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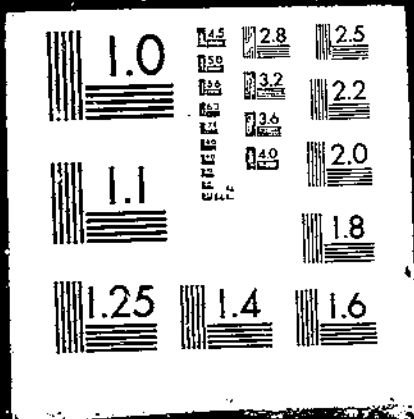

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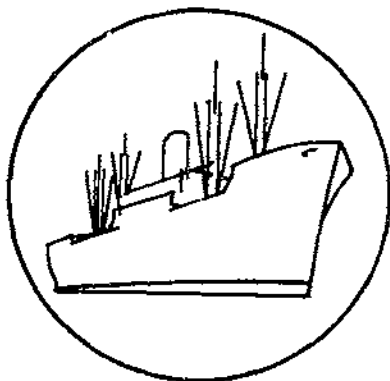

U.S. Agricultural Exports Totaled \$17 Billion in July-March (see p. 5). As a result of higher prices, farm export value during the first 9 months of fiscal 1975 was 7 percent higher than the year-earlier value. Export volume declines occurred for cotton, feed grains, wheat, soybeans, oilmeal, and some animal products. There were significant changes in the markets for U.S. agricultural products. Exports to the People's Republic of China, Eastern Europe, and the USSR were down one-fifth. But the value of exports to West and South Asia was up 103 percent.

Agricultural Imports Slowed for January-March (see p. 39). The value of U.S. agricultural imports in January-March 1975 dropped to \$2.25 billion from \$2.54 billion in October-December 1974 and \$2.59 billion during January-March last year. For the first 9 months of fiscal 1975, farm product imports were 5 percent above the year-earlier level. Competitive commodities accounted for the July-March 1974/75 advance, largely because of increases for sugar and vegetable oils. Most other imported commodities showed declines. Noncompetitive items fell 10 percent in value because of reduced volume inflows.

Principal Sources of U.S. Agricultural Imports in 1974 (see p. 51). Among the 50 leading suppliers of our 1974 farm product imports, Brazil, the Philippines, the Dominican Republic, Indonesia, Malaysia, Argentina, Peru, and Ecuador had increased import shares. Those of Mexico, Australia, Canada, and New Zealand declined.

U.S. Agricultural Trade Balance in 1974 (see p. 69). The United States had an \$11.7-billion surplus in its agricultural trade balance in 1974. But because of a \$14.7-billion deficit for nonagricultural commodities, the total trade balance was \$3 billion in deficit, following a surplus of \$1.2 billion in 1973.

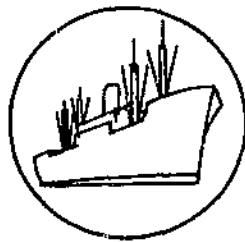
Export-Payment Assistance to U.S. Agricultural Exports, 1973/74 (see p. 71). Fiscal 1974 marked a low point for export-payment assistance, since export differentials were about zero and cash export payments totaled an alltime low of \$59 million. Only 4 percent of the record \$21.3 billion worth of U.S. farm exports was assisted in 1974, compared with 21 percent in 1973 and 24 percent in 1972. Strong world demand for U.S. agricultural products led to U.S. policy decisions to begin suspending export-payment assistance as early as 1972. Since then, export differentials have been virtually eliminated and direct export payments have been limited to the completion of contracts on old crop stocks of tobacco, rice, and wheat and wheat products. Export differentials made on other agricultural products were negligible in 1974.

Spain--A Fast Growing Market for U.S. Farm Products (see p. 78). Spain's agricultural imports in 1973--at nearly \$2 billion--were more than double the 1970 value. Feed-stuffs accounted for about half of the total imports. The United States has benefited from this growth. In 1974, U.S. exports of farm products to Spain amounted to \$711 million and consisted mainly of soybeans and corn. Spain has also become a large agricultural exporter, shipping \$1.4 billion in 1973. Fruits and vegetables accounted for about half of these exports.

Selected Prices of International Significance (see p. 84). Prices of principal agricultural import and export commodities were lower in March 1975 than in February, and except for sugar, the prices were lower than in March 1974. The general slowdown in trading and the current prospects for a good 1975 outturn are weighing on the market. But, the month-to-month price declines that began late in 1974 slowed during March.



Export Highlights

U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS TOTALED \$17 BILLION IN JULY-MARCH

During the first 9 months of fiscal 1975, farm export value rose slightly over the year-earlier level of \$15.8 billion. The increase was due to higher prices, since volume declined for most commodities. The largest volume drop occurred in cotton exports (33 percent). Export volume of feed grains, wheat, soybeans, and oilmeal also declined. Large volume increases were recorded in exports of vegetable oils, rice, and pulses; animal fats and meat exports were also up.

Exports of oilseeds and oilseed products totaled \$4 billion during the first three quarters of fiscal 1975. Soybean export volume was down, but value rose slightly to \$2.5 billion. Soybean exports to the European Community (EC) were down 23 percent from the first three quarters of fiscal '74, and Japan's purchases were down 5 percent. Both the volumes and unit values of soybean and cottonseed oil exports were up substantially. Iran's imports led the increase. Protein meal exports were down in volume; their unit value was less than three-fourths of the year-earlier level.

During July-March 1974/75, wheat export volume was 17 percent below the year-earlier level, but value rose to \$3.8 billion. Wheat exports to Europe, Southeast and East Asia, Latin America, and Africa declined substantially, more than offsetting increased shipments to West and South Asia.

Higher prices pushed feed grain shipments to \$3.8 billion in July-March 1974/75, although volume was down 18 percent. The largest declines occurred in shipments to the USSR and Southeast and East Asia.

In the first 9 months of fiscal 1975, export value of animals and animal products was down slightly to \$1.26 billion. The leading export commodities were fats and oils, hides and skins, and meats. Exports of animal fats and oils were up because of much larger shipments to West Asia, North Africa, and South Asia. Hide and skin exports were down 8 percent in value. Whole cattle hide exports fell 12 percent in value, although export volume was up 25 percent. Exports to Mexico, Japan, Romania, and Canada were substantially smaller. The value of meat and meat products exports was down, although the total volume increased. Variety meat and pork exports expanded, while beef exports dropped.

Cotton exports totaled \$757 million in July-March 1974/75, down 14 percent from the 1973/74 value. Shipments to all leading markets were down sharply. Export volume to Southeast and East Asia was off 43 percent.

The volume of tobacco exports was steady, and the value increased to \$724 million in July-March. Exports to the EC were down 13 percent in volume; Japanese purchases were up 28 percent.

In July-March, both the value and volume of rice exports were about 40 percent above year-earlier levels. Rice exports to Asia doubled in value.

Iran, our predominant expansionary market, imported \$620 million worth of U.S. farm products in the first 9 months of fiscal 1975, more than 5-1/2 times the year-earlier value. The primary commodities exported to Iran were wheat, rice, and vegetable oils. Iran is currently the ninth largest market for U.S. agricultural exports.

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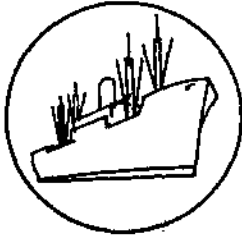

Import Highlights

AGRICULTURAL IMPORTS SLOWED FOR JANUARY-MARCH

U.S. farm product imports during January-March 1975 declined to \$2.25 billion following several quarterly records. During January-March 1974, agricultural imports totaled \$2.59 billion. The value rose to a record \$2.61 billion in April-June 1974, but has since declined.

During the first 9 months of fiscal 1975, farm product imports amounted to \$7.3 billion, about 5 percent above the year-earlier level. March 1975 farm product imports totaled \$749 million, compared with March 1974's record high of \$984 million (table 13).

Competitive farm product imports for July-March 1974/75 amounted to nearly \$5.2 billion--up about 13 percent from a year earlier. Much of this gain resulted from higher prices, particularly for sugar. Sugar import volume dropped 11 percent to 3.54 million short tons, but value more than doubled to \$1.95 billion. Consumer resistance to higher sugar prices accounted for the volume decline, while import unit values continued well above year-earlier levels. However, average import unit values for sugar have declined somewhat from their January 1975 peak (table 14).

U.S. imports of oilseeds and products were valued at \$511 million in July-March, three-fourths above the year-earlier level. While inflows of copra ceased after March 1974, coconut, palm, palm kernel, tung, babassu, and rapeseed oils advanced. Vegetable oil import prices also rose sharply, resulting in a more than doubling in their value.

During July-March 1974/75, most competitive, or supplementary, farm commodity imports declined both in value and volume from their previous year's levels. Entries of cattle, meat, dairy products, wool, cotton, fresh fruits, edible nuts, vegetables, and wine slowed.

Noncompetitive agricultural imports fell 10 percent in value over the first 9 months to \$2.1 billion, reflecting primarily volume decreases. Green coffee, cocoa beans, essential oils, spices, tea, and wool volume dropped below year-earlier levels. Higher prices for bananas, cocoa, hard fibers, spices, and tea partly offset the volume reductions.

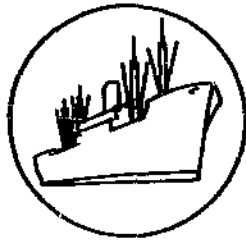

PRINCIPAL SOURCES OF U.S. AGRICULTURAL IMPORTS IN 1974

Farm product imports during 1974 amounted to nearly \$10.25 billion, up 22 percent from the 1973 record of \$8.4 billion. Competitive, or supplementary, commodities advanced 26 percent to \$7.01 billion, while noncompetitive items rose 13 percent to \$3.24 billion.

Higher prices accounted for the value gain, since volume declined for most items. Sugar imports soared 144 percent to nearly \$2.56 billion, accounting for almost two-thirds of the value gain. Value was up for all major import groups except dutiable cattle, meat, wool, and coffee.

Of the more than 150 countries shipping agricultural products to the United States, 50 accounted for nearly 93 percent in 1974. Imports from countries supplying competitive commodities--especially sugar, vegetable oils, and tobacco--rose the most. Agricultural import shares increased for Brazil, the Philippines, the Dominican Republic, Indonesia, Malaysia, Argentina, Peru, and Ecuador, and declined for Mexico, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Denmark, the Netherlands, France, West Germany, Spain, Costa Rica, and Honduras.

Brazil again became the largest supplier of U.S. agricultural imports in 1974 after dropping to second place a year earlier. A sharp increase in our sugar imports from Brazil more than offset a decline in coffee inflows. Brazil became the second-largest source of sugar imports, following the Philippines.

Rapid price increases for sugar, coconut products, and abaca fiber accounted for the 80-percent increase in U.S. agricultural imports from the Philippines in 1974. Despite volume declines for sugar and coconut products, import values jumped sharply--84 percent for sugar, 145 percent for coconut oil, and 115 percent for shredded coconut. Raw abaca fiber imports from the Philippines gained 70 percent in volume, but value climbed 356 percent.

Our farm imports from Mexico edged up only 3 percent in value between 1973 and 1974, reflecting mostly higher prices, as volume declined for most products. Mexico had been the largest source of agricultural imports in 1973, but dropped to third place in 1974. The relative positions of Australia, New Zealand, and Canada also slipped, principally because of declining U.S. meat imports.

Colombia maintained its seventh-place rank, largely because of increased coffee imports from that country. The value of U.S. green coffee imports from Colombia rose to \$280 million in 1974, exceeding those from Brazil for the first time.

Jamaica, Guyana, and Panama appeared among the 50 leading suppliers in 1974; Belgium-Luxembourg, Switzerland, and Venezuela, which ranked 42nd, 44th, and 47th, respectively, in 1973 were not included.

On a regional basis, U.S. agricultural import shares from Latin America and Asia increased, while those from Western Europe, Oceania, and North America declined.

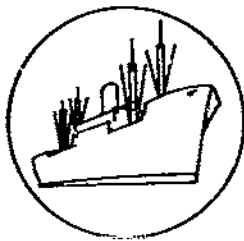

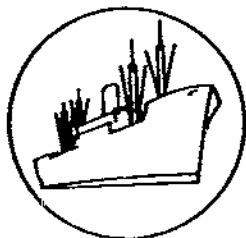
U.S. AGRICULTURAL TRADE BALANCE IN 1974

Higher commodity prices pushed our agricultural exports to \$22 billion in 1974, and agricultural imports to \$10 billion. The result was an \$11.7-billion surplus in the agricultural trade balance. A measure of agriculture's contribution to the balance of trade is that commercial farm exports (as opposed to Government-financed exports) were \$14.2 billion higher than supplementary farm imports (items competitive with domestic production).

A deficit of \$14.7 billion was registered in the trade balance for nonagricultural items; imports were valued at \$90 billion and exports at \$75 billion. Last year's deficit was \$8.0 billion. Over one-half of the increase in nonagricultural import value was due to higher oil prices. Import value for crude petroleum and petroleum products rose to \$24.2 billion from \$7.6 billion in 1973. Other large gains occurred for imports of iron and steel, chemicals, nonferrous metals, and wood pulp. All major U.S. nonagricultural exports were up in value, with coal, iron and steel, paper, chemicals, commercial aircraft, and mining and construction machines registering the largest gains.

The 1974 deficit in the nonagricultural trade balance gave us a \$3.0-billion total trade deficit. Except for 1973, when a \$1.2-billion surplus was registered, the United States has had total trade balance deficits since 1971. Agriculture's trade balance has been in surplus each year.

The balance of trade is the difference between the value of merchandise imports and exports in a year. Thus, it is one component of the balance of payments, which measures the exchange of goods, services, and capital. For 1974, the United States had a \$7.5-billion deficit in the basic balance of payments (balance on current account and long-term capital flow).

EXPORT-PAYMENT ASSISTANCE TO U.S. AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS, 1973/74

Of the \$21.3 billion worth of U.S. agricultural products exported in fiscal 1974, commercial sales accounted for \$20.4 billion--72 percent more than in fiscal 1973. The record \$8.5-billion gain in commercial farm exports was largely due to sharp export price increases for grains, soybeans, and vegetable oils. Agricultural exports under Government-financed programs (P.L. 480 and AID shipments), totaling \$939 million, were 9 percent below the 1973 level. They accounted for a mere 4 percent of total agricultural exports, compared with about 8 percent in fiscal 1973.

Although the following discussion includes some amounts of export-payment assistance on wheat, tobacco, and rice, these payments actually reflect completion of contracts made prior to the suspension of the export-payment assistance program. All export-payment or price-equalization assistance programs were suspended during 1972-73, with a phasing-out period of 48 months for all commodities contracted with payment. ^{1/}

Total Export-Payment Assistance

The value of U.S. farm exports benefiting from export-payment assistance plummeted to \$751 million in fiscal 1974 from \$2.75 billion in fiscal 1973. The gigantic drop reflected tight domestic supply positions last year, and suspension of the program applicable to new crop production. Also, world market prices approached or equaled domestic prices. The substantial increase in foreign demand for U.S. farm products in fiscal 1973 resulted in a sharp cutback in export payments and differentials on all agricultural products except on tobacco crops harvested prior to 1973. Until 1973, export-payment assistance had been used to bridge the gap between high domestic or price-supported commodities and low world market prices, thereby rendering U.S. farm products competitive in foreign markets.

Total export payments and differentials amounted to \$58.6 million in fiscal 1974, compared with \$409 million a year earlier. Fiscal 1973's export-payment assistance stemmed from liquidation of contracts for large exports of wheat and wheat products to the USSR and other countries--contracts made prior to suspension of wheat export-payment programs in September 1972. Export payments on contracted wheat and wheat

products totaled \$44 million in fiscal 1974, against \$304 million the year before. Payments on old crop stocks of tobacco were valued at \$14 million and accounted for nearly all of the remaining export payments during fiscal 1974. Export payments on rice totaled \$18,000, apparently reflecting a lag in rice shipments from prior years.

Export-Payment Assistance to Commercial Farm Sales

Commercial exports assisted by export payments in fiscal 1974 totaled an estimated \$736 million, or about 4 percent of all commercial farm exports. In fiscal 1973, the value of commercial sales assisted by such export payments amounted to \$2.5 billion, accounting for more than one-fifth of total commercial farm exports. The \$1.8-billion decline in assisted commercial farm sales was centered on suspension of the program applicable to current crop exports. In 1973, commercial sales of wheat (including products) and tobacco on which assistance payments were applicable were estimated at \$2.3 billion, and accounted for over nine-tenths of all payment assistance to commercial exports. Wheat and tobacco accounted for nearly all of the fiscal 1974 commercial sales assisted by export payment. Total commercial sales in 1974 rose to \$20.4 billion from \$11.9 billion a year earlier. Commercial sales without assistance were valued at \$19.6 billion in 1974. Commercial exports include unassisted exports as well as exports receiving payment assistance, exports bartered for overseas procurement for U.S. agencies, and exports under short-term credits and guarantees by the Commodity Credit Corporation and the Export-Import Bank.

Export-Payment Assistance to Exports Under Government-Financed Programs

Agricultural exports under Government-financed programs were valued at \$939 million in 1974--down somewhat from the \$1.03 billion of 1973, reflecting almost complete close-out of payment assistance to these exports. Payment assistance was made on an estimated \$15 million worth of Government-financed exports in 1974, compared with \$254 million in fiscal 1973. Commodities receiving some export assistance under Government-financed programs during 1973 included wheat and wheat products, rice, unmanufactured tobacco, and dairy products; but by 1974 nearly all payment assistance was phased out except for limited contracts made on tobacco (\$14 million) and wheat and wheat products (\$1 million). Consequently, Government-financed exports moving without export payments rose 30 percent to \$634 million in 1974.

Government-financed farm exports are authorized under P.L. 480 (the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act) and under Mutual Security (AID) programs authorized by P.L. 87-195. Export assistance is authorized under P.L. 480 for long-term dollar credit sales (Title I); for donations through Government-to-Government and voluntary relief programs (Title II); and for barter sales for strategic materials. However, we no longer exchange agricultural commodities for strategic materials. Title II donations move unassisted by export-payments or differentials to provide support for humanitarian and development activities. Title II donations in 1974 totaled \$290 million, and accounted for 31 percent of all Government-financed exports. Major commodities donated were wheat and oilseeds, including their products, and feed grains. Donations of wheat and products and oilseeds and products remained at about the 1973 levels, while feed grain donations in 1974 more than quadrupled the \$13-million level of 1973. Most of the value gain in donations of feed grains was attributable to a vast increase in grain sorghums moving at substantially higher export unit values. Title II grain sorghum shipments climbed from \$10 million in fiscal 1973 to \$43 million in 1974.

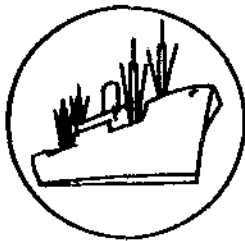

SPAIN--A FAST GROWING MARKET FOR U.S. FARM PRODUCTS

Spain was the eighth-largest commercial market for U.S. farm exports in 1974, taking U.S. farm products worth \$711 million--54 percent more than in 1973 and nearly 4 times more than in 1970. Feed grains and soybeans, making up 85 percent of the total, accounted for most of the 1973-74 increase (table 28).

Increased Spanish prosperity has expanded the demand for agricultural imports. In 1973, the country's imports of agricultural products from the world amounted to \$1.8 billion--more than double the value of just 3 years earlier--and represented about one-fifth of total imports (table 29). During the first 9 months of 1974, agricultural imports continued to increase rapidly, reaching nearly \$2 billion. Higher prices for most products and substantially larger volumes of feed grains (particularly corn), soybeans, and high-protein meal accounted for most of the 44-percent increase over the first 9 months of 1973.

Spain has also become a large agricultural exporter, shipping \$1.4 billion worth in 1973--nearly double the level of 3 years earlier. Farm products account for one-fourth of total Spanish exports (table 29). However, agricultural exports during January-September 1974 slipped about 3 percent from the previous year, to \$1.1 billion. Spanish farm exports consist mainly of citrus fruit, canned fruit and vegetables, olives, and wine.

Spain's agricultural trade deficit increased from less than \$60 million in 1970 to \$422 million in 1973. It was about \$930 million during the first 9 months of 1974, compared with \$364 million in the corresponding period of 1973.

Imports of all major agricultural commodities except vegetable fats and oils have increased significantly in recent years. Feed grains, soybeans for crushing, soybean cake and meal, livestock products (including hides and skins), and natural fibers have shown the largest gains.

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Spain's rapidly growing livestock sector has increased the demand for imported feed grains and other feed. Feed grain imports totaled 2.7 million tons in 1973, or 750,000 tons more than in 1970. By value, these imports more than doubled to reach nearly \$300 million. Corn accounted for nearly all the 1973 feed grain imports. During the first 9 months of 1974, feed grain imports rose to 3.6 million tons, including 3.2 million tons of corn. These imports were two-thirds above the level in the comparable period of 1973.

Spain's production of mixed feed, estimated at about 7 million tons in 1974, has required large imports of feed ingredients--mainly soybeans and protein cake and meal from the United States. Imports of these ingredients have been increasing. Oilseed imports rose from 1.3 million tons in 1970 to 1.5 million tons in 1972. They declined abruptly to 920,000 tons in 1973, mainly because of the U.S. restriction on oilseed exports in the second half of 1973, but recovered in 1974, reaching 1.2 million tons in the first 9 months of the year, nearly all in soybeans. Despite the large drop in oilseed import volume, value was about \$195 million--only slightly less than in the previous year, and about 40 percent above the value in 1970.

Spain is estimated to be crushing about 2.0 million tons of oilseeds annually, but supplies of these and other high-protein concentrates (for example, oilseed meal and fishmeal) have not been sufficient to meet domestic requirements. Imports of high-protein feeds rose slowly from \$32 million in 1970 to \$41 million in 1972. However, in 1973 they soared to \$308 million, partly because of higher prices. Also, the volume of imported vegetable oil residues rose nearly three times above the 1972 level--to nearly 800,000 tons valued at \$280 million. The larger imports of this type of feed helped offset the drop in imports of soybeans for crushing.

Livestock output, though expanding, has not kept pace with consumption. During 1970-73, red meat production rose 15 percent--from 950,000 to 1.1 million tons--and output of cows' milk rose 15 percent to 4.2 million tons. Meanwhile, demand for red meat (production plus imports) rose from 1.2 million to 1.3 million tons. Imports of meat and meat preparations rose from \$72 million in 1970 to \$161 million in 1973. A sharp increase in red meat production in 1974, to 1.4 million tons, and slower growth in demand may have resulted in a significant drop in meat imports in 1974. Demand for milk and milk products also has greatly exceeded domestic production. About \$45 million worth of dairy products a year were imported during most of the 1970's.

Reduced cotton production in most of the past several years has also meant substantially larger imports. In 1973, Spain's imports totaled nearly 100,000 tons valued at \$80 million--nearly 3 times the 1970 value. A sharp increase in domestic cotton production in 1974 is expected to have resulted in lower imports.

Substantial increases have also occurred in imports of tropical products such as coffee, tea, and spices, and fruits and vegetables, mostly dry legumes, pineapples, and sweet potatoes.

U.S. Farm Exports to Spain

The United States has been a major supplier of Spain's agricultural imports, providing more than one-fourth of the total in recent years.

Soybeans have been the leading U.S. agricultural export to Spain in recent years. Sales rose from \$107 million in 1970 to a record high of \$338 million in 1974, when they accounted for nearly one-half of our total farm exports to Spain. Purchases of this magnitude have made Spain the fourth-largest market for American soybeans, after Japan, the Netherlands, and West Germany. Nearly all of Spain's soybean imports have come from the United States. Brazil has occasionally made some inroads into the Spanish market, providing as much as 11 percent in 1972.

Feed grains are also in the forefront of our agricultural exports to Spain, although they fluctuate widely from year to year. They totaled \$279 million in 1974, were less than \$9 million in 1970, and averaged about \$90 million in the early 1960's. Greater competition from Argentine and Brazilian corn are the major factors responsible for the fluctuations in U.S. sales.

The U.S. share of the value of Spain's grain imports dropped from more than two-thirds in the early 1960's to only 8 percent in 1971, but was up again to about two-thirds in 1973.

Tallow, cotton, tobacco, and hides and skins have also been major U.S. exports to Spain in recent years. Wheat, vegetable oils and soybean meal were important in the early 1960's, but have now nearly dropped out of trade, as a result of increased production in Spain, including production from imported soybeans.

U.S. Agricultural Imports from Spain

The United States is an important and growing outlet for Spain's agricultural products. U.S. agricultural imports from Spain in 1974 were up to \$171 million, more than double the 1970 level. Olives, wine, and olive oil are the major products. In 1974, we imported \$55 million worth of Spanish olives, and in recent years our purchases have accounted for more than half of Spain's olive exports. In 1974, the United States took \$41 million worth of Spanish wine, or 2.6 times the 1970 level.

Outlook for 1975 and Beyond

Spain is facing economic problems--unemployment, trade deficits, political and labor unrest. Spanish foreign exchange reserves exceed \$6 billion. These reserves, along with a newly adopted austerity program, are expected to improve its economic situation.

The Spanish Government is encouraging continued expansion of livestock production to help meet consumer demand and reduce outlays of foreign exchange, which were more than \$228 million in 1973. Further gains in U.S. exports of grains and soybeans to Spain appear likely. Demand for feed grains, particularly corn, will continue to exceed domestic production, particularly if Spain strives for greater self-sufficiency in sugarbeets as well as in livestock products. Recent emphasis on greater production of sugarbeets, to reduce the current deficit of about a third of requirements, is resulting in diversion of irrigated area to sugarbeets rather than to corn.

Grain production in Spain in 1975 is expected to be perhaps as much as a third lower than last year, primarily because of a drop in planted area and lower yields. The drop in planted area resulted from drought conditions at seeding time and farmers'

discontent with the level of 1975/76 support prices for grains. Although feed grain consumption is expected to decline because of lower animal numbers, the lower feed grain production should boost the level of imports. In addition, wheat imports are expected to rise to as much as 300,000 tons, mainly because of a projected decline in domestic production and greater feeding because of lower quality.

Competition for the Spanish feed grain market will likely intensify, but the United States should retain a large share of Spanish corn markets in 1975.

Spain has been increasing production of sunflower and safflower as well as soybeans, but prospects for self-sufficiency in oilseeds are very dim. This is particularly true for soybeans. Maximum production of this crop by the end of the 1970's is not expected to exceed 10 percent of domestic requirements. Early in 1974, the Government announced a stepped-up program for greater plantings of soybeans, particularly in Andalusia. However, there are some factors restricting production. The amount of land suitable for cultivation of soybeans is limited by climate. Also, soybean production in Spain requires irrigation, and Spain is now using its irrigated land for other crops.

The vegetable oil situation in 1975 is expected to add further impetus to larger soybean imports. Olive oil production should improve markedly in 1975/76. Nevertheless, low carryover stocks from the much reduced 1974/75 production of 300,000 tons, along with very high prices of olive oil, should spur the demand for other types of oil.

Other bright spots in the Spanish market for U.S. farm products are tallow, hides and skins, tobacco, and possibly cotton. Tallow is needed for the expanding mixed feed industry, while hides and skins are needed to sustain Spain's exports of shoes, valued at \$300 million in 1973. Growth in the production of cotton, which rose from 51,000 tons in 1973 to 82,000 tons in 1974, is likely to slow down in 1975 as a result of lower support prices and the current recession in the textile demand. In the longer run, the outlook for cotton production is not promising in Spain. Production costs are high, and cotton will lose ground to its chief competitors for land: oilseeds and feed grains.

On the import side, the United States will probably continue to take increasing quantities of olives, wine, spices, and fruits and nuts from Spain.

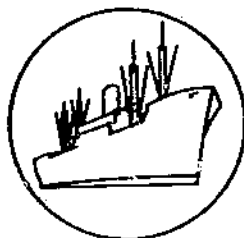

SELECTED PRICES OF INTERNATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

Prices of principal agricultural import and export commodities were lower in March 1975 than in February 1975. Except for sugar prices, all prices were also below the March 1974 level. The Dow Jones and Reuters commodity indexes, at 308 and 1,078, reflected the weakening of prices, which was due to a general slowdown in trade and expectations of good 1975 crops. During the month, however, bullish influences at times overcame the bearish influences so that end-of-month prices exceeded first-of-month prices, thus slowing down the monthly price declines that started in late 1974.

Export Commodity Prices

At times during March, U.S. export prices for wheat were strongly buoyed by commercial and P.L. 480 sales buyers, including Japan, India, and Pakistan. Some of the U.S. exports were generated when importers shifted from strike-bound Canada to U.S. markets. Moreover, late winter storms over much of the Midwest delayed grain transport by truck and rail to Gulf ports, temporarily pushing up prices. Export loadings reached near-record levels in early March, thus drawing down terminal stocks. Because of the general lack of demand for wheat in the European market, the price spread between Gulf ports and Rotterdam was a narrow \$4 a ton, about the same as it had been since January.

U.S. export corn prices continued to drop, but at a lower rate than during November-February. Like wheat prices, corn prices were stronger on March 31 than on March 1, reflecting a March 17 USDA report that farmers intended to plant less than they had reported in January. Also slowing down price declines in March were the desires of grain exporters to increase stocks and the reluctance of farmers to sell farm stocks.

Similar factors influenced temporary increases in March U.S. export soybean prices, but in general, bearish factors prevailed. Declines in soybean prices narrowed the Gulf ports-U.K. ports and Gulf ports-Rotterdam price spreads. Competition from Brazilian soybeans and slower foreign demand for soybean meal kept March soybean and soybean meal prices below February prices.

Import Commodity Prices

Despite an EC tender for world market sugar, prices of sugar plummeted in March. The EC tender, which might have had a bullish effect, wasn't of the magnitude originally anticipated. As with sugar, demand for cocoa beans was also slowing, resulting in declining prices. Import prices for cow meat, rubber, coffee, and other commodities were generally stable.

February Export and Import Unit Values

February export unit values reflected the downturn that occurred in the Dow Jones and other commodity spot price indexes. After having stayed near its November peak through January, the index of export unit values dropped 4 percent in February.

The export unit value of cotton, at 55 cents a pound, was down 11 percent from the January level. Corn and soybean oil both dropped 7 percent to \$3.67 a bushel and 39 cents a pound, respectively. Grain sorghum, soybeans, soybean meal, and rice also experienced small declines in export unit values, but the wheat export unit value, at \$5.17 a bushel, was nearly the same as in January.

On the import side, the unit value of raw cane sugar declined 20 percent to 33 cents a pound, while that of cocoa beans gained 8 percent to reach 77 cents a pound. The import unit value of coffee remained steady at 56 cents a pound.

The Relationship Between Spot Prices and Export Unit Values

Export unit values are defined as the total value of exports of a given commodity divided by the volume of the commodity exported. Thus, export unit values are the only export prices that are weighted according to the quantity of trade.

Table 30 confirms that a strong relationship exists between the export unit values for wheat, corn, milled rice, soybeans, soybean meal, and soybean oil and their respective spot price quotations. For example, the Gulf ports price for U.S. No. 2 Hard Winter wheat accounted for 97 percent of the variation in the U.S. export unit value for wheat that occurred during 1969-74, even though prices and unit values changed drastically during the last 2 years. ^{1/} For wheat, on the average, a 2-month time lag occurred before the Gulf ports price was reflected in the export unit value. In this analysis, U.S. wheat exports to the USSR were excluded from total exports since the 1972 Russian grain sale had a prolonged impact on the grain market. The export unit values of grain sold to the USSR were low compared with the export unit values of grain sold to most other countries, because the contracts for the USSR sale were made before grain prices began to rise.

When the Gulf ports prices of U.S. No. 2 Yellow corn were lagged by 1 month, they accounted for 97 percent of the variation that occurred in the export unit value for corn during 1969-74 (U.S. corn exports to the USSR were again excluded from the total export unit value). For rice, the Bangkok price for white Thai rice, 5-percent broken, provided the best predictor of the U.S. export unit value for U.S. milled rice.

For soybean products, the 1972/73 crop year was excluded from the analysis since export controls and short supplies resulted in the speculative bidding up of prices. Those prices were not adequately reflected in export unit values since hardly any

soybeans were sold at the bid-up prices. The Gulf ports price for soybeans, the c.i.f. Rotterdam price for soybean meal, and the Decatur price for soybean oil were excellent predictors of soybean, soybean meal, and soybean oil export unit values. A 2-months' lag occurred between price quotations and export unit values for commodities of the soybean complex.

Overall, the Dow Jones Commodity Spot Price Index, lagged by 1 month, predicted the export unit value index 97 percent of the time. Why do lags from the date of quotation to the date of actual exports differ among commodities? Probably because of the differences in time required to get each commodity in an exportable position and the role of future prices in the overall marketing scheme of that commodity. Wheat exported in March, for example, included wheat sold at the spot price as well as wheat that had been forward contracted months before for delivery in March.

Agricultural Export and Import Prices in Real Terms

When deflated by the U.S. wholesale price index (1967 wholesale prices served as the base), real prices of coffee and rubber declined from 1973 to 1974, while in nominal terms, import and export prices of these commodities rose (table 31). The U.S. export price for soybeans declined in both nominal and real terms, as did prices for corn, cocoa beans, and sugar. During the late 1960's, real prices of U.S. wheat, corn, and soybeans at the Gulf ports were especially low. The New York spot prices for coffee and rubber, when put in real terms, were lower in 1974 than they had been during selected years of the late 1960's.

Explanatory Note

U.S. foreign agricultural trade statistics in this report include official U.S. data based on compilations of the Bureau of the Census. Agricultural commodities consist of (1) nonmarine food products and (2) other products of agriculture which have not passed through complex processes of manufacture such as raw hides and skins, fats and oils, and wine. Such manufactured products as textiles, leather, boots and shoes, cigarettes, naval stores, forestry products, and distilled alcoholic beverages are not considered agricultural.

The trade statistics exclude shipments between the 50 States and Puerto Rico, between the 50 States and the island possessions, between Puerto Rico and the island possessions, among the island possessions, and intransit through the United States from one foreign country to another when documented as such through U.S. Customs.

EXPORTS The export statistics also exclude shipments to the U.S. armed forces and diplomatic missions abroad for their own use and supplies for vessels and planes engaged in foreign trade. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are not compiled by commodity and are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in non-agricultural and overall export totals in this report. The agricultural export statistics include shipments under P.L. 83-480 (Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act), and related laws; under P.L. 87-195 (Act for International Development); and involving Government payments to exporters. (USDA payments are excluded from the export value.) Separate statistics on Government program exports are compiled by USDA from data obtained from operating agencies.

The export value, the value at the port of exportation, is based on the selling price (or cost if not sold) and includes inland freight, insurance, and other charges to the port. The country of destination is the country of ultimate destination or where the commodities are to be consumed, further processed, or manufactured. When the shipper does not know the ultimate destination, the shipments are credited to the last country, as known to him at the time of shipment from the United States, to which the commodities are to be shipped in their present form. Except for Canada, export shipments valued at \$251-\$999 are included on the basis of sampling estimates; shipments to Canada valued at \$251-\$1,999 are sampled.

IMPORTS Imports for consumption are a combination of entries for immediate consumption and withdrawals from warehouses for consumption. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are estimated on the basis of a 1-percent sample and are not compiled by commodity. They are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall import totals in this report.

The import value, defined generally as the market value in the foreign country, excludes import duties, ocean freight, and marine insurance. The country of origin is defined as the country where the commodities were grown or processed. When the country of origin is not known, the imports are credited to the country of shipment.

Imports similar to agricultural commodities produced commercially in the United States and others that are interchangeable in use to any significant extent with such U.S. commodities are supplementary or partly competitive. All other commodities are complementary or noncompetitive.

Further explanatory material on foreign trade statistics and compilation procedures of the Bureau of the Census is contained in the publications of that agency.

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
