# Minutes of the Annual Business Meeting

## Northeastern Agricultural and Resource Economics Association

### Bar Harbor, Maine

### June 11, 2001

The Annual Business Meeting of the Northeastern Agricultural and Resource Economics Association was called to order at 4:20 pm by President Loren Tauer. Copies of minutes from the June 2000 meeting in Whispering Pines Resort, RI as printed in the October 2000 issue of *Agricultural and Resource Economics Review* were distributed. Alan Collins made two corrections: (1) that page charges (received or billed) for October 1999 and April 2000 issues of *ARER* were a total of \$16,932 and not \$22,206.90 as reported; and (2) the Journal should recover 77% and not 100% of its expenses for the past year. The corrected minutes were approved.

#### Secretary-Treasurer's Report by Alan Collins

##### Financial Accounts

The Association is in sound financial state. As of June 6, NAREA has one CD worth \$21,790.93 and \$5,864.23 in our checking account at BB&T bank in Morgantown, West Virginia. These liquid assets come to a total of \$27,655.16. Receivables, primarily from page charges, outstanding bills for the April 2001 issue of *ARER*, are \$9,120.15. There is only one outstanding page charge from previous issues of *ARER*. The Association has no liabilities. Including receivables, NAREA net worth stands at over \$36,700.

An income statement was distributed and showed a net income of +\$7,589.43 for 2000/01. This large amount is an anomaly stemming from the late billing of page charges from the April 1999 issue. Without this extra income of \$7,662.48, there is a small deficit of \$73.05 for this past year. Journal publication continues to be the main source of expenses and income. Including editorial fees, *ARER* issues cost the Association \$22,793.68 over the past year. Page charges (received or billed) for October 2000 and April 2001 issues of *ARER* are a total of \$17,222.30. Thus, the journal will recover about 75% of its expenses for the past year. This percentage is lower than last year due to an additional expense of \$1,500 for the October 2000 *ARER* compared with October 1999.

The Association's assistance for the 2000 annual meeting in Rhode Island resulted in a small net loss of \$235. The expenses of \$984 does not include a \$1,000 loan given to URI by NAREA in March of 2000, thus not reflected in the 2000/01 income statement.

##### Membership

Current membership in the association is 452. This figure is down slightly from 458 prior to last year's meeting

in Rhode Island. This total includes 301 general members, 87 libraries, 28 student members, and 36 honorary members. I anticipate that total membership will approach 500 by the end of the year (NAREA had 496 members at the end of 2000). Additional members should be joining with registration at the annual meeting.

#### Web Historian Report by John Mackenzie

The web site for the organization continues to be [www.narea.org](http://www.narea.org). Tauer reported that Mackenzie continues to post material quickly.

#### ARER Editor's Report by Harry M. Kaiser

The April 2001 issue is on track and was sent out before the end of April. This issue includes seven regular articles, and three interesting articles on the impacts of the Northeast Dairy Compact. I suspect this special issue will receive added attention by the policymakers in Washington, D.C. as they debate the merits of maintaining the Northeast Dairy Compact in the upcoming farm bill.

The outstanding article of the year for 2000 is being awarded to Ken Bailey of Penn State for the article "Evaluating the Economic Impacts of Regional Milk Pricing Authorities: The Case of Dairy Compacts."

Since January 1, 2001, I have been forwarding all new submissions to Dr. Peter Parks, who is the incoming editor. From May 1998 to December 2000, 138 manuscripts have been submitted to *ARER*. As of March 15, 2001, I have accepted 49 manuscripts (36%) and have rejected 42 (30%) manuscripts. The remaining 47 manuscripts (34%) are either in the revise-resubmit or review-not-yet-complete category. I continue to be impressed with the overall quality of manuscripts that have been submitted to the Journal. Over the 137 submitted manuscripts I have handled as editor, the average time lapse between author submission and my editorial decision was 40 days.

The October 2001 issue is almost completed, which will be my last as editor. I have tentative plans to publish 12-13 articles in the October 2001 issue. The two invited papers from this summer's meeting will be published in April 2002.

I am pleased that we are leaving the Journal in the capable hands of in-coming editor, Dr. Peter Parks. Peter and I have been working closely with each other in the transition of the Journal's editorship. It has been a pleasure working with Peter on this transition, and I am

confident that the high quality of the Journal will be maintained in his tenure as editor. In addition to Peter handling all new submissions, he will take over all active manuscripts in the review process from me in May 2001. Peter is encouraging the re-submission of some rejected articles.

As always, I want to thank the reviewers and editorial board members for their help in reviewing manuscripts. It has been an honor and pleasure serving the association as editor of *Agricultural and Resource Economics Review* these past three years.

#### **Audit Committee Report by Dale Colyer**

The audit committee, consisting of Dale Colyer, Tim Phipps and Jerry Fletcher of West Virginia University, reviewed the financial records of the Northeastern Agricultural and Resource Economics Association and found them to be an accurate representation of the Association's financial status as of June 6, 2001.

#### **Finance Committee Report by Jim Dunn**

The new editor, Peter Parks, has contracted for desktop publishing with Judy Harrison to edit and format the journal. To date, Parks has obtained only one estimate of printing costs for the journal. This estimate came in high for a camera ready copy and he has been asked to get another estimate. With the possibility of increased publication costs and the financial obligation of the new award for public service, the issue of whether to raise page charges and/or dues needs to be visited at the next fall board meeting. The *AJAE* has raised their page charges \$20 this year and the *AAEA* is considering a member dues increase this year. Steve Swallow commented that increasing page charges may inhibit submissions and that *AJAE* sometimes waives page charges. The *ARER* editor does not have authority to offer page charge waivers. Motion to approve the committee's report was accepted.

#### **Nominating Committee Report by Jim Dunn**

The nominating committee reports that everyone approached to run accepted. Steve Smith and Steve Swallow agreed to run for President. For Board of Directors, Jeremy Foltz, Todd Gabe, Janelle Larson, and Qingbin Wang were selected as candidates. The committee thanks all candidates for their willingness to serve NAREA and for their support of the association.

Steve Swallow of Rhode Island was elected as President-Elect. Jeremy Foltz of University of Connecticut and Janelle Larson of Penn State University were elected as Directors.

#### **Thesis Award Committee by Tim Dalton for Terry Hurley**

Six M.S. theses were submitted for consideration. Brian Brinch from Penn State University was awarded the outstanding Master's Thesis. Laura Jaroszewski of Cornell

University and Adetokunbo Oluwole of Penn State University received awards of merit. Department Heads are encouraged to submit a thesis from each program. Submission is a simple process. There was a discussion of whether paper copies should still be submitted to the committee given that electronic versions of M.S. theses are now more available. It was decided that the Executive Committee should make a decision as to submission guidelines at the fall Board meeting.

#### **Distinguish and Honorary Life Members Committee by Jim Leiby**

As announced at the luncheon awards ceremony, David Lee of Cornell University was awarded the NAREA Distinguished Member Award and Dale Colyer of West Virginia University was given the Honorary Life member award. No other issues were raised in this committee report.

#### **2001 Annual Meeting Program Committee**

For the local arrangements, Todd Gabe reported that over 90 people had registered and that the lobster bake begins at 6 pm.

For the Program Committee, John Halstead reported that the selected papers committee was chaired by Lyndon Goodridge with assistance provided by Pam Piller and Doug Morris. This was a good year for submissions. Initially, 97 submissions for papers and abstracts were received. Since even with an expanded number of sessions and adding a paper per session (to make five), we could not accommodate this number. After rejections and several withdrawals, we were left with 70 presented papers, two invited papers, and one organized symposium. Reviewers' assistance in the selection process was invaluable.

A potential problem presenters not attending the meetings was discussed. Halstead will contact session chairs to find out how many. Wes Musser suggested that "no show" individuals be contacted by letter with a copy sent to their department chair. *AAEA* has had a problem with "no shows."

#### **2002 Annual Meeting at Penn State by Jim Dunn**

Next year's annual meeting will be held at the Ramada Inn in Camp Hill, PA which is outside of Harrisburg. There is shuttle service from the airport and this location is close to a lot of different attractions-Gettysburg and Hershey. Accommodation costs should be in line with previous meetings. They had hoped to get something a Gettysburg, but cost and availability were problems. Dates will be June 9-11, 2002.

#### **2003 Annual Meeting**

The 2003 meetings will be held in New Hampshire. An Executive Committee vote at yesterday's Board meeting switched the order of Nova Scotia and New Hampshire. With this switch, an invitation can be sent to the Cana-

dian Agricultural Economics Society to hold joint meetings in 2004. The most likely location for the 2004 meetings is Halifax. Meeting date may be moved to end of June or into July. Availability is better in July than in June.

#### **ARER Online with AgEcon Search by Loren Tauer**

Tauer reported that he has worked to get back issues of *ARER* online with AgEcon Search out of the University of Minnesota. Three years of journals were sent to them in the fall of 2000. To date, these journals are not yet available online. Scanning takes time and being a university means that these things sometimes take a while to happen. The Board will make decision in the fall whether to continue with AgEcon Search or look for an alternative like J-Store. The copyright loss will be small from online journals (currently, NAREA receives about \$40 per year in copyright fees).

#### **Other Business**

To mitigate a "no show" problem for presenters, Steve Swallow suggested that those individuals with an accepted abstract be given a certain amount of time to pay

the registration fee if they want to stay on the program. No decision was made in regard to this suggestion.

#### **Resolutions Committee Report by Doug Morris**

The following resolution was presented and passed unanimously:

[Be it resolved that] the Northeastern Agricultural and Resource Economics Association expresses its sincere gratitude to the Department of Resource Economics and Policy at the University of Maine-Orono for arranging and supporting the 2001 annual meeting. Special appreciation is extended to Professor Todd Gabe, local arrangements chair. The aesthetically pleasing facilities contributed to a socially enjoyable and professionally stimulating meeting.

President Tauer asked about any more new business. No new business was introduced. At this time, Loren Tauer introduced the President of NAREA for 2001/02-John Halstead from the University of New Hampshire.

## GUIDELINES FOR MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSION

### ELIGIBILITY

At least one author must be a member of the NAREA.

### SUBMISSION

Four copies of the manuscript, including one original copy, should be sent to:

Submissions by electronic mail to [editor.arer@aesop.rutgers.edu](mailto:editor.arer@aesop.rutgers.edu) will also be accepted. A manuscript should be sent as an attachment using Microsoft Word or WordPerfect. Journal information, including guidelines for manuscript submission, is available at the *ARER*'s home page URL: <http://www.cals.cornell.edu/publications/arer>.

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### TEXT PREPARATION

The manuscript should be typed on 8½" × 11" standard weight white paper, and all material, including references and footnotes, should be double-spaced with margins of at least 1¼ inch. Use 12 point Times or a similar font style and size.

### STYLE

Follow the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 14th ed., University of Chicago Press.

### TABLES

Each table should be on a separate page with all material double-spaced. Titles should be short and descriptive.

### FIGURES

After a manuscript is accepted, send hard copy originals of figures ready for photographic reproduction. Each figure should be placed on a separate page, and each must have a title. Text within the figures should be in Times or a similar font.

### MATHEMATICAL NOTATION

Use *only essential* mathematical notation. Avoid using the same character for both superscripts and subscripts, using capital letters as superscripts and subscripts, and using overbars, tildes, carets, and other modifications of standard type. Use your word processor's character formatting for bold (vectors and matrices), italic (variables), superscript, and subscript styles, and use Symbol font whenever possible for typesetting mathematical notation.

### REFERENCES

List references alphabetically and unnumbered on a separate page or pages at the end of the manuscript with the heading "References." List only those actually cited. Cite references in the text by the name(s) of the author(s) and the year of the publication. If there is more than one source in a given year, then use, for example, 1981a, 1981b. A style sheet on references and citations is available from the editor or through the *ARER*'s home page.
