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
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

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

Digest

U.S. Agricultural Exports to the Enlarged European Community (see p. 7). Fiscal 1974 U.S. agricultural exports to the EC were valued at \$5.3 billion, of which \$1.6 billion comprised commodities under variable levies. Shipments of variable-levy commodities were 70 percent above the fiscal 1973 value, while exports of commodities not under the variable-levy system rose 40 percent. Higher prices, particularly for grains, were the primary cause of the increases. Feed grain exports to the EC rose 82 percent to \$1.3 billion; wheat and wheat flour exports rose 27 percent to \$223 million. Exports of oilseeds and oilseed products increased 52 percent in value, to \$2.3 billion. Tobacco sales to the EC were up 18 percent to total \$388 million.

U.S. Agricultural Import Value Up More Than 50 Percent In Last 5 Years (see p. 27). Largely because of rapid price increases, U.S. agricultural imports advanced to \$9.55 billion in fiscal 1974 from \$4.93 billion in fiscal 1969. All regional areas and nearly all country suppliers shipped more farm products to the U.S. market.

U.S. Agricultural Import Summary, Fiscal 1974 (see p. 45). Higher prices raised the value of U.S. agricultural imports by 30 percent to \$9.55 billion in fiscal 1974. Although the United States is the world's second largest importer of agricultural products, we import less on a per capita basis than many other countries. Agricultural imports rose less rapidly than nonagricultural purchases, and thus accounted for less than 12 percent of total imports.

Selected Price Series of International Significance (see p. 50). In October the Dow-Jones commodity index hit a new high of 393 and the Reuter's commodity index


rose to 1,242 as foreign buyers purchased grain and oilseeds, and as pressures mounted on the short world sugar supply. Wheat, soybean, and soybean meal prices gained and corn prices reached a new record--\$152 a ton at the U.S. Gulf ports. Rice and cotton prices softened during October. Among import commodities, sugar prices began to spiral, and coffee and cocoa bean prices advanced. In contrast, cowmeat and rubber prices declined.

U.S. Farm Exports Hit a Record \$6.2 Billion During July-October 1974. U.S. agricultural exports in the first 4 months of fiscal 1975 were 5 percent higher than in the comparable months a year earlier. October 1974 exports, at \$1.71 billion, were fractionally below the year-earlier level. Higher prices during July-October remained the source of all value gains. Sharp volume declines, ranging from 5 to 31 percent, continued to occur for all major export commodity groups except fruits and vegetables and vegetable oils and oilseeds. Cotton registered the sharpest volume decrease from July-October 1973.

Farm Product Imports Gain Nearly One-Fourth in July-October (see p. 89). Higher prices, especially for sugar, raised the value of U.S. agricultural imports to \$3.24 billion during the first 4 months of fiscal year 1975. Sugar volume advanced about 22 percent above the year-earlier level, while rapidly increasing prices resulted in a sugar import value gain of more than 154 percent, and making sugar the largest single item in value terms. Other volume advances occurred for cotton, tobacco, grains and preparations, and vegetable oils. Competitive farm product imports jumped 29 percent to \$2.36 billion, while noncompetitive items were only slightly higher at \$886 million.



U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS TO THE ENLARGED EUROPEAN COMMUNITY

U.S. agricultural exports to the enlarged European Community (EC) rose 48 percent in value in fiscal 1974 to total \$5.3 billion. The EC's share of U.S. farm exports, however, dropped to 25 percent from 28 percent in fiscal 1973 and 29 percent in fiscal 1969. 2/

The United States had a positive trade balance with the European Community of \$2.1 billion, compared with \$32 million in fiscal 1973 and a deficit of \$297 million in fiscal 1972. As indicated below, the U.S. trade balance with the EC has improved for both agricultural and nonagricultural commodities:

Variable-Levy Commodities

U.S. exports to the EC of commodities subject to variable levies totaled \$1.6 billion in fiscal 1974, up from \$955 million in the prior year because of higher prices. The

higher prices also caused the EC's variable levies on grains to become inoperable. In August 1973, world grain prices outstripped the EC minimum import prices, causing the EC to apply an export tax to prevent an outward flow of grain stocks. Fiscal 1974 U.S. grain sales to the EC rose 72 percent in value to total \$1.5 billion, while volume remained at about the 1973 level.

U.S. feed grain exports to the EC were up 82 percent in value, to \$1,246 million, and 10 percent in quantity, to 11.5 million tons. During fiscal 1974, feed grains were the best buy for livestock feed in the EC. There was a marked trend away from using wheat for animal feed, and in February the EC removed the subsidy on denaturing wheat for food.

EC purchases of U.S. wheat and wheat flour in fiscal 1974 came to \$223 million, 27 percent higher than fiscal 1973 purchases. This increase in value reflects the large price increases; the quantity of wheat sales declined 40 percent to 1.5 million tons. The EC is a net exporter of wheat; durum wheat is imported to supplement the European soft wheat in baking.

Higher prices caused U.S. rice exports to the EC to reach a record \$78 million, double the fiscal 1973 level. The quantity shipped in fiscal 1974 declined slightly to 165,374 tons.

U.S. poultry exports to the EC were valued at \$28 million in fiscal 1974, 58 percent above the year-earlier level, and the highest value since fiscal 1966. Turkey sales, at \$20 million and comprising 70 percent of the poultry exports, were up 69 percent in value and 24 percent in volume. There is a strong European demand for U.S. turkey products, as demonstrated by this expansion despite the high levies. Fiscal 1974 exports of eggs to the EC were up 69 percent in value.

Nonvariable-Levy Commodities

Exports of nonvariable-levy commodities, at \$3.7 billion in fiscal 1974, were up 40 percent from 1973 and comprised about 70 percent of all U.S. farm exports to the EC. Value increases were registered for all leading items except cotton and hides and skins.

Oilseeds and oilseed products accounted for three-quarters of the increase, as higher prices pushed the value of these sales to \$2.3 billion from \$1.5 billion in fiscal 1973. Soybeans made up 65 percent of the total value of oilseeds and products exported to the EC in fiscal 1974; \$1.5 billion worth were sold, 55 percent above the fiscal 1973 value. The volume of soybean exports increased 12 percent to 6.7 million tons. Oil cake and meal exports rose by 52 percent to \$645 million, although the quantity decreased slightly. Shipments of vegetable oils increased 17 percent in value to \$52 million, while the volume declined by almost two-fifths.

U.S. tobacco exports to the EC totaled \$388 million in fiscal 1974, up from \$328 million in 1973. The quantity exported rose 11 percent. The EC took almost half of U.S. tobacco exports in fiscal 1974, a smaller portion than in prior years. The United Kingdom remained the largest market, making purchases of \$147 million. Sales to the Netherlands and Italy rose the most. The sales increase demonstrated the strength of the EC market for U.S. tobacco despite trade barriers. The EC has granted preferential tariffs to developing countries producing tobacco and has established subsidies to encourage production at home. Further, U.S. tobacco is the most expensive on the world market and thus is susceptible to export market declines.

Our exports of fruits and preparations to the EC were valued at \$126 million in fiscal 1974, compared with \$103 million in fiscal 1973. Dried fruits accounted for 82 percent of this increase, advancing 74 percent in value and 46 percent in volume. Sales of fruit juices to the EC also increased in value and volume. Canned fruit exports rose in value because of higher prices, but the quantity declined. Shipments of fresh fruits declined 12 percent in value and 13 percent in volume in fiscal 1974. Exports of lemons and limes were less than three-fourths of the 1973 volume; exports of apples only one-tenth of the 1973 volume.

The value of U.S. cotton sales to the EC declined 7 percent in fiscal 1974 to \$105 million; volume was down 39 percent. However, exports remained well above the low levels of recent years. Higher oil prices have made cotton more competitive with manmade fibers.

Fiscal 1974 exports of corn byproducts, primarily corn gluten feed, to the EC rose 28 percent in value (to \$89 million), but volume declined slightly. Tight U.S. supplies made these byproducts a less economical livestock feed.

Exports of vegetables and preparations to the EC totaled \$77 million, compared with \$52 million in fiscal 1973. The increase was concentrated in exports of pulses (dried beans and peas), which made up 65 percent of vegetable sales to the EC. Pulse exports rose in value despite a volume decrease of over one-tenth. Exports of canned and fresh vegetables increased in value; exports of hops declined.

Exports of nuts and preparations to the EC increased 86 percent to reach \$73 million, with most of the gain due to higher prices. Almost one-half of our exports of nuts and preparations went to the EC in fiscal 1974, compared with less than one-fourth in fiscal 1969, when shipments to the EC were \$5.5 million. Shelled almonds comprised 66 percent and unshelled walnuts 16 percent of fiscal 1974 nut sales to the EC. Shipments of shelled almonds more than doubled in value, while volume increased 15 percent. Exports of unshelled walnuts rose 128 percent in value, and almost half of this was due to an increase in quantity.

EC purchases of hides and skins from the United States declined 11 percent from the fiscal 1973 high of \$108 million to \$96 million. However, the value was well above that of any prior years. Furskin exports increased 36 percent, partially offsetting declines in exports of cattle and other hides.

Our exports of variety meats to the EC equaled \$95 million in fiscal 1974, compared with \$84 million in fiscal 1973. The volume of sales declined slightly.

Sales of U.S. inedible tallow to the EC rose 112 percent in fiscal 1974 to \$94 million, but the volume of tallow exports was up only slightly. Tallow has become a more competitive energy source; however, the EC has increased tariffs and restricted its import.

Imports of many nonvariable commodities are taxed or controlled. When import prices of fruits and vegetables fall below EC reference prices, compensatory taxes are imposed. Tallow and variety meats were included in the EC ban on meat product imports.



U.S. AGRICULTURAL IMPORT VALUE UP MORE THAN 50 PERCENT IN LAST 5 YEARS

Between fiscal years 1969 and 1974, U.S. agricultural imports advanced 52 percent to \$9.55 billion. Value gains ranged from 4 percent in fiscal 1971 to 30 percent in fiscal 1974. Most of the increase reflected higher commodity prices.

Over 93 percent of our farm product imports came from 50 countries in fiscal 1974. All regional areas and nearly all countries stepped up their shipments to U.S. importers (tables 23 and 24).

Latin American countries account for the largest share of U.S. agricultural imports. This share has declined slowly over the last 5 years, however, because more products have been imported from Western Europe, Oceania, Africa, and Asia. Much of the coffee, cocoa, sugar, meat, fruits, and vegetables imports are supplied by Latin American countries. Members of the Latin American Free Trade Area shipped one-fourth of the agricultural import total in fiscal 1974, down slightly from 27 percent in fiscal 1969. Central American Common Market countries supplied 6 percent, the same as 5 years earlier.

The most rapid import increases during recent years have come from countries supplying crude rubber, cocoa, spices, sugar, vegetable oils, grains, meat, and dairy products. These countries are primarily Brazil, Mexico, Australia, the Philippines, Canada, New Zealand, Colombia, the Dominican Republic, Indonesia, Malaysia, and certain West European countries.

Other import increases not separately identified in the table 23 groupings included live swine (from Canada), cotton (mostly from Egypt, Sudan, Peru, and Mexico), inedible molasses (chiefly from Mexico, Brazil, the Dominican Republic, and Australia), wines (from France, West Germany, Italy, Spain, Portugal, and other countries), beer and ale (from the Netherlands, West Germany, Canada, Mexico, and the United Kingdom), cut flowers (mostly from Colombia), seeds (principally from Canada), nursery stock (primarily from the Netherlands), animal feeding materials (mainly from Canada), and red pepper products (from Spain and Mexico).



Export Fact Sheet

U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS, 1973/74

Exports of farm products reached \$21.3 billion in fiscal 1974, surpassing last year's record by a hefty \$8.4 billion: Commercial sales, including credit sales, leaped to \$20.4 billion from fiscal 1973's record \$11.9 billion. Higher prices stemming from tight world supplies of many agricultural products were responsible for the sharp advance. Volume accounted for some of the increase, however, with the quantity index for U.S. farm exports (1967 = 100) rising 13 percentage points above the 1973 level. Roughly three-fifths of the fiscal 1974 growth in farm exports was attributable to grains (mainly wheat and feed grains). Significant value gains also occurred for soybeans, protein meal, tobacco, cotton, fruits and vegetables, and animal products. Exports of dairy products and hides and skins were down from year-earlier levels.

Farm exports in fiscal 1974 were equivalent to about 23 percent of 1973 U.S. farm marketings of \$93 billion: Increased exports in 1974 accounted for more than one-fourth of the record \$32 billion jump in U.S. cash receipts.

The output of nearly one-third of our harvested acres was exported: It took 96 million out of 322 million acres of cropland to produce the fiscal 1974 exports, compared with 91 million acres, or the output of about one-fourth of our harvested cropland, in fiscal 1973. Unfavorable weather conditions that dampened harvest expectations in many parts of the world, coupled with increased economic activity in many major markets, continued to generate increased demand for U.S. farm output in fiscal 1974. Foreign markets took two-thirds of our wheat output (including wheat products), about one-half of the rice, soybeans, cattle hides, dry edible peas, and dry whole milk, and more than two-fifths of the cotton, tobacco, and tallow. Compared with fiscal 1973, a slightly larger proportion of our grain sorghum, corn, and barley output went to foreign markets in fiscal 1974. With the exception of cattle hides, all of these commodities moved at substantially higher prices in 1974. Exports of dried peas, rice, inedible tallow and wheat more than doubled their fiscal 1973 values.

The United States is the world's largest agricultural exporter: U.S. products accounted for one-fifth of the world's agricultural exports in fiscal 1974. The value of these exports was equivalent to \$5.64 for every person living outside the United States, up \$2.17 from a year earlier, largely because of higher prices, but also because many foreign markets took substantially larger quantities of our principal export items. Several developing countries that have experienced rapid growth in recent years (mainly oil exporting countries) increased their rice and wheat imports from the United States. U.S. farmers provided nine-tenths of the world soybean exports, three-fifths of the feed grains, more than two-fifths of the wheat and flour, about one-third of the tobacco and one-fourth of the rice and cotton.

Dollar sales accounted for 96 percent of U.S. farm exports and all of the value gain over 1973: Commercial farm sales--which include barter for overseas procurement and CCC credit sales--advanced 72 percent to \$20.4 billion in fiscal 1974. Farm exports under Government-financed programs, have averaged \$1.3 billion over the last two decades, dipped to \$939 million in 1974--26 percent below the 20-year average and 9 percent below the 1973 level. Exports under Public Law 480 accounted for 92 percent of 1974's Government program exports.

Farm exports to Japan surpassed the \$3 billion mark in fiscal 1974: U.S. agricultural exports to Japan, our top country market for over a decade, rose by \$1.1 billion to reach \$3.4 billion in fiscal 1974. The 49-percent increase boosted our farm market share to 33 percent from 31 percent in fiscal 1973. Agricultural items accounted for one-third of total U.S. exports to Japan for the second consecutive year. Wheat, feed grains, tobacco, and cotton were responsible for most of the 1974 value gain. Although soybean exports to Japan advanced in value in fiscal 1974, volume declined by 20 percent.

Fifteen countries took some two-thirds of U.S. farm exports in fiscal 1974: U.S. agricultural exports valued at \$13.9 billion went to 15 countries, with Japan, West Germany, the Netherlands, Canada, and the People's Republic of China accounting for three-fifths of this amount. Exports to Italy, the United Kingdom, South Korea, and Spain amounted to an additional one-fifth of the farm exports to our top 15 markets in 1974. Strong demand for U.S. wheat and feed grains placed the USSR, India, Brazil, and Mexico into the prime market group, as wheat and feed grains made up 50 to 88 percent of U.S. farm shipments to these countries. France and China (Taiwan) were also included in the 15 countries.

Export sales of certain commodities were made subject to guidelines for prior approval in fiscal 1975: In the face of another huge grain sale to the USSR, the USDA announced on October 7, 1974, guidelines for prior approval of export sales under a voluntary program. The purpose of the system is to assure ample supplies for U.S. consumers and at the same time meet as fully as possible the requirements of U.S. customers abroad.

Exports to Eastern Europe and the USSR remained at the \$1 billion level in fiscal 1974: U.S. farm sales to Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union were valued at \$1.2 billion, down 11 percent from the 1973 level. Farm exports to the USSR fell to \$509 million in 1974 from \$900 million in 1973, largely because of limited grain supplies in the United States. At the same time, farm exports to other East European countries rose to \$686 million--52 percent above the previous year's level. Most of the value gain in exports to Eastern Europe, excluding the USSR, was due to sales of U.S. oilcake and meal and cotton. All corn exports destined for East European markets went to the USSR, East Germany, and Poland in 1974.

Farm exports to the People's Republic of China, at \$852 million, continued to dominate U.S. merchandise exports in fiscal 1974: Agricultural exports to the PRC, heavily concentrated in wheat, corn, cotton, and soybeans quadrupled the 1973 level. These exports made up 78 percent of all U.S. exports to the PRC in 1974. U.S. grain accounted for more than three-fifths of all the PRC grain imports.



Import Fact Sheet

U.S. AGRICULTURAL IMPORT SUMMARY, FISCAL 1974

Imports of agricultural products totaled \$9.55 billion in fiscal 1974. The value of U.S. farm product imports advanced 30 percent in fiscal 1974 to a record \$9.55 billion from \$7.32 billion a year earlier. This gain was due entirely to higher commodity prices, since the volume index remained level at 121 (1967 = 100).

Per capita imports of agricultural products averaged \$45. An average of \$45 in imported farm products consumed by U.S. residents primarily reflected the sharp increase in prices during fiscal 1974. Previous averages were \$35 in fiscal 1973, \$29 in fiscal 1972, and \$27 in fiscal 1970. Compared with many other countries, U.S. per capita agricultural imports are low. In West European countries and Japan, per capita agricultural imports exceed \$100 annually.

The United States ranks second among world agricultural importers. West Germany led all countries by importing \$11.5 billion in agricultural products during calendar year 1973. Other large importers were the United Kingdom (\$9 billion), Japan (\$8.9 billion), Italy (\$7.2 billion), and France (\$6.0 billion). U.S. agricultural imports during that period were \$8.4 billion, f.o.b. basis, while the other countries' totals were based on c.i.f. values. An estimated \$9.2 billion level results if 10 percent is added to the U.S. f.o.b. value.

Farm products accounted for less than 12 percent of total U.S. imports. Continuing a long-term trend, agricultural commodities as a share of all imports fell further in fiscal 1974--to 11.6 percent. In fiscal 1965, farm products made up 20 percent of imports. By 1971 the proportion had fallen to 14 percent, and by 1973, to 12 percent. Despite the sharp value rise in U.S. agricultural imports during fiscal 1974, nonagricultural items gained more rapidly--to \$73 billion from \$54 billion, or by 35 percent.

More than two-thirds of U.S. agricultural imports came from 25 countries. Although more than 150 different nations, dependencies, and island groups export farm products to the United States, nearly 78 percent came from 25 countries in fiscal 1974. Brazil moved to first place again, after dropping behind Mexico in fiscal 1973. Agricultural imports from all 25 leading sources except Costa Rica advanced between the 2 fiscal years. The Philippines replaced Canada in fourth place, and Indonesia jumped to ninth from eleventh place.

Competitive products accounted for nearly two-thirds of U.S. agricultural imports. The value of "supplementary" products which compete directly or indirectly with U.S. production advanced one-third in fiscal year 1974 to more than \$6.27 billion, or almost 66 percent of total farm product imports. Competitive items made up 64 percent of the previous year's total. Higher prices accounted for the 33-percent gain in competitive imports. The volume index remained the same at 128 (1967 = 100).

Noncompetitive agricultural commodities fell to 34 percent of total farm commodity imports. Although the value of "complementary" or noncompetitive products, at nearly \$3.3 billion, were one-fourth higher than a year earlier, these largely tropical items declined to 34 percent of the total from 36 percent in fiscal 1973. Price increases accounted for the value gain, since the volume index fell nearly 3 percent to 109 (1967 = 100). Lower import volume was recorded for green coffee, cocoa beans, sisal, silk, black pepper, and carpet wool.

Import duties on agricultural products are low. During calendar year 1973, customs duties on imported agricultural products averaged 4.2 percent ad valorem equivalent. Duty rates declined in 1973 as a result of tariff reductions agreed to in 1967. When duty reductions began, ad valorem equivalent rates averaged 5.8 percent. For dutiable items--which accounted for 60 percent of agricultural imports--ad valorem equivalent duties averaged 7.0 percent, compared with 10.5 percent in 1968. Duty-free items such as coffee, cocoa, tea, rubber, bananas, most edible nuts, copra, palm oil, most essential oils, spices, hard fibers, carpet wools, and hides made up the remainder.

Some agricultural imports are subject to quantitative restrictions. Certain commodity imports are limited by quotas set by Section 22 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Wheat, wheat products, cotton, cotton products, peanuts, and some dairy products are covered by annual import quotas under this section.

The import quota for colby cheese was raised by 100 million pounds in January 1974. Nonfat dry milk quotas were increased 330 million pounds in several actions; July 19, 1973 (80 million pounds), August 29, 1973 (100 million pounds), and May 4, 1974 (150 million pounds). During fiscal 1974, 296 million pounds of nonfat dry milk entered, or 34 million pounds less than quota authorizations. Butter import quotas were raised by 55 million pounds, and butteroil by 25 million pounds in November 1973.

Wheat import quotas were temporarily suspended in January 1974. This suspension was extended for an indefinite time period in June 1974. Sugar imports are regulated by the Sugar Act of 1948, as amended, which limits annual import volume by country. In fiscal 1974, relatively large import quantities were approved on a first-come, first-served country basis. Provisions to restrict certain meat imports under Public Law 88-482 have been suspended since July 1972.



International Price Highlights

SELECTED PRICE SERIES OF INTERNATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

The USSR, together with Japan, India, South Korea, Egypt, and Turkey, were purchasing large amounts of U.S. grain during October, but the early November rumors concerning Soviet sugar purchases in the world market have not yet been confirmed.

Export Commodity Prices

Under the terms of the Russian grain sale, which has been revised since October 6, the USSR will be allowed to purchase 1.2 million tons of wheat and 1 million tons of corn directly from the United States. To date, the Soviets have also purchased grain from Australia, Argentina, Canada, and Sweden.

Because of stepped-up foreign demand for wheat and news of the poor quality of Canadian wheat, wheat prices rose sharply during October. The Gulf price of U.S. No. 1 Hard Winter wheat (HWW) rose 13 percent to \$192 a ton, and the Duluth price for No. 2 Dark Northern Spring wheat (DNS) rose 11 percent to \$209 a ton.

The c.i.f. Rotterdam prices for these two market classes of U.S. wheat rose 31 and 9 percent, respectively. The U.S. port-Rotterdam price spread was \$24 a ton for both classes (table ____). The in-store Thunder Bay, the c.i.f. Rotterdam, and the c.i.f. U.K. prices for No. 1 Canadian Western Red Spring wheat (CWRWS) each rose by 10 percent to \$213, \$234, and \$244 a ton, respectively. In the Rotterdam market, offering prices indicate U.S.-DNS and CWRWS have been largely pacing each other.

The Russian grain sale created unusual pricing patterns for a few days, according to offering prices in the Rotterdam market. During the first week of October, price spreads for wheat (and corn) narrowed (1) between the U.S. ports and Rotterdam and (2) between U.S. grains and competing Canadian and Argentine grains in Rotterdam. After October 6, the price spreads again widened. The narrowing price spreads may reflect the strength of bids in the United States generated by the Russian grain sale. The subsequent widening may have been due to the European fear of possible U.S. export controls and the possibility of future Soviet purchases in Western Europe.

U.S. export and Dutch import unit values are more accurate--but less timely--indicators of actual price spreads between U.S. and European markets. Compared with price spreads calculated from offering prices, those calculated from import and export unit values showed a rather tight price situation between the U.S. and the Netherlands until May 1974 (whether considered with a 1-month time lag for shipping

or not). May was also the month that the price spread between U.S. and Canadian wheat narrowed to only \$1 a ton in the Netherlands (table 30).

The U.S. Gulf port price of U.S. No. 1 Yellow corn reached \$152 a ton in October--a new record. The c.i.f. U.K. price for U.S. corn rose 6 percent to \$171 a ton, and the Rotterdam price rose 9 percent to \$166 a ton. In the Rotterdam market, the offering price for U.S. grain sorghum rose 14 percent to \$161 a ton. During October, Rotterdam offering prices indicated that Gulf port-Rotterdam price spreads again widened after the narrowing that coincided with the Russian grain sale. In Rotterdam, the U.S. corn-Argentine corn price spread continued to narrow, so that Argentine corn, at \$171 a ton, was priced at only a \$5 a ton over U.S. corn, about the same as in October 1973. Price spreads based on unit values fell in April and May, perhaps responding to the decline in ocean freight rates during those months. During the same time in October that U.S. corn supplies tightened, Thailand temporarily rejected many foreign buying orders.

During October, soybean prices made even larger gains than wheat and corn prices, largely because of the bullish October USDA soybean crop report. The f.o.b. vessel, Gulf port price of U.S. No. 2 Yellow soybeans reached \$315 a ton, a 9-percent gain over the September price. Similarly, the c.i.f. Rotterdam price for U.S. No. 2 Yellow soybeans jumped 9 percent to \$335 a ton. In October, the U.S. Gulf port-Rotterdam spread widened to \$20 a ton. According to table 30, the Netherlands imported high priced U.S. soybeans until November 1973 (the high prices resulted from the extremely tight supply in late summer 1973). Since soybean prices moved very rapidly, a 1-month time lag due to shipping may present more logical price spreads than comparisons for the same given month (table 30). On this basis, in April and May 1974, U.S.-Dutch spreads were nearly as wide as they were in late 1973. Moreover, unit values of U.S. soybeans moved ahead of Brazilian soybeans in the Dutch market.

In October, the c.i.f. Rotterdam price for U.S. soybean meal rose 16 percent to \$212 a ton. Similarly, the Decatur price rose 16 percent to \$172 a ton. Soybean meal prices, like wheat, corn, and soybean prices, weakened in early November.

With the coming of harvest, international rice prices softened. The October f.o.b. Bangkok price of white Thai rice, 5-percent broken, dropped 3 percent to \$499 a ton. Similarly, f.o.b. mill prices for U.S. short, medium, and long grain rice have also weakened. The record U.S. rice crop and a world crop which nearly matches last year's record are setting the stage for these prices.

The c.i.f. North European price for American short middling cotton, 1-1/16 inches, continued its 4-month decline, dropping to 58 cents a pound in October. According to the December 1974 Cotton Situation (Economic Research Service, USDA, CS-268), the current downturn in general economic activity is the principal factor lowering the demand for textile goods, and thus the demand for raw cotton from the United States. Moreover, the outlook for U.S. cotton exports is down sharply from last season's 6.1 million bales, because of the weakened textile manufacturing activity in major cotton consuming countries, last season's buildup of textile inventories, and this year's favorable cotton crop prospects.

Import Commodity Prices

Sugar prices began to rise at spiraling rates in October, and cocoa bean and coffee prices rose. The price of imported cow meat and rubber continued to decline.

The New York spot price and the f.o.b. Santos prices for Santos #4 green coffee--both at 64.5 cents a pound--reversed a 6-month price decline during October. Heavy U.S. buying--after months of depleting stocks--gave strong impetus to the price rise. Also

the producing countries' attempts to stabilize coffee prices by holding green coffee off the market may have had some price effect.

Through October and early November, world sugar prices soared. On November 9, the daily limit on the futures market was changed from 1 cent to 2 cents a pound on the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange. The well-known short world sugar supply, the Philippines' temporary suspension of sugar exports in the wake of typhoons, Thailand's declaring "force majeure" on its sugar export contracts, Poland's ban on sugar exports, the news of a short U.S. sugarbeet crop, and heavy buying by Arab and Japanese interests contributed to the spiraling sugar prices. The rumors of Soviet purchases, which also strengthened prices, have not yet been confirmed. The New York spot price for sugar, which averaged 39 cents a pound in October, peaked on November 20 at 54.50 cents a pound and has continued downward since. The October f.o.b. and stowed, Caribbean ports price of sugar destined for the world was 40 cents a pound--3 cents a pound higher than the Caribbean port price of sugar destined for the United States.

The New York spot price of cocoa beans advanced 8 percent from September to October, reaching \$1.15 a pound. Again, the present low stock supplies and shortage of nearby cocoa supplies buoyed October prices. An overall increase in the 1974 West African crop may well be countered by the fall in the Brazilian main crop.

In contrast, the New York spot price for No. 1 rubber, ribbed smoked sheets, continued to slide, reaching 31 cents a pound in October--the October New York Spot price for rubber was 12 percent lower than a year ago. Rubber prices, according to the May 1974 FAO Monthly Bulletin of Agricultural Economics and Statistics, are declining because stocks in consumer countries were at very high levels at the end of 1973, and because reduced automobile production has slackened demand. On the supply side, reports of added output of natural rubber and an easing of the price and supply situation for oil, and thus for synthetic rubber, weakened natural rubber prices.

The price of imported cowmeat continued to decline. At 63 cents a pound, the October 1974 imported cowmeat price was off 37 percent from a year ago.

The commodity price developments caused the Dow-Jones price commodity index to reach a new peak of 393 in October. The Reuter's commodity index turned up to 1,242.

Export and Import Unit Values

In September, the index of U.S. agricultural export unit values was 225 (1967 = 100), 21 percent higher than in September 1973. The export unit value of raw cotton was up 53 percent, while the export unit values of wheat and corn were 23 and 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ percent higher, respectively. In contrast, the unit value of soybean meal, at \$155 a ton, was 44 percent lower than the September 1973 value.

In September, unit values of agricultural import commodities were rising faster than export commodity unit values. The unit value of sugar, at 24.4 cents a pound, was 240 percent of the September 1973 value. Coffee and coca beans were 10 and 49 percent higher. These gains were tempered by a 30-percent decline in the unit values of beef and canned hams and a 14-percent decline in the dutiable wool unit value.

Export Highlights

U.S. FARM EXPORTS HIT A RECORD \$6.2 BILLION DURING JULY-OCTOBER 1974

In October 1974, U.S. agricultural exports totaled \$1,711 million, 1 percent lower than October 1973 but 23 percent above the September 1974 level. Volume, however, measured by the quantity index was down by 20 percent. Exports during October 1974 gained to Mexico, Venezuela, the United Kingdom, West Germany, Portugal, Turkey, Iraq, Iran, India, and South Korea, but fell to Chile, Brazil, Argentina, the USSR, Greece, Israel, Pakistan, Indonesia, and the People's Republic of China.

July-October farm exports rose 5 percent above the year-earlier level to reach \$6.18 billion. Higher prices continued to account for all of the value gain as volume was off by 13 percent. Lower grain exports were responsible for most of the volume drop. Wheat exports, including products, dropped 30 percent to 99 million tons, and feed grains and products fell 38 percent to 9.4 million tons. Rice exports, at 526,000 tons, were up 42 percent.

Exports of oilseeds and products were up 35 percent in value to \$1.32 billion while volume gained 33 percent. Prices of soybeans and soybean meal were unusually high a year ago, when supplies were extremely tight. Western Europe and Japan continued to be the principal markets for U.S. soybeans. But the Mideast and North Africa took substantial amounts of U.S. oilseed products during July-October. Many developing countries also stepped-up their purchases of U.S. vegetable oils.

U.S. fruit exports, including products, rose 7 percent to \$223 million. Gains in fresh fruits and dried fruits more than offset the sharp reduction in exports of canned fruits. Fresh fruit exports to Western Europe alone rose by \$23 million, or by 68 percent. Exports of nuts and preparations continued to outstrip previous records by advancing around one-third to \$59 million. A 35-percent gain in vegetables and preparations stemmed from increased exports of fresh vegetables, dried beans, dried peas, and canned vegetables. Dried bean exports to Mexico rose from \$1 million in July-October 1973 to \$19 million in July-October 1974, accounting for two-fifths of the value gain for all vegetables and preparations.

The 8-percent value gain was registered for exports of animals and animal products. Most of it came from increased shipments of animal fats and oils, which were up 29 percent in volume and 55 percent in value. Meat export volume rose, but the value about equaled the July-October 1973 level. Lower prices stimulated the volume of cattle hide exports by 24 percent. Exports of dairy products and poultry products also gained.

Tobacco, including bulk smoking, exports rose 8 percent to \$266 million, while volume fell by 2 percent to 212 million pounds. Bulk smoking and miscellaneous,

U.S. cotton exports fell by 25 percent in quantity but gained around one-fifth in value. Unfavorable economic conditions in major markets have dampened the demand for textile products. The value remained high during July-October because much of the cotton was purchased earlier, when prices were up sharply.



Import Highlights

FARM PRODUCT IMPORTS GAIN NEARLY ONE-FIFTH IN JULY-OCTOBER

The value of U.S. agricultural imports during July-October 1974 amounted to \$3.2^b billion, almost 20 percent above similar months a year earlier. Higher prices accounted for most of this growth as the volume index declined to 102 from 110 last year (1967 = 100). Supplementary farm product imports gained 29 percent in value, while complementary items were about the same. October 1974 agricultural imports were worth \$741 million, compared with \$712 million in October 1973 and \$751 million in September 1974.

Competitive, or supplementary, imported farm products reached \$2.36 billion for the first 4 months of fiscal 1975 against \$1.83 billion a year earlier. Higher prices coupled with volume gains for sugar and sugar products, cotton, tobacco, grains and preparations, vegetable oils, and canned pineapple were principal factors contributing to the advance.

Sugar imports were up 22 percent in volume at 2 million short tons. Import unit values zoomed 154 percent--from \$180 per ton in the 1973 period to \$457 per ton in the 1974 period--putting the value of sugar imports for July-October at a record \$909 million, compared with \$295 million a year earlier. October 1974 sugar imports totaled 360,000 tons against only 220,000 tons during October 1973. Sugar accounted for 28 percent of the value of U.S. agricultural imports in July-October, compared with only 11 percent a year earlier. Also, sugar imports exceeded those of any other agricultural import, whereas last year coffee and beef were the leading items.

The Dominican Republic, Brazil, Peru, Central American Common Market members, the Caribbean Common Market (Barbados, Belize, Guyana, Jamaica, Trinidad, and St. Kitts), Argentina, Colombia, Australia, India, and South Africa all shipped larger amounts of sugar to U.S. importers in July-October 1974 than last year. Entries from the Philippines and Mexico declined.

Raw cotton imports amounted to 11,519 bales (480 lbs. each) in July-October, up from 10,276 bales in similar months in 1973. At the same time, value climbed 59 percent to \$4 million because of higher prices. Mexico supplied most of the increased cotton imports.

Imports for consumption of unmanufactured tobacco (including smoking tobacco) in July-October totaled close to 103 million pounds, up 14 percent from the year-earlier level. Value rose 21 percent to \$66 million. Scrap tobacco entries accounted for a substantial part of the gain, advancing to 31 million pounds (\$16.5 million) from under 23 million pounds (\$10.5 million). Unstemmed flue-cured and burley leaf imports climbed to over 7 million pounds (\$3.6 million), from 1.9 million (\$784,000) in July-October 1973. Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, and South Korea were the main sources of the increases.

Volume reductions for imports of bananas, green coffee, and carpet wool more than offset increases among other noncompetitive agricultural imports. However, higher prices resulted in value gains for most complementary commodities. Compared with year-earlier levels, green coffee purchases fell 31 percent to 557 million pounds, while value declined 29 percent to \$336 million during July-October 1974. The declines occurred mainly in shipments from Mexico, El Salvador, Costa Rica, Brazil, Colombia, India, and some African countries, mainly the Ivory Coast, Ethiopia, and Tanzania. Tea imports gained strongly as entries rose to 63 million pounds from 56 million a year earlier. Sri Lanka, Indonesia, India, Tanzania, Taiwan, China, and Argentina shipped most of the additional purchases.

Spice import volume in July-October gained 13 percent over the first 4 months of fiscal 1973. At the same time, value climbed about 44 percent because of higher prices. Black and white pepper, ginger root, caraway, cinnamon, and nutmeg were the largest gainers.

Essential oil import values were double their year-earlier level, mostly because of volume increases and higher prices for citronella, clove, geranium, lime, rosemary, sandalwood, and vetiver oils. Major sources of these items were, respectively, Indonesia, Malagasy, Egypt, Mexico, Tunisia, India, and Haiti.

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

Explanatory Note

U.S. foreign agricultural trade statistics in this report include official U.S. data based on compilations of the Bureau of the Census. Agricultural commodities consist of (1) nonmarine food products and (2) other products of agriculture which have not passed through complex processes of manufacture such as raw hides and skins, fats and oils, and wine. Such manufactured products as textiles, leather, boots and shoes, cigarettes, naval stores, forestry products, and distilled alcoholic beverages are not considered agricultural.

The trade statistics exclude shipments between the 50 States and Puerto Rico, between the 50 States and the island possessions, between Puerto Rico and the island possessions, among the island possessions, and intransit through the United States from one foreign country to another when documented as such through U.S. Customs.

EXPORTS The export statistics also exclude shipments to the U.S. armed forces and diplomatic missions abroad for their own use and supplies for vessels and planes engaged in foreign trade. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are not compiled by commodity and are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall export totals in this report. The agricultural export statistics include shipments under P.L. 83-480 (Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act), and related laws; under P.L. 87-195 (Act for International Development); and involving Government payments to exporters. (USDA payments are excluded from the export value.) Separate statistics on Government program exports are compiled by USDA from data obtained from operating agencies.

The export value, the value at the port of exportation, is based on the selling price (or cost if not sold) and includes inland freight, insurance, and other charges to the port. The country of destination is the country of ultimate destination or where the commodities are to be consumed, further processed, or manufactured. When the shipper does not know the ultimate destination, the shipments are credited to the last country, as known to him at the time of shipment from the United States, to which the commodities are to be shipped in their present form. Except for Canada, export shipments valued at \$251-\$499 are included on the basis of sampling estimates; shipments to Canada valued at \$251-\$1,999 are sampled.

IMPORTS Imports for consumption are a combination of entries for immediate consumption and withdrawals from warehouses for consumption. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are estimated on the basis of a 1-percent sample and are not compiled by commodity. They are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall import totals in this report.

The import value, defined generally as the market value in the foreign country, excludes import duties, ocean freight, and marine insurance. The country of origin is defined as the country where the commodities were grown or processed. When the country of origin is not known, the imports are credited to the country of shipment.

Imports similar to agricultural commodities produced commercially in the United States and others that are interchangeable in use to any significant extent with such U.S. commodities are supplementary or partly competitive. All other commodities are complementary or noncompetitive.

Further explanatory material on foreign trade statistics and compilation procedures of the Bureau of the Census is contained in the publications of that agency.

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
