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Consumer Legislation

Usually a bill cannot become a law until it has been approved in identical terms by both Houses of the Congress and signed by the President of the United States. In each Congressional session many bills are introduced. Some will go on from Committees, to Subcommittees, and to the President to become a law. Other bills will fail to pass either House or will be vetoed by the President. Some bills do not get out of committee, and therefore have no chance of becoming law during that Congress.

The Consumer Protection Act of 1977, HR 6805 and S 1262, failed to pass the House by a yea-nay vote (189-227), on February 8, 1978. Similar bills have been introduced in the last four Congresses.

What has happened to some of the consumer-related bills that have been introduced in the 95th Congress is indicated below—bill numbers, sponsors, dates introduced, description, and status.

Labeling

HR 42 Rosenthal 1/4/77

To amend the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act and the Fair Packaging and Lebeling Act to require the labels on food and food products to disclose all of their ingredients, their nutritional content, open dating of perishable foods, accurate weight data, storage information, their manufacturers, packers, and distributors, and their unit prices; and to provide for uniform product grading and prohibit misleading brand names.

S 1464 Thurmond 5/5/77

To amend section 403 of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic

Act by requiring that if an alcoholic beverage has more than 24 percent alcohol it must have a health warning on the bottle containing the beverage.

HR 10358 Rogers & Carter 12/15/77

HR 329 Delaney 1/4/77

To amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to ban the usage of diethylstilbestrol (DES) as a growth stimulant in any animal intended for use as food until evidence proves such drug is safe for human consumption.

HR 1349, S 297 Taylor 1/4/77

To provide for the inspection of imported dairy products, to require that imported dairy products comply with certain minimum standards of sanitation; and to require that imported dairy and meat products be labeled imported.

HR 3556 Brodhead 1/16/77

To provide that any food which contains more than .02 parts per million of polybrominated biphenyl shall be deemed to be adulterated for purposes of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

HR 4977 Rudd & Devine 3/14/77

To amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act with respect to the safety of food additives.

HR 4994 Whitehurst 3/14/77

To give the Food and Drug Administration discretion in the control of food additives.

HR 5138 Krueger 3/16/77

To amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to provide the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare with greater latitude in regulating food additives found to induce cancer in man or animal.

HR 5197 Lloyd of Tenn 3/17/77

To amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to revise the standard for regulating food additives found to induce cancer in man or animal.

HR 5156 Jones of Okla 3/16/77

To amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to require appropriate tests before a food additive may be banned as inducing cancer in man or animal and to permit marketing of such an additive with appropriate warning label.

HR 5140 Martin 3/16/77

HR 4993 Vander Jagt 3/14/77

To direct the Food and Drug Administration to withhold its announced prohibition of the use of saccharin in foods and beverges pending further study by the National Academy of Sciences. Clean Bill HR 8518 forwarded by Subcommittee to Full Committee in lieu of HR 4993. 7/25/77 S 1750 pased House in lieu of HR 8518 7/25/77

* **S 1750, HR 5156** Kennedy et al 6/23/77

To amend the Public Health Service Act and the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, as amended, to conduct studies concerning toxic and carcinogenic substances in foods, to conduct studies concerning saccharin, its impurities and toxicity and the health benefits, if any, resulting from the use of nonnutritive sweeteners including saccharin; to ban the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare from taking action with regard to saccharin for eighteen months, and to add additional provisions to section 403 of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act. as amended, concerning misbranded foods.

Food for Older Americans

HR 801, S 275 Carney 1/4/77

To establish a food program for older Americans.

HR 6668 Brademas 4/27/77

Amends the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 which amends section 707 of the Older American Act of 1965. This permits the Secretary of Agriculture to provide cash in lieu of donated foods for federally-funded nutrition programs for the elderly, in states that elect the option.

Signed by President. 7/11/77 Became Public Law No. 95-65.

Nutrition Information and Education for Children

HR 4753, S 720 Perkins 3/9/77

To authorize the Secretary of

Agriculture to carry out a program of nutrition information and education as part of food service programs for children conducted under the School Lunch and Child Nutrition Acts.

HR 9892 Erlenborn 11/2/77

A bill to establish a unified program for the education of minor dependents of military and civilian personnel overseas and on certain military bases, to establish an Office of Dependent's Education in the Department of Defense to administer such program, and for other purposes. Stipulates that the overseas schools shall be eligible for assistance under the National School Lunch Act and the Child Nutrition Act of 1966.

Aid to Farmers and Consumers

HR 4850, S 275 Sebelius 4/10/77

To provide for a free market and food protection by providing economic safeguards to American farmers when the movement of certain agricultural commodities in export markets are affected by Federal government interference.

HR 3457 Whitten 2/9/77

To protect the national security and economic well-being (including the Nation's present supplies and undeveloped sources of food and fiber) from damage due to arbitrary or unsound regulations, orders, or decisions issued by executive Departments, Agencies and Commissions.

Referred to House Committee on the Judiciary. 2/9/77 Referred to Subcommittee on Administrative Law and Governmental Relations. 2/25/77 Executive comment requested from Justice Dept.,

HR 6198 Jones of Tenn 4/6/77

To provide a voluntary self-help program designed to assist producers of agricultural products against loss of cost of production when natural or uncontrollable conditions adversely affect the production. To assure consumers that producers will be able to continue to produce food and fiber. Became part of HR 7111, 5/11/77

HR 6014 Beard of RI 4/5/77

To establish an emergency human nutrition food reserve which shall be available to help meet emergency food conditions in the United States or any foreign country which suffer a severe loss of its food supply as a result of a national disaster.

HR 6805 Brooks et al 5/2/77

To establish an agency for Consumer Protection in order to secure within the Federal Government effective protection and representation of the interests of consumers, and for other purposes.

S 1223 McGovern 4/4/77

To establish a National Commission on Food Production, Processing, Marketing and Pricing to study the food industry from the producer to the consumer. Passed Senate amended, by voice

vote. 1/20/78 Referred to House Committee on the Judiciary. 1/23/78

S 1678 Leahy By Request 6/10/77

A Bill to amend the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act, as amended.

House insisted on its amendments and asks for conference. 10/31/77 Senate disagreed to House amendments, but agreed to request for conference. 11/2/77

Research and Technology

H RES 51 Murphy of NY 1/4/77

A resolution expressing the sense of the House of Representatives concerning the need for immediate and substantial public investment in agricultural research and technology for the express purpose of incrasing food production.

Referred to House Committee on Agriculture. 1/4/77 Referred to Subcommittee on Department Investigations Oversight, and Research. 1/31/77

HR 505 Lloyd of Tenn 1/4/77

To prevent famine and establish freedom from hunger by increasing world food production through the development of landgrant type universities in agriculturally developing nations. To cooperate in agricultural research to promote efficiency in the production of food.

S 106, HR 75 Huddleston et al 1/10/77

A bill to provide for furthering the conservation, protection, and enhancement of the Nation's land, water and related resources for sustained use, and for other purposes.

Signed by President. 11/18/77 Became Public Law No. 95-192.

S 275 Talmadge et al 1/18/77

Special measures to improve food and agricultural research. Establish within the Executive Branch the Federal Food and Agricultural Research Policy Council. within establish Τo the Department of Agriculture the Federal Food and Agricultural Research Operations and Advisory Commission, The Users Advisory Board for Food and Agricultural Research, The Office of Research and Competitive Grants. To establish an Animal Health Science Research Advisory Board to recommend priorities for the conduct of animal health research programs. To establish in the U.S. Treasury a "Department of Agriculture Contingency Research Fund."

Signed by President. 9/29/77 Became Public Law No. 95-113.

Food Stamp Program

HR 81, S 275 Wylie 1/4/77

To reform the Food Stamp Act by improving provisions relating to eligibility, simplifying administration and tightening accountability.

*Became part of HR 7940. 6/23/77 HR 7940 became part of HR 7171. 6/29/77 S 275 pased in lieu of HR 7171. 7/28/77

HR 622, S 567 Robinson 1/4/77

To amend the Food Stamp Act to exclude from coverage households which have members on strike.

Referred to House Committee on Agriculture. 1/4/77 Referred to Subcommittee on Domestic Marketing Consumer Relations, and Nutrition. 1/31/77

HR 1359, S 275 Walker 1/4/77

To improve the level of nutrition of people who participate in the food stamp program.

*Became part of HR 7940. 6/23/77 HR 7940 became part of HR 7171. 6/29/77 S 275 passed in lieu of HR 7171. 7/28/77

Several new bills have been introduced in the second session of the 95th Congress, which started January 19, 1978. Farm prices have been a major concern in many of the bills introduced.

S 2392 introduced by Senator Allen, Alabama to provide emergency assistance to farmers by increasing the target prices for the 1977 and 1978 crops of upland cotton and corn was referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

HR 10414 was introduced by Representative Andrews, North

Dakota to authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to provide 100 percent of parity to farmers. The various parity bills introduced in this session of Congress have been referred to the agriculture committee in either the Senate or the House.

HR 10764 was introduced by Representative Hagedorn, Minnesota to direct the Secretary of Agriculture *not* to further limit, restrict, or prohibit the use of nitrates or nitrites as preservatives in meat products for a period of two years. Representative Smith, Iowa introduced HR 10690 to repeal the 1976 Official Standards for Grades of Carcass Beef. Both HR 10764 and HR 10690 have been referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

^{*} S 275 became Public Law No. 95-113. When two bills are listed on the same line, the first bill is the one introduced by the sponsor.
