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
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

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

Digest

Saudi Arabia—A Flourishing Market for U.S. Farm Products (see p. 4). This article provides a look at the striking gains occurring in sales of many foods to the world's major petroleum exporter. Strong gains in U.S. exports of rice, vegetable oils, frozen poultry fruit juices, milk, and dairy products to Saudi Arabia will occur this year. Competition is keen in this market, where the value of food imports might reach \$1 billion in 1976—up from about \$567 million in 1974. U.S. agricultural exports to Saudi Arabia averaged \$29.0 million during 1968-72, but the value during 1976 will be in the \$180-\$200 million range.

* * * * *

Agricultural Exports Through May Exceed \$20 Billion (see p. 20). Farm product exports in May surged ahead of the May 1975 level. As a result, July-May export value increased slightly over 1974/75's record. Agricultural export values had been lagging the year-earlier rate since January. Volume continued to increase, however, as shipments of principal commodities approached 100 million tons.

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
Agricultural Import Value Up 4 Percent In July-May (see p. 57). Increased imports of noncompetitive agricultural commodities more than offset a value decline in sugar and vegetable oils between July-May 1974/75 and 1975/76. Coffee, cocoa, natural rubber, and banana imports showed strong growth, especially in value terms.

* * * * *

Government Program Highlights: July-March 1975/76 (see p. 70). Farm exports under Government-financed programs increased by 27 percent over the year-earlier period during the first 9 months of fiscal 1976. The increase was due to larger shipments of wheat under P.L. 480 Title I sales and soybeans under AID programs. Donation program shipments declined.

* * * * *

Selected Prices of International Significance (see p. 83). During May, international commodity prices strengthened, with soybeans and soybean meal making the largest gains. Corn, sorghum, cotton, coffee, cocoa beans, and rubber also increased in price, while rice was steady.

Saudi Arabia--A Flourishing Market for U.S. Farm Products

Food imports by Saudi Arabia are relatively small in relation to the Nation's petroleum exports. Agricultural imports increased from \$379 million in 1973 to about \$756 million in 1975, while petroleum exports increased from \$12 billion to \$36 billion. It appears that total agricultural imports in 1976 will reach \$1 billion as petroleum exports surpass \$40 billion. An economic boom, fueled by gains in petroleum revenues and Government development programs, is bolstering demand for imported food. About two-thirds of the country's food supply is imported, although development programs and generous farm subsidies have caused marked progress in the production of vegetables and cereals in selected irrigated areas.

Per capita income in Saudi Arabia now exceeds \$6,000. Government programs to spur development have resulted in full employment of skilled and semiskilled workers, and personal income is rising. Many Saudi families are buying their first refrigerator and beginning to shop in grocery stores with modern refrigeration equipment. Saudi Arabia's population of 6 million is almost equally divided between urban and rural residents. However, characteristics of food consumption for urban residents are quite different from those for rural families. In urban areas, consumption of meat, imported fruit, bread, milk, vegetables, fruit juices, and processed foods is reported at least one-third higher than in rural areas. The average urban Saudi diet in 1976 will contain about 2,600 calories in contrast to about 2,250 calories for the average rural resident. Rice, coarse grains, and dates are more important in the rural diet than in the urban diet.

Along with the construction of modern highways, a new food marketing system is developing to cover for the first time many small towns and villages. Port facilities at Jeddah now handle over half of Saudi Arabia's food imports. Al Khobar has become a busy port for imports of wheat flour, rice, and corn in the last 2 years. New ports at Yanbo and Jizan on the Red Sea and at Jubail in Eastern Province should further relieve port congestion in the next 2 years. Private importers in Jeddah import cereals, livestock, meat, and a wide variety of processed foods. Costs of unloading, storing, and distributing imported processed food for major firms in Jeddah are exacerbated by high costs of equipment, warehouses, and labor. Government purchases of rice were made in 1974, when prices were high on the world market, but private traders now dominate imports. Retail prices for most processed foods are about triple the average price paid by importers, and prices for canned foods are usually higher in inland towns because of high distribution costs.

U.S. agricultural exports to Saudi Arabia averaged about \$29.0 million annually during 1968-72 and then rose to \$65.5 million in 1973. Strong gains in shipments of wheat flour lifted the value to \$110 million in 1974, but a setback in rice sales limited total growth in U.S. food sales to this market in 1975 to only \$7 million. Still, Saudi Arabia was one of the five major export markets in 1975 for U.S. rice and wheat flour, plus some less important items.

U.S. rice exports to Saudi Arabia averaged \$610 per ton in 1974, but fell to \$462 in 1975 and to below \$440 in early 1976. Wheat flour prices declined from \$240 per ton in 1974 to \$238 in 1975. Prices for some U.S. products delivered in large volume are now lower than traders once paid for the same brands from distributors in Beirut.

The United States will provide about one-fifth of Saudi Arabia's agricultural imports this year--down from about 25 percent during the late 1960's. Food imports from Pakistan, India, the European Community, and Brazil have grown at a faster pace than those from the United States. Nevertheless, Saudi Arabia is one of the fastest growing Mideast markets for U.S. farm products.

The country is a market for many American processed foods, since over 95 percent of the products displayed in Saudi supermarkets are imported. New items are being added to the list as shipping and distribution facilities are expanded. Also, new cold storage facilities are permitting larger imports of U.S. frozen poultry, variety meats, fruit juices, and frozen vegetables and pies. Hotels are full, and the steady influx of foreign technicians, plus a million workers from Yemen, have bolstered the demand for imported food in the last several years.

Saudi Arabia is also a growing market for U.S. animal feed, corn oil, peanut butter, tomato juice, bakery products, salted peanuts, popcorn, milk, and canned fruits and vegetables. U.S. exports of fruits, nuts, vegetables and products in 1976 are likely to be four times the value of \$3.4 million recorded in 1974, and sales of bakery products might also be four times the 1974 value (table 1). Three new wheat flour mills are scheduled to open in the next 2 years. New bakeries are also opening.

Opportunities for and constraints on sales of U.S. farm commodities to Saudi Arabia vary, depending on the commodity, the rate of growth in demand, local output, distribution facilities, and competition from foreign suppliers. The United States is Saudi Arabia's leading supplier of wheat flour, rice, vegetable oils, animal feed, and some processed foods. We have not yet shared in the rising imports of coarse grains, apples, and live animals.

Competition from European and Asian suppliers of processed food is keen. Denmark and the Netherlands are scoring great gains in sales of frozen poultry, while Australia and France are boosting their sales of various meat products. The United Kingdom, Singapore, and Hong Kong are rapidly increasing sales of bakery products and candy to Saudi Arabia. Italy, Spain, and Australia are sending more canned fruits and vegetables. Recent trends in imports of major commodities indicate that Saudi Arabia has diversified sources of supply for many items.

Lebanon was an important supplier of apples, oranges, onions, potatoes, frozen poultry, eggs, and canned foods prior to 1975. Dwindling arrivals of these products from Lebanon have caused Saudi Arabia to seek other suppliers recently. France, Italy, and Australia have become larger suppliers of apples. India and Egypt delivered more onions in early 1976. U.S. exports of 4,000 tons of oranges to Saudi Arabia in late 1974 helped ease the shortage of oranges until supplies were purchased from North Africa. Distribution of U.S. processed foods from Beirut to Saudi Arabia by truck was significant prior to 1974.

Wheat and Wheat Flour

Australia recently signed an agreement to send 200,000 tons of wheat annually to Saudi Arabia over the next 5 years. This will allow Saudi Arabia to provide most of the imported wheat used by the three large flour mills now being constructed by a U.S. firm. Sales of Australian wheat to Saudi averaged 105,000 tons annually during the last 5 years. U.S. exports of wheat to Saudi Arabia reached a peak of 34,953 tons in 1973 and 12,111 tons were delivered in 1975.

About 16,000 tons of U.S. wheat have been sold to Saudi Arabia so far in 1976. Hundreds of private operators grind wheat for customers in Saudi cities and towns with their small machines. The switch to direct purchases of wheat flour has been pronounced in urban areas, but more rural families are now buying wheat for grinding by the village operations.

Abundant rainfall in March 1975 supplemented irrigation of wheat. Excellent weather and improved use of inputs caused Saudi Arabia's wheat production to reach 194,000 tons in 1975--up from 90,000 tons in 1974 and only 39,000 tons in 1972. Despite the gains, imports of wheat and wheat flour have trended upward since 1972 (table 3).

U.S. exports of wheat flour to Saudi Arabia increased from 102,559 tons in 1973 for \$14.8 million to 183,980 tons for \$43.7 million in 1975. The European Community, primarily the Netherlands and West Germany, sent about 93,000 tons of wheat flour to Saudi Arabia in 1975.

Rice

Total rice imports are expected to reach 325,000 tons in 1976--up from 240,000 tons in 1975 and only 131,000 tons in 1973. Rice production remains small--less than 4,000 tons annually. Consumption is rising rapidly in rural areas, as almost all families are receiving larger cash benefits from Government programs.

The United States, Thailand, and Pakistan supply over 95 percent of Saudi Arabia's rice imports. The United States will send about 140,000 tons of rice to Saudi Arabia in fiscal 1976, and monthly deliveries should rise in late 1976. A new mill constructed at Jeddah will polish imported U.S. brown rice. A byproduct of the polishing mill operations, rice bran will be used in an animal feed in Saudi Arabia.

Thailand sent 74,000 tons of rice to Saudi Arabia in 1974 and about the same volume in 1975. Deliveries of Thai rice picked up in early 1976. Imports of Basmati rice in 1976 are expected to approach 100,000 tons--triple the 1971-75 average.

Saudi Arabia purchased 60,000 tons of Basmati rice from Pakistan in early 1974 for \$833 per ton through a Government-to-Government arrangement, but prices for Basmati rice fell to \$400 per ton in 1975. Government purchases of rice in bulk for sale at subsidized prices to private distributors helped buffer Saudi consumers from the impact of sharp hikes in world rice prices in 1973 and 1974. Government subsidies paid 10 percent of the import cost of rice in those 2 years for all purchases exceeding \$606 per ton c.i.f. at Saudi ports. Subsidy payments dwindled in 1975 as world rice prices declined.

Coarse Grains

Thailand and the Sudan supply most of Saudi Arabia's imports of coarse grains, which rose from 101,000 tons in 1973 to a record 153,000 tons in 1975. Corn imports reached 88,000 tons in 1975, mostly because of larger arrivals from Thailand. Most of the Thai corn is used for crushing in feed mills that prepare chicken and dairy

feed. Imports of sorghum from Thailand and the Sudan now exceed 30,000 tons annually.

Pakistan has replaced Iraq as the major source of barley imports. The United States sent 7,000 tons of corn to Saudi Arabia in 1972, when deliveries from Thailand declined. Problems in shipping reduced our corn exports to Jeddah in 1973, and a marked rise in deliveries of Thai corn is hampering our sales potential in this growing market for imported corn. Local corn production remains below 20,000 tons annually.

New facilities to prepare poultry feed from imported corn will greatly increase the need for corn.

Saudi farmers harvested about 418,000 tons of coarse grains in 1975--about 60 percent above the level of the early 1960's. Most of the coarse grains are grown in small fields in southwestern Saudi Arabia, where rainfall is trapped by small dams for use in irrigation. Greater use of fertilizer and improved irrigation has helped farmers increase yields. Millet accounts for about half of the coarse grains produced and barley for about 9 to 10 percent. Sorghum accounts for most of the remainder.

Sugar and Products

Czechoslovakia, Taiwan, Brazil, and France are important suppliers of sugar imports. Pakistan became a significant new supplier in 1972. Sugar imports now exceed 100,000 tons annually, compared with only 31,300 tons in 1963. Larger Government purchases of sugar on the international market are likely in the future. New facilities to process bulk sugar into small packages for consumers are under construction.

Supermarkets in Saudi Arabia usually have some packaged sugar and various brands of honey imported from the United States. U.S. exports of honey to Saudi Arabia reached \$68,000 in fiscal 1974--double the level of a year earlier.

Livestock and Meat

Saudi Arabia's imports of live cattle, sheep, and goats from Ethiopia, Somalia, and the Sudan declined in recent years at the very time that domestic demand for meat was rising rapidly. Rising imports of sheep and cattle from Australia and meat from Europe, Australia, and Brazil during the last 3 years helped to fill the gap caused by dwindling arrivals of live animals from Ethiopia. Imports of live chickens from Lebanon have also dwindled.

Imports of frozen poultry increased from 7,000 tons in 1973 to about 19,000 tons in 1974 because of larger arrivals from the Netherlands, Denmark, and West Germany. Imports from Lebanon fell sharply in 1975, but further gains in imports from Europe pushed total imports to 20,000 tons. Total imports of frozen poultry might exceed 30,000 tons in 1976, and much of the increase will be supplied by the United States.

Exports of U.S. frozen poultry to Saudi Arabia increased from 289 tons in 1974 to 723 tons in 1975. A ninefold increase to more than 7,000 tons has been indicated for 1976.

Australia and Brazil are expected to send over 5,000 tons of beef to Saudi Arabia in 1976. Deliveries of mutton by nearby African suppliers should exceed 10,000 tons this year. Over 1.3 million live sheep and goats, plus about 50,000 cattle, will be imported from Africa (mostly Somalia and the Sudan) for slaughter in Saudi Arabia.

Horticultural Products

The value of our tomato juice exports to Saudi Arabia nearly doubled in fiscal 1975, reaching \$15 million. Some other products with an export value in fiscal 1976 at least double the fiscal 1975 level were: almonds, mixed nuts, grapefruit and orange juice, frozen berries, peanut preparations, seed beans, frozen and canned vegetables, and pickles. Plans by some North American grocery chains to operate dozens of new supermarkets in Saudi Arabia in the next several years will greatly bolster sales of U.S. fruit and vegetable products.

Vegetable Oils

Imports of corn oil, soybean oil, and cottonseed oil are rising rapidly. Total imports of vegetable oil, margarine and butter oil might reach \$60 million in 1976, including \$15 million worth of U.S. products.

Dairy Products

Shipments of dry milk by the Netherlands, Denmark, West Germany, and France tripled between 1972 and 1975. Imports of milk products might reach \$60 million in 1976--up from \$40 million in 1975.

U.S. exports of dairy products to Saudi Arabia showed spectacular gains in the first 10 months of fiscal 1976--reaching \$2 million, compared with \$316,000 in the comparable period of fiscal 1975. During the 1976 period, U.S. shipments of fresh milk to Saudi Arabia reached 539,000 gallons for \$1.7 million. During fiscal 1976, U.S. exports of cheese to Saudi Arabia exceeded \$300,000--triple the previous value. Imports of cheese from all sources reached 8,000 tons in 1975, mostly because of large deliveries from Australia and the European Community.

Conclusion

The rapid rise in Saudi Arabia's food imports presents some highly favorable opportunities for developing new markets for U.S. farm exports. This is particularly true for exports of many processed foods, frozen poultry, animal feed, and vegetable oils. Saudi Arabia is likely to remain one of the five major markets for wheat flour, rice, corn oil, fruit juices, and snack foods in the next several years.

U.S. agricultural exports to Saudi Arabia are likely to range between \$180 million and \$200 million in the coming year and surpass \$400 million before 1980. The total value of Saudi agricultural imports from all countries has increased by more than \$200 million annually since 1974. The value is likely to reach \$1 billion in 1976 and perhaps exceed \$1.3 billion in 1977. This will place the value of Saudi Arabia's agricultural imports near that of India or the People's Republic of China, two countries without adequate foreign exchange to import luxury foods.



Export Highlights

AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS THROUGH MAY EXCEED \$20 BILLION

As the current fiscal year draws to a close and final shipments abroad are being concluded, U.S. farm product exports appear headed for their previously estimated record of \$21.9 billion. ^{1/} Through May, agricultural exports totaled \$20.3 billion, only slightly more than the \$20.2 billion recorded during July-May 1974/75. In volume terms, principal export commodity shipments were well above the previous year at 98.8 million tons. From January to May, values had lagged year-earlier rates.

Agricultural exports in May amounted to \$1.85 billion, compared with just under \$1.5 billion in May 1975. This increase--along with April's \$1.93-billion spurt--combined to push the July-May value ahead of last year's.

Although prices for a number of agricultural export commodities have been lower this year, record tonnage has thus far offset price declines. The volume of principal export items through May was one-fifth greater than its year-earlier level and surpassed 1973/74's 96.2-million-ton-record.

Accounting for most of the value increase this year were gains in shipments of animal products, fruit, tree nuts, wheat, feed grains, animal feed ingredients, and tobacco. Offsetting influences were reductions for rice, cotton, fats and oils, and soybeans. Soybean export volume rose a third, but lower prices resulted in decreased dollar returns.

Wheat exports in July-May, at 28.8 million tons, were one-fifth above those of a year earlier. The previous record was 28.5 million tons in July-May 1973/74. The largest markets--India, the USSR, Japan, and Brazil--all took more, as did Egypt, the Netherlands, Poland, Algeria, Venezuela, Colombia, Indonesia, the Philippines, Nigeria, Israel, and Italy. India took nearly 4 million tons of U.S. wheat and the USSR, 3.9 million. Japan and Brazil followed with nearly 3.1 and 2.5 million tons, respectively.

Feed grain exports, primarily corn, exceeded 42 million tons, compared with 32 million tons in the year-earlier period and 40 million in July-May 1973/74. Large purchases by the USSR, Poland, and East Germany accounted for much of the increase. The USSR moved ahead of Japan as the principal destination, taking 8.2 million tons. While feed grain exports to Japan were above their year-earlier level at 7.3 million tons, they were considerably behind the 9.6 million tons shipped 2 years earlier. Shipments to West Germany of over 4 million tons included more than 1 million tons for transshipment to East Germany.

Soybean export volume topped 13 million tons in July-May, 33 percent above the year-earlier volume. Holland, Japan, Taiwan, Italy, Belgium, Denmark, the United Kingdom, and the USSR showed strong gains among leading destinations. Increased demand for soybeans in many countries reflects the improvement in economic growth, lower oilseed prices, and higher animal feeding rates.

Fresh pork exports in July-May, at 238 million pounds (\$228 million), were more than double year-earlier rates. Japan took the major part, 137 million pounds; Canada was the second largest market with 88 million pounds. Beef and veal volume was also higher, mainly because of increased shipments to Japan. Poultry meat volume totaled 243 million pounds (\$116 million), with shipments going primarily to Japan, Western Europe, Canada, Hong Kong, and the Caribbean area.

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

Import Highlights

AGRICULTURAL IMPORT VALUE UP 4 PERCENT IN JULY-MAY

U.S. imports of farm products in July-May 1975/76 amounted to nearly \$9.1 billion, 4 percent above the year-earlier value. Noncompetitive items--largely tropical products such as coffee, cocoa, natural rubber, and bananas--accounted for most of the increase.

Among the noncompetitive items, imports of green coffee advanced one-third in volume, while value jumped 61 percent because of higher prices. Dry-form crude natural rubber entries rose 13 percent in volume to 618,000 tons, and 10 percent in value, to \$355 million.

Fresh banana imports in July-May totaled 4 billion pounds and \$230 million, up 9 percent in volume and 26 percent in value from corresponding months a year earlier. Costa Rica replaced Ecuador as principal supplier of U.S. banana imports.

Cocoa bean arrivals, at 543 million pounds, were 51 percent higher than a year earlier. Value increased 22 percent to \$316 million. Brazil, the largest supplier, shipped more than twice as much as in the preceding year. Larger imports were also recorded from Ghana, the Ivory Coast, and Nigeria. Imports of cocoa butter, cocoa powder, and chocolate from most countries gained as well.

Lower sugar and coconut oil prices accounted for much of the decline in value for competitive farm product imports. While sugar import volume, at 3.8 million short tons, was only 6 percent below the year-earlier tonnage, reduced prices resulted in a 43-percent value decline to \$1.3 billion. Sources shifted to Australia, Peru, India, and South Africa from the Philippines, the Dominican Republic, Brazil, and Mexico. Coconut oil imports exceeded 1 billion pounds, or 62 percent above last year's level, but lower prices caused a 40-percent decline in value to \$162 million.

Other competitive agricultural imports meanwhile advanced, notably live cattle, meat, hides, wool, cheeses, beef, cotton, edible nuts, vegetables, beer, and wine.



Government Program Export Highlights

GOVERNMENT PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS: JULY-MARCH 1975/76

U.S. agricultural exports totaled \$16.5 billion during the first 9 months of fiscal 1976, 2 percent less than in the year-earlier period. However, the value of farm exports under Government-financed programs rose 27 percent. Gains were registered for shipments of wheat under P.L. 480 Title I long-term dollar credit and convertible local currency sales and for soybeans under AID programs. Government program exports were only 4 percent of total farm exports during July-March.

Due to a fall in wheat and soybean prices, the value of commercial wheat and soybean exports declined from year-earlier levels, while export volume increased. Conversely, as tobacco prices rose, the value of commercial tobacco exports increased slightly, while volume declined. Among other leading commercial exports, the export volume and value of feed grains and products (mainly corn and grain sorghum) increased, while the volume and value of rice, cotton, inedible tallow, and soybean oil declined.

Exports under P.L. 480, Title I long-term credit sales, increased by about one-third during July-March, and AID shipments jumped from \$10 million to \$90 million. Most of the Title I exports were wheat, shipped mainly to Pakistan, Bangladesh, Egypt, and Chile. Shipments of rice--the other major Title I commodity--declined.

Title II donations under P.L. 480 declined from \$176 million to \$122 million. Decreases were registered in all three types of donation programs--Government-to-government, World Food Program contributions, and voluntary relief agencies. Soybean oil, wheat flour, and blended food products (wheat-soya and corn-soya) were the major commodities to decline.

Approximately 2 percent of commercial exports included transactions under credit sales programs during July-March, the same proportion as in the year-earlier period. Credit sales rose two-thirds to \$416.9 million. The gain was in Commodity Credit Corporation sales of wheat, cotton, tobacco, and soybean oil.



International Price Highlights

SELECTED PRICES OF INTERNATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

During May, international commodity prices strengthened as the Dow Jones commodity spot price index jumped 5 percent to an index of 337. Of the major trade commodities, soybeans and soybean meal made the largest gains, increasing 16 and 11 percent, respectively. Corn, sorghum, cotton, coffee, cocoa beans, and rubber also increased in price during May, while rice was steady.

The price rises of soybeans and soybean products highlighted the month of May. U.S. soybeans rose \$10 a ton to \$203 a ton at the U.S. Gulf ports, while soybean meal rose \$24 a ton to \$189 a ton in Rotterdam. Higher than expected April soybean crushings, strong but European and Japanese demand for soybeans, and expressed East European and rumored Soviet interest were factors contributing to the price upswing. The major factor, however, is the smaller than anticipated 1976 U.S. soybean crop due to reduced plantings.

U.S. corn prices strengthened, in sympathy with soybeans, increasing 11 percent to \$120 a ton. U.S. wheat prices, however, were not able to follow because of the impending harvest. Wheat prices declined slightly to \$142 a ton.

Cotton prices were pushed up to \$.75 a pound because of the anticipated low U.S. cotton harvest. International rice prices, at \$246 a ton, stopped their 7-month-old downward slide.

Among import commodities, coffee prices jumped again. The New York spot price for Santos No. 4 coffee rose 18 cents a pound to \$1.42 a pound because of the tight supply situation that has been developing in the coffee industry in light of the short Brazilian coffee crop. U.S. manufacturers are currently facing a strong demand from coffee wholesalers who are worried about short-term supplies. A dock strike in Colombia, another major coffee producing country, has also contributed to the price rise.

Mid-May rains in Western Europe benefited the sugarbeet crop to be harvested during the fall. Moreover, several Southern Hemisphere countries expressed export intentions. These bearish influences were nearly balanced by speculation against the British pound, as British commodity traders purchased sugar. In May, sugar destined for the world market rose slightly to 14.58 cents a pound, while the New York spot price declined slightly to 15.25 cents a pound. Traditionally volatile cocoa beans maintained their reputation through May as cocoa bean prices rose 9 cents a pound.

to 96 cents a pound—the highest level in 18 months. Port congestion in Nigeria and rains in the Ivory Coast tightened the short-term supply. Demand was anticipated to be strong, though the major users appeared to be holding back in their buying. Considerable speculation against the British pound was expressed in cocoa, as the pound prices established record highs.

The rubber price rose 6 percent to 41 cents a pound, as demand continued to strengthen.

Explanatory Note

U.S. foreign agricultural trade statistics in this report include official U.S. data based on compilations of the Bureau of the Census. Agricultural commodities consist of (1) nonmarine food products and (2) other products of agriculture which have not passed through complex processes of manufacture such as raw hides and skins, fats and oils, and wine. Such manufactured products as textiles, leather, boots and shoes, cigarettes, naval stores, forestry products, and distilled alcoholic beverages are not considered agricultural.

The trade statistics exclude shipments between the 50 States and Puerto Rico, between the 50 States and the island possessions, between Puerto Rico and the island possessions, among the island possessions, and in transit through the United States from one foreign country to another when documented as such through U.S. Customs.

EXPORTS The export statistics also exclude shipments to the U.S. armed forces and diplomatic missions abroad for their own use and supplies for vessels and planes engaged in foreign trade. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are not compiled by commodity and are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in non-agricultural and overall export totals in this report. The agricultural export statistics include shipments under P.L. 83-480 (Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act), and related laws; under P.L. 87-195 (Act for International Development); and involving Government payments to exporters. (USDA payments are excluded from the export value.) Separate statistics on Government program exports are compiled by USDA from data obtained from operating agencies.

The export value, the value at the port of exportation, is based on the selling price (or cost if not sold) and includes inland freight, insurance, and other charges to the port. The country of destination is the country of ultimate destination or where the commodities are to be consumed, further processed, or manufactured. When the shipper does not know the ultimate destination, the shipments are credited to the last country, as known to him at the time of shipment from the United States, to which the commodities are to be shipped in their present form. Except for Canada, export shipments valued at \$251-\$999 are included on the basis of sampling estimates; shipments to Canada valued at \$251-\$1,999 are sampled.

IMPORTS Imports for consumption are a combination of entries for immediate consumption and withdrawals from warehouses for consumption. Data on shipments valued at less than \$251 are estimated on the basis of a 1-percent sample and are not compiled by commodity. They are excluded from agricultural statistics but are reflected in nonagricultural and overall import totals in this report.

The import value, defined generally as the market value in the foreign country, excludes import duties, ocean freight, and marine insurance. The country of origin is defined as the country where the commodities were grown or processed. When the country of origin is not known, the imports are credited to the country of shipment.

Imports similar to agricultural commodities produced commercially in the United States and others that are interchangeable in use to any significant extent with such U.S. commodities are supplementary or partly competitive. All other commodities are complementary or noncompetitive.

Further explanatory material on foreign trade statistics and compilation procedures of the Bureau of the Census is contained in the publications of that agency.

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
