, fearing shortages, has banned private

export sales of low grade rice without prior approval. Total rice exports from Thailand were 1.66 million metric tons in 1971, may approximate 1.75 million metric tons in 1972, and are expected to drop below 1.3 million metric tons in 1973 ... 1972 corn production is estimated at 1.3 million metric tons, down 41 percent from 1971 ... Corn exports in 1972 are estimated at 1.0 million metric tons, down 45 percent from last year. The poor corn crop cut planned exports of Thai corn to Japan more than to 450,000 metric tons.


Cuban sugar production during the harvest season ended last spring was 4.4 million metric tons. This figure, not previously released, is about 600,000 metric tons higher than earlier estimates and would raise 1971/72 world sugar production about 1 percent to 71.5 million metric tons ... Prospects are that Cuba will produce a larger sugar crop in the 1972/73 campaign.

Total 1972 U.K. grain production is currently forecast at 15.9 million metric tons -- 6 percent larger than in 1971 ... Wheat output may set a new record, 4.87 million metric tons, due largely to increased area. Barley output is up 11 percent to 9.5 million metric tons.

Latest estimates put Austria's 1972 grain crop at 3.2 million metric tons, 8 percent lower than in 1971. Summer hailstorms and floods reduced output of all grains except corn. Crops of wheat, grain sorghum, barley, oats, and rye are down, but the larger corn crop makes the feed grain harvest nearly as large as last year's. High-protein wheat harvested this year is reported to be poor quality, and up to 100,000 metric tons, plus 20,000 metric tons of durum, may have to be imported for domestic milling. By the end of October, Austria had indicated possible purchases from the U.S. of 40,000 metric tons, high-protein wheat, and 27,000 metric tons of durum.

Bangladesh is now striving to revitalize exports of jute and jute products ... 1972 jute crop's estimated at slightly over 1.1 million metric tons, a fair crop. By May 1972, jute mills were reportedly operating at 84 percent of monthly levels reported in 1969/70, the period of record output ... Trade circles in Calcutta indicate that Bangladesh might export 500,000 metric tons of jute products in 1972/73. High prices which prevailed in Calcutta for jute products last year have begun to subside, because of competition from Bangladesh.

Consumption of butter in South Africa dropped almost 30 percent, from 2.4 kg per capita in 1970/71 to 1.7 kg in 1972/73 ... coinciding with production of yellow margarine (prohibited since 1950) and higher wholesale butter prices ... Increase in butter stocks had led to pressure for exports -- to Iran and the U.K. -- reversing South Africa's traditional position as a net importer.

JAPANESE MARKET -- WHERE WE GAINED AND LOST, AND WHY

The United States is placing increasing emphasis on exports of food and agricultural raw materials to Japan to help alleviate our overall trade imbalance with that country. Our agricultural exports to Japan in 1971/72 were valued at \$1.2 billion--more than double those of 10 years before. Further expansion of these exports is possible. Rising incomes in Japan are stimulating increased demand for livestock products, fruit, cigarettes, and other products we supply in finished form or as raw materials. However, our farm trade with Japan has been limited by both short-term developments and more or less permanent barriers to trade.

U.S. agricultural exports to Japan in 1971/72 were severely hampered by the longshoremen's strikes on the East and West Coasts. Exports of wheat, alfalfa meal, safflower seed, and prepared fruits and vegetables suffered from the strikes. In addition a strike of Japanese seamen towards the end of 1971/72 also slowed and changed the export pattern.

Trade Barriers

Certain barriers tend to impede the growth of our exports to Japan. One barrier is the relatively high tariff schedule applied to imports of certain agricultural products. Duties imposed on processed agricultural products range between 25 and 35 percent ad valorem; on beef, 25 percent; on certain fresh citrus, 20-40 percent; and on poultry meat, 20 percent.

There are also nontariff barriers to trade, principally the quantitative restriction of imports affecting 23 agricultural product groupings. 2/ These quotas have kept U.S. exports of the following commodities to Japan at low levels:

Other products under quota restriction, for which the possibility of increased U.S. exports exists, include certain prepared meat items, pulses, rice and barley flour, groats, denatured dates, dextrose, maltose, lactose, caramel and artificial honey, roasted, peanuts, tomato ketchup and sauce, mixed seasoning, ice cream powder, prepared milk powder for infants, other preparations consisting mainly of milk, food preparations based on rice or wheat, and malt.

Another nontariff barrier to trade is the direct government control in Japan of wheat, barley, rice, tobacco, and some milk products, including butter. The control involves setting retail, wholesale, and producer prices; price support to producers; and regulation of the external trade. Other barriers to trade arise from the nature of the marketing and distribution systems in Japan, the import licensing procedures, health and sanitary regulations, and a government policy of diversification of the sources of imports. The total value of U.S. agricultural exports to Japan in 1971/72, 90 percent of which was accounted for by the 12 commodities discussed below, decreased 4 percent from the record high of \$1.2 billion in 1970/71. But we made important gains in certain key commodities.

Commodities with Dollar Gains

U.S. exports of soybeans to Japan registered the largest dollar gain -- jumping \$54 million over \$303 million of 1970/71. Of this gain, one-half was due to the higher



export price of \$3.25 per bushel (f.a.s. U.S. port). The other half was due to increased quantity, stimulated by increased demand in Japan for vegetable oil, soybeans for food, and soybean meal for feed. The United States continued to supply nine-tenths of Japan's soybean imports while the Peoples Republic of China provided the rest. The average c.i.f. import price of Chinese soybeans was higher than the U.S. price in 1970/71 and 1971/72, but closer in 1971/72. The imports of soybeans are duty-free and not subject to quantitative import restrictions. Japanese domestic production of soybeans is small -- 122,000 tons in 1971.

Fresh grapefruit showed the second-largest dollar gain by jumping from \$782,000 in 1970/71 to \$18 million in 1971/72. This phenomenal increase was made possible by the removal on June 30, 1971, of the quantitative import restriction on grapefruit. Japanese willingness to accept new products, witnessed by our market development success with lemons after their liberalization in 1964, has

been reasserted for grapefruit. Thus, through the FAS-sponsored consumer education campaign which utilizes spot television, transit, and magazine advertising, and an intensive campaign of in-store demonstrations and sampling, we have built a new market for U.S. grapefruit. Japanese import duties on grapefruit are high, however, aimed at protecting the domestic mikan (mandarin orange) industry. During the off-season for the mikan (June 1-November 30), the duty is 20 percent ad valorem, but it jumps to 40 percent when the mikan is in season (December 1-May 31). There is no major competition with the U.S. grapefruit as yet, but on June 9, 1972, Japan removed a plant quarantine ban on Israeli citrus imports. Israel could prove to be an important competitor. Also, Ecuador and South Africa exported small quantities of fresh grapefruit to Japan in 1971/72. Grapefruit is not produced in Japan.

Pork exports to Japan tripled to \$24 million in 1971/72, for the third-largest gain in dollar terms. Rapidly rising incomes in Japan have stimulated increased demand for meat, a commodity with a high income elasticity. Imports of beef are under a quantitative restriction but imports of pork are not. Imports of ham and bacon were liberalized



on April 1, 1972, but a variable duty was applied. 3/ Imports of other pork were liberalized in October 1971, but they are also subject to a variable duty. 4/ Our main competitor in the pork market is Canada, which supplied 36 percent of Japanese pork imports in 1971/72, compared with the U.S. share of 47 percent. Total imports more than tripled in 1971/72 to 50,213 metric tons in 1972 -- despite increasing domestic production.

Tobacco exports gained \$15 million over the \$55 million of 1970/71 -- nearly half due to price increase. The volume increase was due to increased domestic demand for cigarettes, especially those blends containing at least a fourth of U.S. leaf. Imports of tobacco are controlled by the Japan Monopoly Corporation. The U.S. share of the market dropped from 97 percent in 1959 to 54 percent in 1971/72. The principal competitors are Greece, Turkey, India, and Bulgaria. In the past two decades, cigarette consumption has tripled in Japan -- reaching 233 billion in 1971. Japanese domestic production of tobacco accounts for over three-fourths of tobacco consumption.

Exports of cattle hides increased by \$12 million to \$57 million in 1971/72. Average price rose from \$7.93 to \$9.41 per hide, accounting for all but \$3 million of the larger exports. The U.S. share of the market dropped from 83 percent in 1970/71 to 78 percent in 1971/72. Australia, the principal competitor, increased its share to 14 percent. Cattle hides are imported duty-free and are not subject to quantitative restrictions. Production of cattle hides in Japan is over a million per year.

Cotton exports to Japan were up slightly to \$11 million in 1971/72, although volume was 13 percent less. A poor 1971 crop of Texas short-staple cotton caused Japan to shift its sources of supply for this type to Pakistan and Brazil. Raw cotton, not produced by Japan, is the largest agricultural import, valued at over \$1/2-billion in 1971/72; we accounted for over a fifth. None of the other 32 nations supplying cotton claim over a tenth. Imports of cotton are duty-free and not controlled by quantitative restrictions.

Fresh lemons gained over \$1 million on the strength of volume. Lemons produced in Japan are not marketed commercially and there is no competition from other suppliers, due largely to the high quality of U.S. lemons. There is, however, a 10-percent duty on imports of fresh lemons. This duty, when applied to the 1971/72 average c.i.f. import price of 22 cents per pound, brought the 1971/72 average price to 24 cents per pound for the importer, more than double the f.o.b. export price.

Commodities with Dollar Losses

The major U.S. dollar loss was due to decreased exports of grain sorghum. Volume fell by half to 50 million bushels in 1971/72, and value by half to \$69 million. Total Japanese imports of grain sorghum declined 15 percent in 1971/72, offset by increased corn imports and the use of about 1.5 million tons of surplus rice (brown basis) for feed. South African and Thai corn, pound for pound, were slightly cheaper than U.S. sorghum in 1971/72, on a c.i.f. basis, but U.S. sorghum generally has a higher percentage of digestible protein.

3/ The variable levy for ham and bacon is the difference between the value obtained by multiplying the value for customs duty by 0.6 and the value obtained by multiplying the standard import price by 1.5.

4/ For other pork items it is simply the difference between the value for customs duty and the standard import price. The value for customs duty for ham and bacon is 2-1/7 times the import price for carcass meat; for other pork it is the import price for carcass meat divided by 1.1. The duty is waived periodically in order to curb domestic pork prices.

The U.S. share of the sorghum market plunged to a third, down from nearly two-thirds in 1970/71. Argentina's share increased from a fourth to a third and Australia's share grew from 12 percent to 29 percent. Dock strikes in the United States and Japan forced Japan to draw down stocks. Grain sorghum is not produced in Japan. Imports of sorghum grain are duty-free and not under quota.

Corn exports, off \$61 million, recorded the second largest U.S. loss. The volume of shipments decreased 32 million bushels to 100 million bushels in 1971/72. Total Japanese imports of corn were up 5 percent but the U.S. share fell from 66 percent in 1970/71 to 43 percent in 1971/72. South African and Thai corn were more expensive than U.S. corn in 1970/71 and less expensive in 1971/72. The South African share of the market was up to 26 percent in 1971/72 from only 5 percent in 1970/71. The Thai share moved up to 17 percent from 16 percent. There is no quota on imports of corn and corn for feed is duty-free.

Wheat exports to Japan were off by \$37 million. The volume of U.S. shipments fell from 106 million bushels to 80 million bushels. Total imports of wheat, controlled by Japan's Food Agency, were up 3 percent in 1971/72. The U.S. share fell to 43 percent from 61 percent a year earlier. Canada and Australia increased their respective shares from 22 to 28 percent and from 17 to 29 percent. There was little difference in the relationship of import prices between the major suppliers. Domestic production of wheat was down slightly to 440,000 in 1971/72. Increased competition from record world wheat production and the adverse impact of the U.S. longshoremen's strike were among the reasons for declining exports.

Exports of alfalfa meal to Japan fell by \$9 million and the volume was down 36 percent to 320,000 short tons in 1971/72. Total imports were down 15 percent and the U.S. share fell from 93 to 78 percent. New Zealand and Canada are the major competitors. Imports of alfalfa meal are not subject to quota restrictions or duty.


Tallow exports to Japan decreased by \$7 million. Total Japanese imports were down 3 percent. The U.S. share was down moderately to 57 percent in 1971/72. Australia increased its share from 17 to 27 percent as its price came down to the U.S. price. Imports are duty-free and not under quota. Domestic production of tallow is only 11,000 tons per year.

RECORD COMMERCIAL SALES BOOST 1971/72 EXPORTS

Larger exports for dollars in 1971/72 elevated total U.S. exports of farm products to a record high of \$8.05 billion, nearly \$300 million above the year-earlier total. Substantial gains in dollar sales of corn, soybeans, cotton, cottonseed oil, fruits, vegetables, cattle hides, and butter more than offset decreases in commercial shipments of wheat, rice, barley, sorghum grain, alfalfa meal, and soybean oil. Exports for dollars advanced \$252 million to a record \$6.93 billion.

"Commercial exports" or "exports outside Government-financed programs" include shipments under barter contracts involving overseas procurement for U.S. agencies and shipments under CCC credit sales program, and Export-Import Bank loans. Exports under supply-type barter transactions rose fractionally to a record \$874 million in 1971/72, nearly 11 percent of total U.S. farm product exports. Credit sales program exports dropped to \$458 million compared with \$488 million in 1970/71 (tables through).

The U.S. Government in 1971/72 shipped \$1.12 billion worth of food and fiber overseas under the food for peace program. This brought to \$21.3 billion our total food aid effort since the enactment of the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954 (P.L. 480). U.S. farm exports under Government-financed programs amounted to 14 percent of total agricultural exports -- the same low share as in the previous fiscal year.

Sales for local currency, continuing a 6-year downtrend, dropped nearly one-third to \$145 million, the lowest rate since the program began in 1954/55. Long-term dollar credit sales, designed to gradually replace local currency sales, totaled \$530 million, slightly below the \$539 million peak reached in 1970/71. Government-to-government and voluntary-agency donations, both under Title II, were \$90 million and \$10 million higher than their respective year-earlier levels. Exports under the Mutual Security (AID) program totaled \$67 million, up nearly one-fifth from a year earlier. No U.S. farm products have been bartered for strategic materials in the last 3 fiscal years.

Commodity Review

Wheat and wheat flour.--Wheat (including flour) continued to lead the field of commodities exported under Government-financed programs in 1971/72, accounting for \$372 million or one-third of the total, compared with \$383 million in 1970/71. Local currency sales dropped more than one-half to less than \$38 million, due to sharply lower purchases by South Korea and Pakistan. South Vietnam, India, and Khmer Republic (Cambodia) also participated.

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South Korea, Pakistan, India, Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Iran, Morocco, and Israel were the major recipients of wheat or flour under long-term credit in 1971/72. Largest shifts from year-earlier levels included gains for South Korea, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka (Ceylon), and declines for India, Turkey, and Brazil. Wheat and flour long-term dollar credit sales totaling \$245 million were up nearly 5 percent from a year earlier. Donations under Title II rose one-fourth to \$88 million; Government-to-government arrangements accounted for \$65 million (71 percent wheat and 29 percent flour), and voluntary agencies for \$23 million (42 percent wheat and 58 percent flour).

Rice.--A 1-percent gain in volume together with a 5-percent advance in average prices brought the value of U.S. rice exports up 6 percent to \$307 million in 1971/72. Government-program shipments rose 18 percent to \$198 million. Sales for local currency fell two-fifths to \$26 million as shipments to South Vietnam, the only purchaser of rice for local currency in 1970/71, dropped to \$18 million from \$42 million. Pakistan entered the market in 1971/72, buying \$8 million worth of rice for local currency. Diminished movement of rice under long-term dollar credit to South Korea was nearly offset by larger shipments to Indonesia, Liberia, and South Vietnam. Government-to-government grants totaled \$49 million in 1971/72; there were none in 1970/71. AID shipments, at \$22 million, were about the same as a year earlier.

Feed grains.--Feed grain exports under Government programs represented 7 percent of total U.S. feed grain exports in 1971/72, the same as a year earlier. The value of commercial sales, at \$1.04 billion, was about the same as the previous year but shipments under Government-financed programs, totaling \$78 million, were up about one-eighth. South Vietnam received \$5.3 million worth of corn for local currency, about the same as in 1970/71. Under long-term dollar credit, corn exports doubled to \$33 million with nearly one-half moving to South Korea and most of the remainder to the Philippines and Israel. Sorghum grain shipments, all to Israel, advanced to \$29 million, up 18 percent from a year earlier. Nearly \$11 million worth of feed grains, including corn and sorghum grain exported under Government-to-government arrangements, moved under Title II, P.L. 480.

Cotton.--Despite a 10-percent drop in export volume, higher average prices pushed the value of U.S. cotton exports in 1971/72 up 8 percent to \$530 million. Commercial sales accounted for all of the gain as P.L. 480 exports fell 7 percent to \$96 million. An \$8 million advance to \$64 million in long-term dollar credit shipments partially offset the \$15 million decline to \$32 million in sales for local currency. Major destination shifts in local currency cotton sales from a year earlier included a gain to South Vietnam and declines to South Korea and Taiwan. Under long-term credit, cotton shipments rose to South Korea and the Philippines, but shipments to India fell. No cotton moved under the Title II or AID programs.

Tobacco.--Exports under Government-financed programs, all under Title I, totaled \$23 million, or less than 4 percent of total U.S. tobacco shipments. A \$3 million gain in sales for local currency nearly offset the \$4 million decrease in long-term dollar credit sales. South Vietnam and Cambodia received tobacco for local currency. Long-term credit tobacco buyers included Khmer Republic (Cambodia), the Philippines, the Dominican Republic, Israel, Iceland, and Ecuador.

Oilseeds and products.--U.S. exports of oilseeds and products rose 7 percent to \$2.22 billion in 1971/72. About 6 percent moved under Government-financed programs. Sales of vegetable oils (mainly soybean oil) for local currency rose to \$11.2 million from \$1.8 million a year earlier. South Vietnam took \$11 million and Khmer Republic (Cambodia) the remainder. The Dominican Republic purchased \$1.3 million worth of cottonseed oil under the long-term dollar credit program. Meanwhile, sales of soybean oil under dollar credit arrangements fell to \$46 million from 1970/71's \$84 million; Pakistan, Morocco, and Tunisia were the principal recipients. Title II donations of soybean oil doubled to \$68 million.

U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS: COMMERCIAL AND UNDER GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS



Dairy products.--Large commercial exports of butter (mainly to the United Kingdom) advanced U.S. exports of dairy products to \$195 million, up nearly one-half from a year earlier. Moderate gains in nonfat dry milk, dry whole milk, and anhydrous milk fat exports more than offset a \$6 million drop in shipments of condensed and evaporated milk. South Vietnam received \$12 million worth of nonfat dry and condensed milk for local currency in 1971/72, a little less than in 1970/71. Government-to-government donations of nonfat dry milk dropped a third to \$25 million, while those by voluntary relief agencies increased nearly \$5 million to \$58 million.

Animals and animal products, except dairy products.--Exports in 1971/72 totaled \$816 million, up 6 percent from a year earlier; less than 4 percent moved under Government programs. About \$260,000 worth of inedible tallow moved under long-term dollar credit to the Dominican Republic. Inedible tallow, valued at \$28 million, moved under the Mutual Security (AID) program.

Fruits and vegetables and preparations.--U.S. exports of fruits and vegetables in 1971/72 total \$611 million, up 11 percent from a year earlier. All exports of fruits and vegetables were commercial sales for dollars in 1971/72.

Exports Under Supply-Type Barter Contracts and Credit Sales

Barter for overseas procurement for U.S. agencies.--Strengthening the U.S. balance of payments position is the objective of this program. The program involves the bartering of U.S. farm products to foreign countries in return for supplies and services

needed by U.S. agencies abroad. During 1971/72, these exports of cotton reached \$250 million and accounted for 47 percent of total U.S. cotton exports. Tobacco (\$201 million), wheat (\$128 million), feed grains (\$103 million), soybean and cottonseed oils (\$86 million), inedible tallow and grease (\$70 million), and rice (\$36 million) accounted for the record 1971/72 shipments under the supply-type barter program.

U.S. farm products moved to 129 countries under the barter program in 1971/72. Twelve leading barter markets each took about \$30-70 million and accounted for over half of the total value. The dozen included Japan, Republic of China (Taiwan), the United Kingdom, Canada, South Korea, West Germany, Italy, Egypt, Algeria, Brazil, Portugal, and Iran.

Exports under credit sales programs.--Exports under the CCC credit sales programs decreased 5 percent to \$372 million in 1971/72. This program makes credit available for up to 3 years to help lessen the difference between other U.S. commercial trade terms and the credit arrangements offered by the vigorous trade competitors of the United States.

Sales were financed under the CCC credit sales program to 39 countries. Largest shipments moved to Korea (cotton), Poland (corn), Republic of South Africa (rice), the Philippines (wheat), Yugoslavia (soybean oil), and the United Kingdom (tobacco).

Wheat sales financed under the program were down to \$115 million from \$125 million the year before. Soybean oil exports rose 19 percent to \$38 million and tobacco shipments declined to \$42 million from \$77 million. Cotton registered significant export gains.

Exports under Export-Import Bank loans and medium-term guarantees fell to \$86 million from \$97 million. Major markets under this program included: Japan (cotton), West Germany (tobacco), Israel (soybeans).

Area Review

U.S. exports of farm products advanced in 1971/72 to Canada, the Caribbean, Europe, Asia, and Africa, but declined to Central America, Australia, and Oceania. Shipments to Mexico and South America totaled virtually the same as in 1970/71 (table). Europe accounted for nearly three-fifths of the total gain, but exports to Asia rose by \$69 million to \$2.8 billion, and equaled just over one-third of the U.S. total. In 1971/72, Africa took U.S. farm products valued at \$322 million, up \$32 million or 11 percent from 1970/71.

U.S. farm exports under specified Government-financed programs rose slightly to Asia, Central America, and the Caribbean area, but declined to South America, Europe, and Africa.



U.S. FARM EXPORTS TO 50 LARGEST MARKETS, 1971/72

The United States exported \$8.05 billion worth of farm products to 165 countries in 1971/72, but 15 countries received 69 percent of the total (table 17). U.S. farm exports to the 50 major markets listed in table 24 amounted to \$7.51 billion or 93 percent of the exports to all countries. Shipments of farm commodities to the 50 individual countries ranged from \$1.16 billion worth to Japan to \$22 million worth to Greece. Agricultural exports to 21 countries exceeded the \$100 million mark and 11 others exceeded the \$50 million level.

Shipments of farm products to the European Community (EC) accounted for the largest single share of total U.S. agricultural exports. In 1971/72, the EC took a record \$1.89 billion worth -- 7 percent above the previous year. The six-country EC total was nearly a fourth of all U.S. farm exports. The Netherlands edged out West Germany to become the largest market among EC countries, accounting for \$616 million. It was the second largest market for U.S. oilseeds and feed grains and was a leading outlet for protein meal, fruits, vegetables, meats, nuts, and tobacco. West Germany was the top outlet for U.S. protein meal, nuts, and poultry meat. Italy's principal purchases were feed grains, oilseeds, protein meal, tobacco, cotton, animal fats, and hides. France was an important market for protein meal, oilseeds, meats, fruits, cotton, and nuts while Belgium-Luxembourg took large shipments of oilseeds, protein meal, tobacco, feed grains, and meats.

For the third consecutive year, Japan's purchases of U.S. farm commodities exceeded the billion-dollar level. Leading all other outlets for U.S. oilseeds, animal fats, wheat, feed grains, cotton, and hides and skins, and ranking second or third for tobacco, fruits and preparations, meats (excluding poultry meat), poultry meat, and nuts and preparations, Japan took \$1.16 billion worth of our farm products, 4 percent less than a year earlier. Shipments to Japan accounted for a fourth of total U.S. oilseed exports, nearly a fifth of the feed grains, and 21 percent of U.S. cotton exports in 1971/72.

Farm product shipments to Canada advanced slightly to \$805 million, including U.S. grain and oilseed exports transshipped through Canadian ports. Canada remained our top foreign outlet for fruits, vegetables, and meats and a major market for cotton, protein meal, vegetable oils, rice, hides, and nuts. As usual, large quantities of the oilseeds, wheat, and feed grains reported as exports to Canada were transshipped to other countries.

Of the 50 leading markets in 1971/72, 31 increased their purchases over the year before. Largest gains, after the USSR, were registered for the Netherlands, Italy, Bangladesh, Spain, Iran, Pakistan, and Peru. Exports dropped in 1971/72 to the other 19 markets, with Yugoslavia, Japan, the United Kingdom, Belgium-Luxembourg, and Brazil showing the largest declines.

Transshipments through Canada, Netherlands, and Belgium

The estimated quantity and value by commodity of U.S. farm products originally reported to the Bureau of the Census as destined for Canada, the Netherlands, and Belgium, but which were actually transshipped through the ports of those countries and ultimately arrived for use in other countries, are shown in tables 21 through 23.

The statistics on exports by country of destination are significantly changed in some cases by the transshipment adjustments. As shown in table 20, after adjustments for transshipments, 1971/72 U.S. farm exports to EC totaled \$1.84 billion, down nearly 2 percent from the year-earlier level. After adjustments, West Germany was the largest market among EC countries, accounting for \$678 million in 1971/72. The Netherlands ranked second with purchases of \$467 million, while Italy continued in third place with \$308 million. France and Italy made significantly larger purchases of U.S. farm products in 1971/72, but exports to the other EC countries were off somewhat from a year earlier.

U.S. farm exports to Canada after transshipment adjustments, as shown in table 20, totaled \$660 million in 1971/72. This was a fifth higher than the 1970/71 adjusted exports. After transshipment adjustments, U.S. agricultural exports to Japan totaled \$1,183 million in 1971/72.

Included among the countries whose farm trade statistics for 1971/72 were most affected by the transshipment adjustments were West Germany, Canada, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, France, the USSR, Spain, Japan, and Belgium-Luxembourg.



U.S. FARM EXPORTS TO COMECON UP SHARPLY

Shipments of U.S. farm commodities to the COMECON area accelerated slowly for 3 years, but advanced rapidly in recent months, primarily because of Soviet grain purchases. U.S. agricultural exports to COMECON members during the July-September quarter 1972 totaled \$193 million, including \$13 million transshipped through Canadian ports, compared with \$37 million in corresponding months last year. The USSR purchased \$150 million against only \$3 million in July-September 1971. Wheat, feed grains, and soybeans accounted for most of the increase in farm products exported.

The COMECON area -- Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, Poland, Romania, and the USSR -- is a potentially large market for U.S. agricultural exports. Import needs vary widely, however, due to erratic weather. The COMECON countries purchased \$305 million in U.S. products, or less than 4 percent of the record U.S. agricultural exports in 1971/72. A relatively large feed grain purchase raised Soviet imports of U.S. farm commodities to a record \$158 million. Nearly 3 million metric tons of corn, barley, and oats valued at \$147 million moved to the USSR between November 1971 and June 1972, as part of a long-term program to increase Russian meat production.

The previous post war record for U.S. agricultural exports to the USSR amounted to \$134 million in 1963/64 following drought damage. Wheat accounted for \$115 million during that year. A shipping agreement in 1963 required half of U.S. grain exports to move on U.S.-flag vessels, which limited further shipments until the requirement was removed in mid-1971. Bumper crops in the United States in 1970/71 also made export grain available at relatively low prices.

Agricultural products are the most important component of U.S. exports to the COMECON. These accounted for 63 percent of total exports to the area in 1971/72 against 46 percent a year earlier. Total exports to the area were \$484 million in 1971/72 and \$389 million a year earlier. In contrast, U.S. imports from the COMECON area are chiefly nonagricultural. Total imports from the area were \$232 million in 1971/72 and \$217 million the previous year. Of this total, only 30 percent were farm products.

For the coming fiscal year, U.S. exports of farm products to the USSR may accelerate to more than \$1 billion due to poor Soviet crop production. Wheat shipments could rise to 10 million tons, corn to 5 million tons, and soybeans to 1 million tons. Strains on transportation facilities could limit the amount moved because of the magnitude of grain purchases. Monthly shipments for the first quarter (July-September) of 1972/73 were as follows:

U.S. agricultural exports in this report include transshipments through Canadian ports. Shipments by country show a considerable amount of wheat, barley, oats, and soybeans moving to Canada which are subsequently reshipped from St. Lawrence Seaway locations. Thus, official Census Bureau data overstate exports to Canada, while those to many other countries including the COMECON area are understated. Adjustments to U.S. export data are based on Canadian Grain Commission volume data published by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in Grain Market News.



International Price Highlights

SELECTED PRICE SERIES OF INTERNATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

Few post war periods have experienced as sharp a rise in commodity prices as the present one. Reuter's Commodity Price Index, with 81 percent of its weighting pertaining to agricultural commodities, climbed from 599 on September 1, 1972, to a record high of 636 as of September 29, and averaged 612 during the month (see figure 4). It continued to climb and reached 663 on October 24. The September average was 4.3 percent above the August average and 20 percent above a year earlier. The Dow-Jones spot index, made up entirely of agricultural commodity prices in U.S. markets, averaged 168 in September, also 20 percent higher than a year ago but only 1.1 percent above August.

U.S. wholesale prices of farm products averaged only 0.3 percent above August but 16.4 percent above a year ago, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Similarly, the index of all prices received by U.S. farmers was 15.3 percent above a year ago and 0.3 percent above August. Crops and crop products, which dominate U.S. agricultural exports, were priced 13 percent above a year ago, but were only fractionally above August.

Of the commodities shown in table 31, only cotton was lower priced in September than a year earlier and cotton, imported cow meat, coffee, and sugar destined for the United States were the only items lower priced than in August.

Wheat prices rose by far the most. The buyer's price of U.S. No. 2 Hard Winter wheat in Gulf ports averaged \$2.14 a bushel (\$78.54 a metric ton), up 24 percent from August and 30 percent from a year earlier. The seller's price was \$2.31 a bushel (\$84.79 a metric ton) 13 percent more than in August and 37 percent more than a year earlier. Since September 22, the export subsidy has been set at zero. Thus, the buyer's price rose to the level of the seller's price and averaged \$2.31 a bushel through October.

The export price of Canadian Western Red Spring wheat, in store at lake heads, normally exceeds the buyer's price for U.S. No. 2 Hard Winter wheat in Gulf ports; but in September it was quoted at (Can\$) \$2.10, 18 percent above August and 21 percent above a year ago. On a c.i.f. U.K. basis, that type of Canadian wheat was U.S. \$92.39 a metric ton, also 18 percent higher than in August and about 21 percent above a year ago. At that location it was \$8.16 a metric ton more than U.S. Hard Winter wheat, a differential about in line with the average differential of \$8.36 during September 1971-August 1972.

An unusually low freight differential for U.S. Hard Winter wheat between Gulf and U.K. ports \$5.69 a metric ton made it possible that such wheat could be traded on a c.i.f. U.K. basis at its customary discount below Canadian wheat.

U.S. Hard Winter wheat, c.i.f. U.K., was quoted at \$84.23, 23 percent above August and 20 percent above a year ago. That price was virtually the same as that of Australian wheat. These two types of wheat have been quoted at virtually the same prices since the beginning of 1972. (February through August quotations showing higher prices for Australian wheat in past issues of FATUS are revised in this issue.)

September corn and sorghum grain prices were also strong, increasing 9 percent over August quotations on a c.i.f. U.K. basis. On a Gulf port basis, U.S. No. 3 yellow corn was 6 percent higher than in August and 19 percent above a year earlier. The c.i.f. U.K. quotations for Argentine corn and for sorghum grain of either U.S. or Argentine origin transshipped from Rotterdam were similarly 21 and 18 percent, respectively, above a year earlier; but the c.i.f. U.K. quotation for U.S. No. 3 yellow corn was only 14 percent higher than a year ago, the apparent result of a favorable freight differential between Gulf and U.K. ports. These freight differentials were around or above \$10 a metric ton during the last 4 months of 1971, but substantially less in recent months.

The price of soybeans, c.i.f. U.K., rose to \$142.80 a metric ton, 2.5 percent above August and 10 percent above a year earlier. The price of soybean meal, c.i.f. Rotterdam, climbed to \$130.62 a metric ton, 4 percent above August and one-third higher than a year ago. Both soybean and soybean meal prices rose further in October, after the estimate of U.S. soybean production was boosted 2 percent to 1.317 billion bushels in the October Crop Report.

The September export price of Thai rice averaged fractionally above August, but rose additionally in early October. The c.i.f. Liverpool price of American cotton dropped for the sixth successive month; at 31.33 cents a pound it was 4 percent below August and 11 percent below a year ago. U.S. cotton production is now estimated 13.7 million bales, slightly more than the preceding estimate and about one-third above the 1971 and 1970 crops. The price of imported cow meat dropped for the third successive month to 66.78 cents a pound but was only 4 percent below its June peak. The coffee price was 4 percent below its more recent peak, but 35 percent above a year earlier.

The world free-market sugar price has been on the rise again. Averaging 7.06 cents a pound in September, it returned to the level prevailing in April-May. The world sugar price this year has been well above the range of the preceding 7 years.

Sugar destined for the U.S. market, f.o.b. and stowed in Caribbean ports, at 8.22 cents a pound, was the near peak August level. It exceeded the world market price by 1.16 cents. This magnitude of the "quota premium" for U.S.-bound sugar compared with 1.94 cents in August. Freight costs from the Caribbean to the U.S. Northeast, insurance, and unloading charges have risen to .545 cent a pound compared with .465 cent in August and .435 cent in January-February. Thus, the raw sugar price, c.i.f. New York, unloaded and duty-paid, averaged 9.39 cents and was at its highest level since 1963, and slightly above the price objective of the Sugar Act. As amended in October 1971, the Sugar Act contains a price objective of 8.55 cents a pound for the 12-month period ended in August 1971. The price objective moves with the average change of the parity index and the wholesale price index. That average change amounted to an increase of 7.5 percent in September; but the sugar price was 9.8 percent above the base price objective. The actual price was thus 2.1 percent above the price objective and 9.6 percent above a year earlier.

The New York rubber price continued its steady rise above the April low point of 16.5 cents a pound. At 18.3 cents, the September price was 11 percent above that trough and 2 percent above a year earlier.

The New York spot price of cocoa beans from Accra (Ghana) averaged 36.3 cents a pound in September and rose further to 39 cents during the first half of October, the highest levels in 2 years. The price rose despite an outlook for about the same world production during the year beginning October 1972 as during the year just ended -- 1.55 million tons. Prospective declines in the crop of several of the leading African producing countries, although offset by prospective production increases in many other producing countries, have created some excitement in the trade. A world cocoa agreement was recently negotiated under the auspices of the United Nations Conference for Trade and

Development (UNCTAD). It aims at a price range of 23-32 cents a pound, c.i.f. principal importing countries. The agreement will soon be open for signature. It would become effective if producers and consumers accounting for 70 percent of world imports sign. With the United States accounting for 25 percent of such imports and not participating, the agreement may not become effective.





Export Highlights

RECORD U.S. FARM EXPORTS IN JULY-SEPTEMBER 1972

U.S. exports of farm products during the July-September quarter rose 11 percent over the year-earlier record to \$2.08 billion. Grain exports, up by two-fifths, accounted for the bulk of the increase. Other gains occurred for cattle hides, meats, poultry meat, fruits, vegetables, and flaxseed. However, exports of soybeans, soybean products, and cotton were sharply lower because of reduced supplies available for export.

Demand has been especially buoyant. The USSR has been buying large quantities of agri-feed grain exports have risen rapidly because of reduced supplies available from Argentina and Australia. In recent months, economic growth has improved in Japan, Canada, and most of Western Europe. Industrial production is expected to advance by 5 percent in Japan, about 3 percent in Western Europe, and 4 percent in Canada during July-December 1972.

Grains and preparations.--Exports rose by over two-fifths to \$926 million in July-September. Shipments of feed grains, wheat, and rice all expanded with sales of feed grains -- up two-thirds from a year earlier -- increasing most in value. The overall value of feed grain shipments rose to \$445 million compared with only \$259 million a year earlier, and the quantity nearly doubled to 8.3 million metric tons. Reduced supplies and limited handling capacity in other major feed grain export areas caused importers to buy more from the United States. Corn accounted for most of the increase and totaled 269 million bushels compared with the year-earlier 145 million bushels. Grain sorghum exports advanced to \$63 million from \$41 million.

Japanese purchases totaling 1.7 million metric tons, accounted for most of the gain. A year before, U.S. exports to Japan were held to 1.1 million metric tons, hampered by limited feed grain supplies available for export, and the longshoremen's strike at the West Coast. Other big markets for U.S. corn this July-September included the USSR, the European Community (EC), Spain, Republic of China (Taiwan), Romania, and Yugoslavia.

Exports of wheat and products in July-September advanced to 214 million bushels from 164 million a year earlier. Demand for U.S. wheat is especially strong this year, with substantial purchases by the USSR and Eastern Europe. The USSR has purchased over 400 million bushels of U.S. wheat for delivery in 1972/73. Exports to Japan also are up sharply this year. A year ago, shipments to this market were somewhat lower, in part because of the longshoremen's strike at West Coast ports. Because of poor crops, Mexico purchased 9.0 million bushels of wheat in July-September, compared with 2.2 million a year ago. In recent years, Mexico has exported about 3 million bushels of wheat annually. Australia's wheat production is expected to decline sharply. Argentine production is likely to be up by 2 million tons, but the harvest will not be completed until next January. Canada is exporting wheat as fast as internal grain transport capacity permits. Although the EC had a record 1972 grain crop, wet weather during harvest season has reduced overall quality. The EC may import more U.S. wheat for blending with local wheat. U.S. wheat exports gained to all areas in July-September. Top outlets were USSR, Japan, Pakistan, Yugoslavia, Mexico, Bangladesh, Venezuela, United Kingdom, Republic of China (Taiwan), Philippines and

Indonesia. Exports to Turkey were down substantially because of sharply increased Turkish wheat production, and shipments to India and Brazil also declined.

U.S. rice exports increased to 11 million bags in July-September 1972, compared with 7 million bags a year earlier, and value was up about two-fifths to \$91 million. Reduced rice production, especially in Thailand and Burma, has reduced world exportable supplies. The principal outlets for U.S. rice were Korea, Vietnam, Indonesia, Bangladesh, and Philippines.

Soybeans and products.--U.S. exports started the new fiscal year at a slow pace falling 28 percent from a year earlier this July-September, due to limited old-crop stocks. Declines occurred in exports of soybeans, soybean meal, and soybean oil, primarily to our top markets in Western Europe and Japan. Exports a year earlier were unusually heavy in anticipation of a longshoremen's strike. In July-September, soybean exports totaled 65 million bushels, down from 95 million a year earlier. Because of high prices, value declined only 25 percent to \$229 million.

Exports are expected to advance by nearly one-fifth to a new record during the present fiscal year. Reasons for the increase in U.S. soybean exports include the continued advance in livestock production in Western Europe, Canada, and Japan; the purchase of 1 million tons of soybeans by the USSR; the sharply reduced production of fish meal in Peru; and reduced supplies of other protein meals.

U.S. exports of oil cake and meal totaled 960,000 tons in July-September compared with 1.3 million a year ago. Again, limited supplies available were the primary reason for the decline. Demand expanded sharply and price increased to \$105 per ton from \$90 a year earlier. Western Europe was the most important foreign outlet for U.S. soybean meal, but Mexico, Canada, and East European countries were also good markets.

U.S. exports of soybean oil totaled 258 million pounds, down sharply from the 432 million a year earlier. Demand for U.S. soybean oil has slipped because of the gain in world supplies of fats and oils and the increasing quantities of soybean oil available from the crushing of U.S. soybeans by European processors. Exports of cottonseed oil declined to 105 million pounds in July-September from 110 million a year earlier. Increased supplies at attractive prices should encourage Europeans and others to purchase more cottonseed oil this year. In Western Europe, cottonseed oil is replacing sunflower oil, formerly available from the USSR and Eastern Europe.

In July-September, linseed oil exports advanced to 77 million pounds from 14 million, and flaxseed to 4 million bushels from 4,000. U.S. supplies are plentiful while supplies are down elsewhere, especially in Argentina. The USSR, Western Europe, and Poland were top markets for these products.

Fruits and vegetables.--Exports showed a two-fifths gain. Combined exports of fruits and vegetables hit a record \$166 million, sharply above \$115 million a year earlier. Most of the increase centered around fresh products. Exports of fruits and preparations rose by about \$40 million to \$121 million. Shipments of fresh citrus products, especially lemons, limes, oranges, and grapefruit, rose in July-September 1972. Other increases occurred for pears and grapes. Citrus exports benefited from plentiful U.S. supplies and from devaluation of the dollar and realignment of other currencies which made export prices attractive. Exports of dried fruits gained also, especially prunes. The unit value of raisins was up sharply because of limited production due to frost damage. Although small 1972 production was a limiting factor, exports of canned fruits doubled to \$16 million. Increases occurred for canned peaches, fruit cocktail, cherries, and pineapples. Exports of fruit juices also advanced, with grapefruit and orange juices leading the pack. Higher personal incomes in the major markets, increased supplies of fresh citrus, and competitive prices have stimulated U.S. exports.

July-September exports of vegetables and preparations rose about a third to \$45 million. Again, fresh products accounted for nearly all of the increase. These included lettuce, potatoes, and tomatoes. Canada continued to be the principal market, but increasing amounts moved to Western Europe and Japan as incomes increased and transportation and handling facilities improved.

Exports of nuts and preparations rose to \$16 million from \$10 million. Almonds accounted for most of the increase, but shipments of walnuts and other nuts also gained. Larger almond harvests and competitive prices have made the United States the leading almond exporter.

Animals and animal products.--Exports gained one-sixth to \$251 million. A substantial gain in hide exports was equivalent to the overall increase for this group. Exports of meats and products advanced a fourth in July-September, with beef, pork, and variety meats making large gains. Exports of animal fats and greases, on the other hand, fell more in value than in quantity. Increased world production of fats and oils has depressed current prices. Production of animal fats rose in Western Europe, a principal market for U.S. animal fats and oils. Exports of lard fell sharply both in quantity and value because of reduced shipments to the United Kingdom.

Exports of dairy products totaled \$29 million in July-September 1972, dropping from \$39 million in 1971. Butter and nonfat dry milk accounted for the decline. Exports of condensed and evaporated milk gained slightly. In recent years, about 80 percent of the exports of nonfat dry milk have moved under Government-financed programs. U.S. butter exports to the United Kingdom in 1971 were unusually large because of limited quantities from New Zealand and Europe. Since Europe and New Zealand now have exportable supplies, U.S. shipments fell precipitously during July-September.

U.S. exports of poultry and products advanced slightly to \$22 million for the quarter. Exports of turkey parts to EC gained by a fifth. Lower U.S. prices boosted exports of eggs and products by about \$1 million, exports of young whole chickens declined somewhat.

Tobacco.--Exports in July-September totaled 134 million pounds, down from last year's 169 million. Value totaled \$142 million, also less, although the unit value increased to about \$1.06 a pound compared with slightly more than \$1 a pound. Exports in July-September 1971 were unusually high in anticipation of a longshoremen's strike on the East Coast. Exports early in this fiscal year have followed a more nearly normal seasonal pattern. The decline in July-September occurred primarily for Maryland tobacco. Flue-cured tobacco decreased slightly. Competition from expanded exports by developing countries has increased in European markets. At the same time, there has been increased use of filter cigarettes, which require less tobacco per unit. Uncertainty concerning the future role of Rhodesia as a tobacco exporter has caused many importers to purchase U.S. tobacco only for current needs. European countries continued to maintain their tobacco stocks at relatively low levels.

Cotton.--U.S. exports slowed to 251,000 running bales in July-September 1972 compared with 686,000 bales a year earlier. Large exports during the past year, following 2 years of relatively low output, have nearly depleted U.S. cotton stocks. With U.S. production up 3 million bales in 1972, more cotton will be available for export, but demand is not as strong as a year ago when world production was off sharply. Although foreign production has increased substantially in 1972, the unit value of cotton exported in July-September rose to \$166 a bale from \$151 a year earlier because current exports were from last year's crop, which sells at a higher price than the freshly harvested product.



Import Highlights

U.S. AGRICULTURAL IMPORTS, JULY-SEPTEMBER 1972

Agricultural imports into United States during the first quarter of 1972/73 amounted to \$1.58 billion, 7 percent less than a year earlier. The July-September total last year was unusually high as importers increased their purchases in anticipation of port strikes. Imports last September reached a record \$651 million before dropping to \$303 million in October. September agricultural imports were substantially below last year's level at \$547 million. July-September agricultural imports rose slightly above the April-June quarter instead of declining.

Competitive or "supplementary" farm product imports advanced slightly in July-September from a year ago, due mainly to larger inflows of meat, cheese, fruits and vegetables, and some oilbearing materials. Fresh and frozen beef imports gained 17 percent to 416 million pounds while higher prices pushed value up 26 percent to nearly \$244 million; fresh and frozen mutton moved up more than three-fourths to 30 million pounds valued at \$10 million. Both items benefited from the suspension of voluntary restraint levels.

Among the fruits, gains for apples, oranges, and canned pineapple more than offset reductions in fruit juices and strawberries. Sharp increases in copra and palm oil purchases and higher olive oil prices raised the oilbearing-import category 21 percent to \$49 million. For sugar, wine, and tobacco, imports were substantially below last year's levels.

Noncompetitive or "complementary" agricultural imports were down 19 percent from a year ago to \$540 million. Except for bananas, plantains, roasted or ground coffee, and raw silk, all complementary commodities were lower.

Inventory accumulation in advance of strike activity at East Coast and Gulf ports accounted for the high import level last year.



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Explanatory Note

U.S. foreign agricultural trade statistics in this report include official U.S. data based on compilations of the Bureau of the Census. Agricultural commodities consist of (1) nonmarine food products and (2) other products of agriculture which have not passed through complex processes of manufacture such as raw hides and skins, fats and oils, and wine. Such manufactured products as textiles, leather, boots and shoes, cigarettes, naval stores, forestry products, and distilled alcoholic beverages are not considered agricultural.

The trade statistics exclude shipments between the 50 States and Puerto Rico, between the 50 States and the island possessions, between Puerto Rico and the island possessions, among the island possessions, and in transit through the United States from one foreign country to another when documented as such through U.S. Customs.

EXPORTS The export statistics also exclude shipments to the U.S. armed forces and diplomatic missions abroad for their own use and supplies for vessels and planes engaged in foreign trade. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are not compiled by commodity and are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall export totals in this report. The agricultural export statistics include shipments under P.L. 83-480 (Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act), and related laws; under P.L. 87-195 (Act for International Development); and involving Government payments to exporters. (USDA payments are excluded from the export value.) Separate statistics on Government program exports are compiled by USDA from data obtained from operating agencies.

The export value, the value at the port of exportation, is based on the selling price (or cost if not sold) and includes inland freight, insurance, and other charges to the port. The country of destination is the country of ultimate destination or where the commodities are to be consumed, further processed, or manufactured. When the shipper does not know the ultimate destination, the shipments are credited to the last country, as known to him at the time of shipment from the United States, to which the commodities are to be shipped in their present form. Except for Canada, export shipments valued at \$251-\$499 are included on the basis of sampling estimates; shipments to Canada valued at \$251-\$1,999 are sampled.


IMPORTS Imports for consumption are a combination of entries for immediate consumption and withdrawals from warehouses for consumption. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are estimated on the basis of a 1-percent sample and are not compiled by commodity. They are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall import totals in this report.

The import value, defined generally as the market value in the foreign country, excludes import duties, ocean freight, and marine insurance. The country of origin is defined as the country where the commodities were grown or processed. When the country of origin is not known, the imports are credited to the country of shipment.

Imports similar to agricultural commodities produced commercially in the United States and others that are interchangeable in use to any significant extent with such U.S. commodities are supplementary or partly competitive. All other commodities are complementary or noncompetitive.

Further explanatory material on foreign trade statistics and compilation procedures of the Bureau of the Census is contained in the publications of that agency.

Indexes of U.S. Exports and Imports by Economic Class: 1919 to 1971



The Bureau of the Census presents an up-dated version of "Index Numbers of the United States Exports and Imports 1919 to 1971." This new publication contains selected annual data compiled by the U.S. Department of Commerce on U.S. foreign trade since 1919 and quarterly since 1958. In addition to statistics of dollar values, three types of index numbers are presented. These are unit value (price), quantity, and (total) value indexes.

All commodities in U.S. export and import trade have been grouped into one of five economic classes as follows:

Crude foods—Products for edible use (by man or animals) which have not been substantially processed after sale by the farmer, fisherman, rancher, or other primary producer.

Manufactured foods—Processed forms of crude foods, edible and refined oils, and oilcake and meal.

Crude materials—Products of farms, forests, fisheries, and mines which are for nonfood use and which are unprocessed by manufacturing.

Semimanufactures—Manufactured materials in the early stages of processing.

Finished manufactures—Highly processed bulk materials and products manufactured from semimanufactures or other finished products.

For recent years and quarters, this informative publication also contains data for "manufactured goods." This grouping includes commodities which, according to the Standard International Trade Classification of the United Nations, are classified as chemicals, manufactured goods grouped chiefly by material, machinery, transport equipment, and miscellaneous manufactured articles.

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
