U. S. Farm Exports Hit Record in 1960-61; Only Latin American Purchases Fall

Exports by Continent

U.S. agricultural exports to all world areas totaled a record \$4,946 million in fiscal 1960-61, compared with \$4,527 million in 1959-60 and the previous record of \$4,724 million in 1956-57. The largest gain in 1960-61 was in exports to Asia, which advanced to \$1,511 million from \$1,220 million a year earlier. Shipments to Europe expanded 7 percent to \$2,275 million from \$2,127 million. Canadian purchases (most important in North America) were 11 percent larger and totaled \$455 million, though this total includes intransit grain and soybean shipments enroute to Western Europe. Shipments to Africa advanced 20 percent to \$221 million. Exports to Oceania were up 8 percent to \$42 million. Latin American purchases declined by 19 percent to \$442 million from the 1959-60 total of \$527 million.

Strong foreign demand for U.S. farm commodities and plentiful U.S. supplies of high quality products available at relatively low export prices have contributed to the general rise in agricultural exports in the past 5 years. However, exports to the major world areas during this period have been marked by wide fluctuations, reflecting mainly changing economic and political conditions in the principal foreign markets. An example is the rapid rise in U.S. exports in 1956-57, when the Suez crisis caused many European countries to increase sharply their purchases of U.S. farm products.

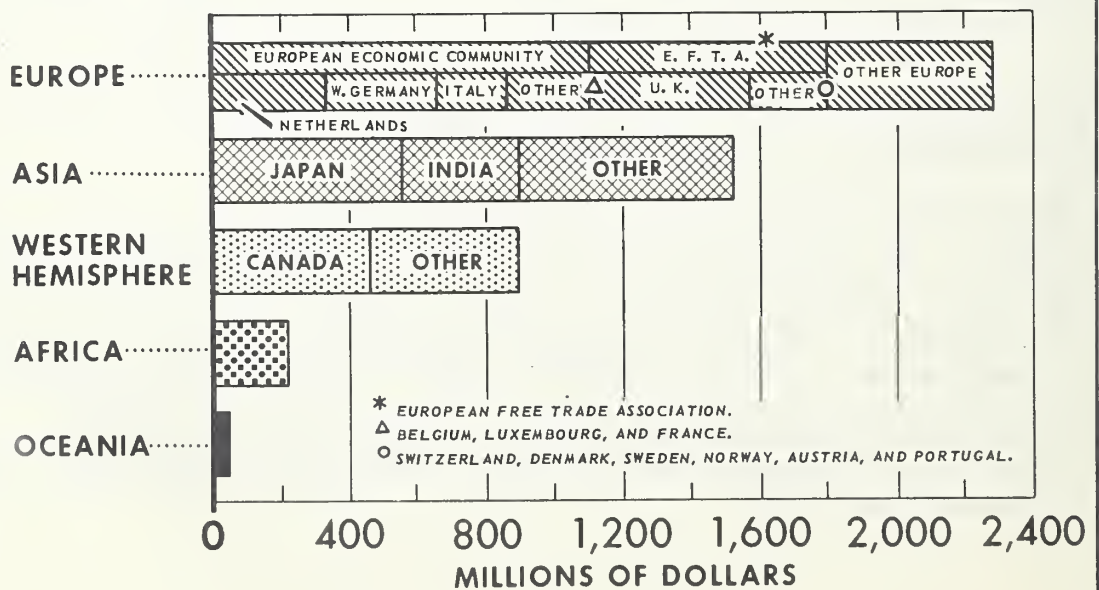
The rise in foreign demand for U.S. farm products during recent years has been due largely to the continued expansion of economic activity in the industrialized countries of Western Europe and Japan. Purchasing power as reflected in gold and dollar holdings of many U.S. trading partners stood at record levels and made possible the gradual removal of trade barriers against U.S. farm products. Institutional factors in the Free World also had a stimulating effect on the increase in exports in this period. Examples of these were the creation of the newly independent countries of Africa and Asia; large-scale U.S. economic aid programs in the developing countries; and the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

Europe and Asia Take 77% of U. S. Farm Exports



Exports to the developing countries lacking dollars were aided by Government-financed programs such as Public Law 480 and Public Law 665 (the Mutual Security Act). In the past 5 years, exports under these programs--averaging \$1,466 million--have accounted for about one-third of total U.S. agricultural exports.

Sales of abundant supplies of high-quality U.S. farm products at relatively low prices also contributed to the high level of agricultural exports. Competitive-pricing programs were inaugurated or stepped up for cotton, wheat, feed grains, rice, and several other products. The marked shrinkage in cotton exports in 1958-59 reflected a special situation when cotton was not competitively priced for export.

To further stimulate foreign demand for U.S. farm products, this country embarked upon an export promotion program including trade fairs, demonstrations, and trade missions. Potential foreign customers became familiar with a variety of specialty products such as frozen poultry, frankfurters, bakery products, and dry milk. Supermarkets were installed at trade fairs to display American farm products. Demonstration teams instructed foreign housewives in the preparation of bread, cake, and other food. Trade missions uncovered and helped solve problems that hindered U.S. exports and generally established an atmosphere of cordiality among U.S. sellers and foreign importers.

EUROPE Europe continued to be the best dollar market for U.S. farm products, although its share in the export market has been declining in the past 5 years. U.S. agricultural exports to Europe totaled \$2,275 million in fiscal 1960-61 compared with \$2,127 million in 1959-60. Over three-fourths of U.S. agricultural exports to Europe were commercial sales for dollars. Europe accounted for 53 percent of total dollar exports in 1960-61. Exports to this area were at a record level in 1956-57 when they totaled \$2,455 million, reflecting large shipments during the Suez crisis. The relative importance of Europe as a market for U.S. farm products declined to 46 percent in 1960-61 from 47 percent the year before and from 52 percent in 1956-57. This decline has resulted in part from increased shipments under Government-financed programs to developing areas in Asia and Africa.

Traditionally, Europe has accounted for over half of the export total and even as much as 80 percent during World War II. The export increase last year over 1959-60 was accounted for by larger shipments to Italy, Spain, Poland, and Yugoslavia. Except for Italy, these increases were under Government-financed programs. Exports to the United Kingdom, the Netherlands, West Germany, Belgium, and France were below the levels of the previous year. In recent years, Western Europe has been importing about 25 percent of its total food requirements and the United States has been supplying about 12 percent of such imports. Exports to the European Economic Community (European Common Market)--the Netherlands, West Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, and Luxembourg--accounted for 48 percent of U.S. exports to Europe and 22 percent of total U.S. agricultural exports in 1960-61. Agricultural exports to this region totaled \$1,101 million compared with \$1,121 million in the preceding year. The Common Market area is a densely populated and highly developed industrial complex that must import about 16 percent of its food requirements measured in terms of calories. The Common Market is an important outlet for U.S. cotton, feed grains, soybeans, wheat, tobacco, fruits and preparations, animal fats and oils, and poultry meat.

ASIA Asia's share in the export market for U.S. farm products has expanded in the past 5 years. U.S. agricultural exports to Asia accounted for 31 percent of total shipments in 1960-61, compared with 26 percent in 1956-57. This area took U.S. farm products valued at \$1,511 million in 1960-61, compared with \$1,220 million in the previous year. Exports to Asia were about equally divided between those under Government-financed programs and commercial sales for dollars. Exports to Japan showed the biggest increase last year, rising to \$553 million from \$441 million in the previous year, reflecting a 23 percent advance in industrial production. Nearly all U.S. agricultural exports to Japan were dollar sales.

The other major dollar markets in Asia were the Philippines and Hong Kong. In addition, substantial amounts of exports moved under Government-financed programs, mainly Title I of Public

Law 480, to such recipients as India, Pakistan, Korea, Taiwan, Israel, Syria, Viet-Nam, and Indonesia. These programs provided large supplies of food and fiber to meet expanded needs resulting from increased economic development and rapid growth in population.

LATIN AMERICA The share of U.S. agricultural exports to Latin America in 1960-61 declined to 9 from 12 percent in the previous year. U.S. agricultural exports to Latin America fell to \$442 million in 1960-61 from \$547 million in 1959-60. Much of the decline resulted from the drop in exports to Cuba--to \$41 million from \$125

million. Exports to Venezuela, the top Latin American market for U.S. farm products, fell to \$83 million from \$95 million. Other leading Latin American markets were Brazil, Mexico, Colombia, Chile, and Peru. Altogether, about 24 percent of agricultural exports to this area moved under Government-financed programs in 1960-61.

AFRICA U.S. agricultural exports to Africa continued to advance to record highs. In 1960-61, they totaled \$221 million, compared with \$184 million in the prior year. Most of the increase was associated with stepped-up exports under Government-financed programs. UAR-Egypt was the principal recipient of farm products under these programs. Other important outlets in Africa included Morocco, the Republic of South Africa, Tunisia, Ghana, Algeria, and Nigeria.

Exports to the 10 Leading Countries

Relatively few countries accounted for the bulk of the export trade in fiscal 1960-61. While over 125 countries are involved in the foreign agricultural trade of the United States, 10 accounted for over 60 percent of the total. These countries--Japan, the United Kingdom, Canada, India, the Netherlands, West Germany, Italy, Spain, Poland, and Belgium--each took over \$100 million worth of farm products. These 10 countries accounted for 72 percent of exports for dollars. Seven of the 10--all except Spain, Poland, and India--were commercial dollar markets.

JAPAN Advancing to first place in 1960-61, Japan took \$553 million worth of U.S. farm products, compared with \$441 million the preceding year. Japan's strong demand for U.S. farm products stemmed mainly from the more than 20 percent advance in economic activity in that

country. The deficit in its international payments in the latter part of the fiscal year caused Japan to impose monetary restrictions on imports. However, these restrictions had little effect on agricultural imports from the United States. Japan bought more U.S. cotton, feed grains, hides and skins, soybeans, and tobacco in 1960-61 than in 1959-60. Japan was the top market for U.S. cotton, soybeans, and tallow. Exports of wheat declined slightly.

UNITED KINGDOM U.S. agricultural exports to the United Kingdom, traditionally the best market for U.S. farm products, fell to second place in 1960-61. They declined to \$467 million from \$474 million the previous year. Most of the decline resulted from tightening of monetary restrictions, reflect-

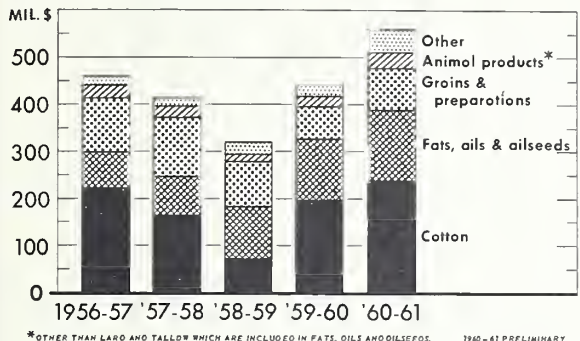

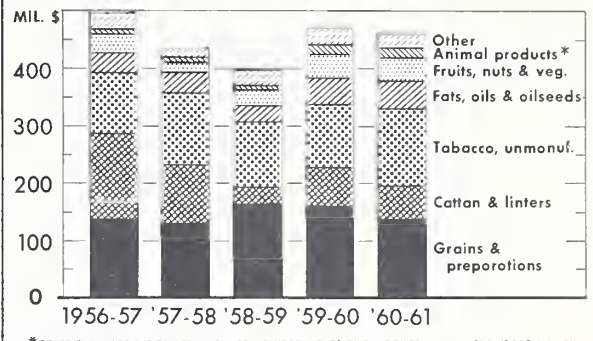
ing the substantial outflow of short-term capital from the United Kingdom. Commodities which declined included wheat and flour, feed grains, cotton, and vegetable oils. There were increases in tobacco, oilseeds, fruits and preparations, animal fats, and meats and products. The United Kingdom continued to be the best market for U.S. tobacco and lard. In 1960-61, it took \$138 million or about 36 percent of total U.S. tobacco exports. The United Kingdom also remained an important market for U.S. feed grains, cotton, wheat, vegetables and fruits. Nearly all of the exports represented dollar sales.

CANADA Agricultural exports to Canada continued their upward trend in 1960-61, advancing to \$455 million from \$410 million the previous year. However, some of the increase reflected in-transit shipments of U.S. wheat, corn, oats, barley, and soybeans destined mainly to Western Europe. These in-transit commodities, estimated at \$60 million in 1960-61 and

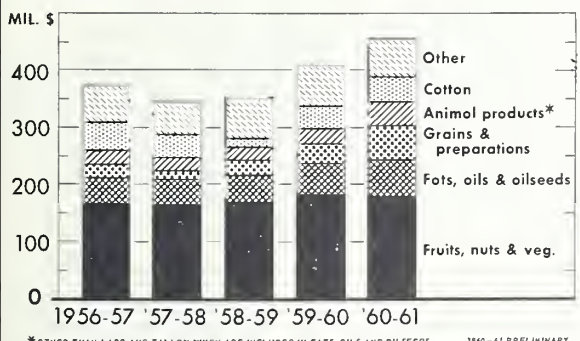
All Products Gain as U. S. Exports to Japan Reach New High



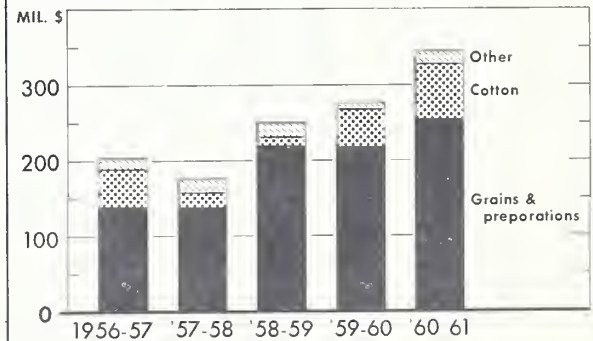
Grains and Tobacco Top U. S. Farm Exports to U. K.



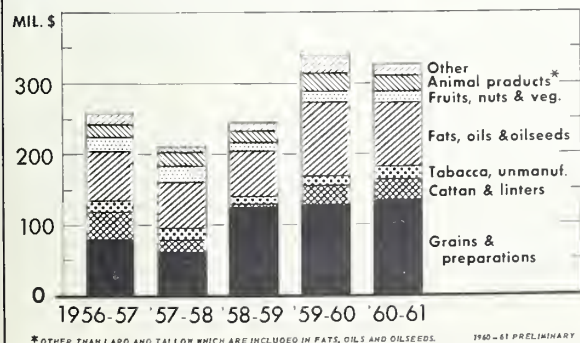
U. S. Farm Exports to Canada Increase



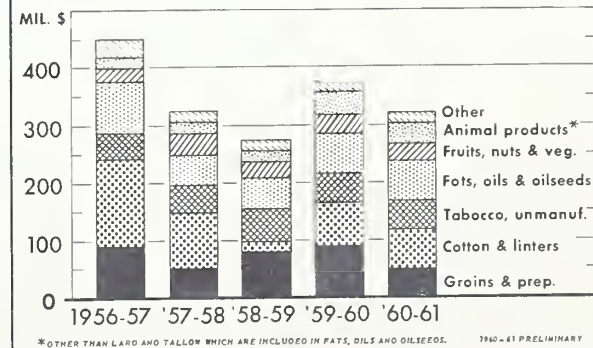
U. S. Grain and Cotton Exports to India Show Large Increase

Since the final destination was not known at the time of shipment of the commodities from the United States, Canada was recorded as the country of destination. This situation may be likened to that involving shipments to the Netherlands, where commodities may be stored and ultimately transshipped to other countries in Europe and elsewhere. Canada is the top market for U.S. fruits and vegetables, taking almost half of U.S. exports in 1960-61. In addition, Canada was an important market for U.S. cotton, soybeans, and poultry meat. Features which favor exports to Canada are the cordial and stable trade relations that have developed over the years, the relative freedom from trade restrictions, and Canada's geographic convenience as a market.

INDIA Nearly all U.S. agricultural products shipped to India in 1960-61 moved under Title I of Public Law 480. Shipments totaled \$346 million, compared with \$278 million the previous year. The gain resulted from stepped-up Title I exports of wheat and flour, rice, and cotton. These shipments met much of the increase in demand for food and fiber in that country resulting from the rapidly increasing population and the heightened activity in economic development programs. In recent years these U.S. shipments have accounted for approximately 4 percent of annual Indian food requirements.

THE NETHERLANDS Despite a slight decline, exports of U.S. farm products to the Netherlands amounted to \$324 million in 1960-61 compared with \$339 million a year earlier. There were smaller exports of vegetable oils, animal fats, and hides and skins. Tobacco showed a slight increase. The Netherlands continued to be an important market for U.S. feed grains, cotton, wheat, and animal and vegetable fats and oils. Considerable quantities of exports to the Netherlands were further processed for transshipment to other countries.

WEST GERMANY U.S. agricultural exports to West Germany, down by \$54 million in 1960-61, totaled \$320 million compared with the previous year's \$374 million. The decline reflected smaller takings of feed grains, cotton, and vegetable oils. Exports of poultry meat increased sharply to \$25 million from \$18 million. Exports of feed grains fell off as large quantities of feed wheat became available from the poor quality European harvest in 1960 and increased trade among the Common Market countries. The sharp drop in vegetable oils reflected relatively high U.S. prices. Soybeans and rice showed slight gains. U.S. exports to West Germany in recent years have been encouraged by rapid advances in industrial production, record gold and dollar holdings, and some liberalization in trade restrictions.

ITALY The rapid economic advance in Italy has been strengthening the demand for U.S. farm products to that country. U.S. agricultural exports to Italy increased to \$213 million in 1960-61 from \$155 million the previous year. Over 80 percent of U.S. agricultural exports was for dollars in 1960-61 compared with 35 percent in 1956-57 when Italy imported a large part of its agricultural products from the United States under Government-financed programs. This shift to sales for dollars was brought about by a spectacular advance in business activity in Italy. Last year's export gain of \$58 million was accounted for by wheat, followed by smaller increases in feed grains, soybeans, and hides and skins. Smaller exports were noted for cotton, tobacco, vegetable oils, protein meal, and animal fats.

SPAIN U.S. agricultural exports to Spain doubled in 1960-61 with nearly two-thirds moving under Government-financed programs. Exports of farm products increased to \$157 million, compared with \$66 million the previous year. About 64 percent moved under Government programs, mainly Title I of Public Law 480. Three commodities--wheat, feed grains, and cotton--accounted for practically all of the increase. The gain reflected mainly the poor 1960 grain crop in Spain and stepped-up textile activity. Vegetable oils gained slightly, due to increased substitution of soybean oil for Spanish olive oil.

POLAND U.S. agricultural exports to Poland, advancing for the second consecutive year, increased to \$143 million in 1960-61 from \$93 million in the previous year, with the increase about equally divided between wheat and cotton. Exports of wheat advanced to \$74 million from \$46 million; cotton to \$30 million from \$10 million--all under Government-financed programs, primarily Title I of Public Law 480.

BELGIUM U.S. agricultural exports to the customs union of Belgium-Luxembourg, down slightly in 1960-61, totaled \$131 million, compared with \$134 million the previous year. Declines in a number of commodities, mainly feed grains, protein meal, animal fats and oils, and dairy products, were nearly offset by increases in cotton and soybeans. Belgium is an important foreign outlet for U.S. feed grains, cotton, and oilseeds. Fluctuations in exports generally reflect the West European textile cycle. Exports to Belgium in 1956-57 were a record \$170 million, including cotton exports of nearly \$50 million; but exports fell to \$105 million in 1958-59, when U.S. cotton exports dropped to only \$5 million.

Exports by Commodity

In fiscal 1960-61, there were substantial increases in U.S. exports of wheat, including flour, and cotton--with smaller gains in tobacco, oilseeds, fruits and preparations, poultry meats, variety meats, hides and skins, and dairy products. Exports of rice, vegetable oils, protein meal, vegetables and preparations, animal fats, and nuts and preparations were below the previous year's levels.

WHEAT AND FLOUR The gain in wheat and flour exports reflected larger shipments under Government-financed programs to India, UAR-Egypt, Poland, Brazil, Pakistan, Turkey, and Greece. Exports increased to \$1,151 million in 1960-61 from \$875 million in 1959-60. The gain reflected stepped-up shipments under Public Law 480 foreign currency sales. India continued to be the largest recipient of wheat under these programs by taking \$210 million worth. At the same time, however, there were substantially increased dollar wheat exports to Western Europe, mainly to supplement milling supplies following the low-quality harvest of 1960. Italy, more than any other country, increased dollar purchases of U.S. wheat, which rose to \$91 million from \$17 million. Increased sales for dollars also went to the Netherlands, France, Belgium, and Switzerland. Except for Switzerland, these European countries are members of the European Economic Community.

FEED GRAINS U.S. exports of feed grains, excluding products, declined to \$531 million in 1960-61 from \$543 million in 1959-60. Western Europe continued to be the largest foreign outlet for U.S. feed grains, taking

approximately two-thirds of total U.S. exports. Western Europe imported less U.S. feed grains, reflecting a large supply of feed wheat available from the poor quality harvest in 1960. The decline of exports to Western Europe was partially offset by larger sales to Japan, India, and Israel. The United Kingdom in the latter part of 1960-61 took large quantities of grains from the USSR and France. These large purchases depressed prices of feed grains to the lowest point since prewar years.

RICE Rice exports in 1960-61 were about equal to the level of the previous year. About two-thirds were under Government-financed programs, mainly for India, Pakistan, and Indonesia. The important dollar markets were West Germany, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands, Switzerland, and the Republic of South Africa.

COTTON Exports of cotton excluding linters expanded 13 percent to \$937 million in 1960-61 from \$826 million in 1959-60. Exports in 1960-61 were encouraged by continued high consumption abroad, relatively low levels of stocks in other major producing countries, and plentiful U.S. supplies available for export at competitive prices. The principal outlets were Japan, India, Italy, West Germany, France, and the United Kingdom. About 24 percent of the increase was accounted for by shipments under Government-financed programs, primarily Title I of Public Law 480, mainly to India, Poland, and Yugoslavia. However, dollar sales also increased, especially to Japan and Italy.

TOBACCO Exports of unmanufactured tobacco totaled \$385 million in 1960-61, compared with \$342 million in the previous year. The increase was accounted for by the United Kingdom, which was the best single market. Other major importers in Western Europe were West Germany, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Belgium, and Ireland. Outside Europe, the important outlets were Japan and Australia. The increase in U.S. exports resulted from the large 1960 crop of above-average quality, relatively stable prices for U.S. leaf, and some further rise in foreign cigarette use. Tobacco use in the foreign Free World has been increasing about 3 percent annually in recent years, but this gain in consumption has been met largely by other major producers such as Rhodesia and Nyasaland, Greece, and Turkey.

VEGETABLE OILS U.S. exports of edible vegetable oils totaled \$173 million in 1960-61 against \$207 million the previous year. The principal foreign outlets were Spain, West Germany, Poland, Canada, Pakistan, UAR-Egypt, and Yugoslavia. Higher prices for U.S. oils, as well as apparently larger stocks in Europe, tended to discourage purchases somewhat this past year. In addition, oil shipments under Government-financed programs, primarily Title I of Public Law 480, were also smaller. About 46 percent of total exports moved under Government-financed programs.

OILSEEDS U.S. exports of oilseeds (primarily soybeans) continued to advance to new highs in 1960-61. Exports rose to \$379 million from \$339 million in the prior year. The principal markets were Japan, Canada, the Netherlands, West Germany, Belgium, Italy, Denmark, Israel, and Taiwan. The record level of exports was attributed mostly to the increase in foreign consumption, the lack of soybeans for export by Communist China, and the increase in use of protein meal for prepared livestock feeds. Foreign production of vegetable oils in recent years has not kept pace with the increase in consumption.

FRUITS AND PREPARATIONS Exports of fruits and preparations in 1960-61 totaled \$254 million, compared with \$249 million the previous year. Canada--the best market--accounted for 45 percent of the U.S. total. Exports of fresh oranges and apples declined while canned and dried fruits increased. The supply of export oranges was relatively small in 1960-61 because of weather damage to the Florida crop. Increased shipments of dried fruits reflected smaller crops in competing countries abroad.

VEGETABLES AND PREPARATIONS In 1960-61, exports of vegetables and preparations totaled \$126 million compared with the previous year's \$150 million. The overall decline reflected the sharp drop in exports of dried beans, mostly to Western Europe and Cuba. Western Europe needed less imports due to its improved crop, and Cuba turned to other sources. Canada was the top market.

ANIMAL PRODUCTS U.S. exports of animal fats, mainly tallow and lard, totaled \$175 million in 1960-61 compared with \$185 million the previous year. Lard and tallow exports fell, reflecting a drop in U.S. production of lard and higher prices for tallow. Most of the decline in tallow occurred in sales to the Netherlands and Italy. The United Kingdom and Japan were the top foreign outlets.

West Germany accounted for nearly half of U.S. exports of poultry meat, which in fiscal 1960-61 totaled \$57 million, compared with \$41 million the prior year. Such exports have risen substantially in recent years, advancing from \$18 million in 1956-57. There were other important markets in Europe, but Canada and Hong Kong were the important ones outside Europe. Large supplies of high-quality meat at relatively low prices encouraged exports.

U.S. exports of hides and skins totaled \$83 million in 1960-61, compared with \$69 million the previous year. Most of the sharp rise was accounted for by Japan, which increased its purchases to \$28 million from \$16 million. Other major foreign markets were Canada, the Netherlands, West Germany, Italy, Poland, and Turkey. Exports were stimulated by the large domestic supply and lower prices of heavy cattle hides, compared with 1959-60. In addition, production of cattle hides in competing countries, such as Australia and New Zealand, was lower than in the previous year.
