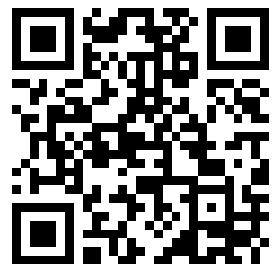

## INTRODUCTION

This bibliography has been prepared at the request of the officers of the Agricultural Economics Section of the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers for a compilation showing (1) published studies, (2) unpublished studies and, (3) current projects relating to rural economics and rural sociology for the Southern States, since 1920.

Letters were sent out to both state and private colleges and universities in the Southern States (Census grouping) and to more than one hundred associations requesting lists of research studies in these fields. Many excellent lists were received and have been incorporated in the bibliography. The cooperation of these institutions has been of great aid in the preparation of this list. Many institutions replied that no research along these lines had been undertaken and others had not been heard from up to the time of going to press.

The Experiment Station Record and the Agricultural Index were checked for published studies. The records of state projects in the Office of Experiment Stations were also examined in order to obtain the information in regard to current projects for the states which did not send in lists. In listing the current projects we have intended to include only the projects on which work has actually been started. This was, however, in many cases difficult to determine from the data at hand and some may have been listed which should have been omitted, while others may have been omitted which are well underway. In cases where we had a list from the state college or agricultural experiment station, that list was considered final, except for the projects undertaken in cooperation with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics which we knew were in progress.

The lists sent from the states show very different interpretations of the phrase "research in rural economics and sociology." This difference of interpretation accounts in part for the inconsistencies in the items included. It was thought best, however, to include practically all items submitted, even when the subject did not seem to us to belong in this field.

In our checking we have for the most part omitted studies of rural education and agricultural engineering, although it is realized that these two subjects are well within the scope of studies in agricultural economics. Some reports of experimental work which contain data on feeding costs have been included; other reports of experimental work have been omitted. These omissions may appear to be arbitrary, but it was necessary to limit our search in some way, if the work was to be completed in time to be of service at the February 1926 meeting of the association. For this same reason studies in home economics have been omitted, in spite of the fact that such research is undertaken under the Purnell act. As indicated above studies sent in by the

States have been included although some items relate to subjects omitted in our checking.

Statistical data upon which research studies may be based, and agricultural programs which are based largely on research studies have not been included in this compilation. A compilation of the agricultural programs of the various states has been made and issued by this library as Agricultural Economics Bibliography no. 5, June, 1925. Copies may be obtained upon request from the Library.

Owing to the limited time available it was impossible to examine all national studies for sections dealing with the Southern States. When, however, these came to our attention they were included. Similarly books and periodical articles dealing with the South have not been carefully searched out, as it was thought that the time required to examine such literature would be out of proportion to the possible findings of important research studies.

Many national associations such as the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Association of Real Estate Boards, and the National Industrial Conference Board have made studies for the country as a whole which may apply to conditions in the South. The State branches of these organizations may also have made local studies to which we have found no reference. The annual reports of organizations and institutions, particularly the reports of the experiment stations, may give a more detailed description of projects than it has been possible to give in this list.

Just as it was necessary to be arbitrary in defining the scope of this list, so an arbitrary definition of "Current Projects" had to be made. It was decided that a project is current until the report upon it is finished and either filed as a study not to be published, or is actually in press and soon to be available for distribution. For instance, bulletins which have been assigned a series number but are not yet available have been listed in the "published studies" and noted as "in press." Those which have been submitted but not yet approved for publication have been listed as "current projects" and noted as "report in preparation." Here again, there are doubtless inconsistencies, but decisions were made as carefully as possible from the information available.

It will be seen from the limitations we have just noted that this bibliography makes no claim to completeness. It is hoped, however, that it may be useful in indicating most of the important research studies relating to agricultural economics and sociology in the South.

The compilers wish to acknowledge with much appreciation the hearty cooperation in this piece of work received from the Office of Experiment Stations and the research workers of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics as well as from those in the States.
