

- Managing adjustments in agricultural labour markets







Take-aways from "Shared Harvests"

- Agriculture should be established (or re-established) as a high policy priority in the domains of trade and employment.
- **Gradual or phased-in agricultural trade liberalization** can facilitate adjustment processes to help avoid bottlenecks in the labour market.
