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This issue of the Journal includes the papers selected for discussion at the 40th Session of the Annual Conference of the Society scheduled to be held under the auspices of the University of Poona and Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Pune (Maharashtra) from 30th December 1980 to 1st January, 1981. The subjects selected for discussion at the Conference are:

1. Long-Term Prospects of Agricultural Growth Viewed in the Light of Soil-Climatic, Technological and Institutional Constraints, and Costs Involved in Their Removal.
2. Special Programmes for Weaker Sections as a Strategy for Improving Income Distribution.
3. Economics of Livestock Enterprise with Special Reference to Its Employment Potential.

The issue also includes the Rapporteurs' Reports on the three subjects. A very large number of papers has been received on the second and third subjects. On the recommendation of the Rapporteurs, the President-Elect has accepted 118 papers for discussion at this Conference.
