FOREWORD

This publication reports the major discussions of the 27th national public policy conference, held September 11-15, 1977, at The Inn at Otter Crest, Otter Rock, Oregon. One hundred twenty-three representatives from 46 states, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and other interested agencies participated in the conference.

As in other years, the conference included speakers and subjects to stimulate and challenge extension workers responsible for public affairs programs to do a better job of policy education. The conference was planned by the National Public Policy Education Committee.

Specific objectives were: (1) to provide timely and useful information on public issues; (2) to explore different approaches in conducting public policy educational programs; and (3) to share ideas and experiences in policy education.

It is hoped that the increased professional competence of participants will result in improved educational programs. It is hoped, too, that this will lead ultimately to intelligent and responsible choices by citizens in solving public problems at both the local and national levels.

The purpose of this report is to extend the benefits of the conference beyond the participants. The report will be made available not only to state and county extension personnel, but also to teachers, students, and others interested in increasing understanding of public policy issues.

The report was edited by a committee consisting of: Arley Waldo (Chairman), University of Minnesota; Robert Jones, Purdue University; William Neely, Extension Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture; and Lavaughn Johnson, University of Georgia.

The Farm Foundation, following its policy of close cooperation with the state extension services, financed the instructional staff and the transportation of one individual from each state as well as publication of this report.
