Andrew Barkley is a professor in the Department of Agricultural Economics at Kansas State University, where he has taught since 1988. He is the recipient of numerous awards recognizing his teaching efforts, including the USDA National Award for Excellence in College and University Teaching in Food and Agricultural Sciences, the Kansas State University Presidential Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching, the AAEA Distinguished Undergraduate Teaching Award, and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education Kansas Professor of the Year.

Dr. Barkley uses a wide variety of teaching styles and approaches to learning in a diversity of courses:

- an entry-level undergraduate course, Principles of Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness;
- a distance education course in the Master's of Agribusiness program covering Agricultural Policy and International Trade;
- a senior-level course in *International Agricultural Trade*; and
- a doctoral-level course on *Research Methodology in Economics*.

Dr. Barkley's research interests are in the economic evaluation and assessment of research and teaching programs at Land Grant Universities. He has been active in the Western Agricultural Economics Association for several years.



He is a frequently requested speaker on a wide range of topics, including the global economy, agricultural policy, university teaching, higher education, professional development, and motivation.

Dr. Barkley received his B.A. from Whitman College in Walla Walla, Washington, and his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. He has taught courses in economics at the University of Chicago, Kansas State University, Quaid-I-Azam University in Islamabad, Pakistan, and the University of Arizona.

When not involved in academic pursuits, Dr. Barkley enjoys reading and traveling with his wife Mary Ellen, daughter Katie (11 years), and son Charlie (9 years).
