This proceedings volume contains the main papers and reports presented at the Nineteenth International Conference of Agricultural Economists. His address both honoured our founding president, Leonard K. Elmhirst, and demonstrated why we, in turn, honoured Amartya Sen with the Elmhirst medal for his own extensive, high-quality accomplishments as an economist.

The Association owes a debt of gratitude to Allen Maunder of the Agricultural Economics Institute, University of Oxford, for his continuing excellent editorial work on the Proceedings of the

INTRODUCTION

There were a number of reasons for choosing 'Agriculture in a Turbulent World Economy' as the theme for the Nineteenth International Conference of Agricultural Economists. The next ten to fifteen years of adjustment needed in food producing systems will probably take place in a very turbulent economy. In the 1970s there were a number of shocks in the economy; but unsolved economic and political problems indicate that surprises may well await us in the future also. They stem from the uncertainty regarding answers to questions of the following type: what choices will national states make between protectionism and free international markets; how will countries choose between economic growth and environmental protection; what political and economic consequences will follow from east-west and north-south tensions in the world?

This volume follows closely the programme of the conference and after an initial section, containing the Elmhirst Memorial Lecture and the Presidential Address, begins with a consideration of the forces shaping the future and the interdependencies and uncertainties in the world's food production and distribution systems. Then follow sections on overproduction and malnutrition, on pressures on natural resources, and on human capital, technology and institutions. Subsequent sections deal with the structure of agriculture and people in rural societies and with markets and trade. A separate section is devoted to theoretical developments and, finally, the implications for policy and research of the preceding sections are considered by separate authors under five headings and in the 'synoptic view' of the incoming President.

The editors wish to express their thanks to the authors, openers and rapporteurs of the various papers, particularly those who turned in their contributions on time and of the correct length, and to the editorial staff without whose unstinting help this volume could not have been prepared.

The contributed papers presented at the conference, together with summaries of discussion, will appear as IAAE Occasional Papers IV.

The reports of the meetings of Discussion Groups will appear in an *IAAE Members Bulletin*. The views expressed in this book are not necessarily those of the IAAE nor those of the institutions with which the various authors are connected.
