FOREWORD

This publication reports the major discussions of the 31st National Public Policy Education Conference, held September 14-18, 1981 at Stone Mountain, Georgia. The 117 participants represented most states, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and other public agencies.

The Conference was planned by the National Public Policy Education Committee to stimulate and challenge extension workers responsible for public affairs programs to do a better job in policy education. This should ultimately lead to more intelligent and responsible choices by citizens aimed at solving local and national public programs.

Specific objectives were: (1) to provide timely and useful information on public issues; (2) to explore different approaches in conducting public policy educational programs; and (3) to share ideas and experiences in policy education.

The Farm Foundation, following its policy of close cooperation with the State Extension Services, financed the instructional staff and the transportation of one individual from each Extension Service, as well as publication of this report. It will be made available to state and county extension personnel, to teachers and students and others interested in increasing understanding of public policy issues.
