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

WAR FOOD ORDER 135

"Veterans' Preference For New Farm Machinery and Equipment"

During the spring and summer of 1945, it was becoming apparent that World War II was coming to a close. The German Armies were showing signs of disintegration. Island by island the noose was being drawn tighter around the Japanese homeland. Our Armed Forces were paying a dear price for these victories, however, and consequently many veterans with varying degrees of disabilities were being returned to civilian life. Plans were also being made at that time for the ultimate demobilization of our forces and the return of veterans to peaceful pursuits.

The production of food was placed high in the priority system during the war years. The importance of adequate tools and equipment to food production was recognized and thus, although farm machinery production was somewhat restricted, a preferred position was assigned to this industry and priority assistance extended to manufacturers to insure that the farmers' minimum needs would be met.

In the decade 1920 to 1930, farm machinery purchases, including tractors, other farm machines and repair parts, ranged from \$263 million per year to a high of \$806 million, representing 2.4 percent to 5.1 percent of the farmers' annual gross income. During the period from 1931 to 1935 when farm gross income was abnormally low, fluctuating between \$6.4 billion and \$9.6 billion, machinery purchases annually ran between 1.5 percent and 3.8 percent. With more stable income in the period 1936 to 1940 and the strong trend toward mechanization, farm machinery purchases represented 4.7 percent to 5.7 percent of gross income. In 1941 farmers spent 5.8 percent of their farm income for machinery. A review of farm expenditures during these years disclosed two points: (1) that farmers were prone to replace worn equipment during periods of higher income and substantially reduce percentagewise their farm machinery purchases during low income periods; and (2) that farmers during the latter thirties were accelerating the change from the horse method of farming to the tractor and other mechanical equipment.

Imposition of farm machinery production controls from 1942 to the latter part of 1945 limited equipment purchases during this period, from a low of 2.2 percent in 1943 to a high of 4.4 percent in 1945, notwithstanding more favorable farm income.

The combination of record-breaking food goals during World War II resulting in overworked machinery, lack of labor and the farmers' increased ability to buy created tremendous pressure on the available supply of new farm machinery. Dealers reported long lists of unsatisfied orders for equipment.

Those veterans desirous of returning to farming faced a long delay in securing adequate equipment and unless some remedial action were taken would have been forced to indefinitely postpone establishing themselves on farms.

The Department of Agriculture with its county organizations extending back to the individual farm was selected as the agency best fitted to cope with this problem. Accordingly, War Food Order 135, "Veteran's Preference for New Farm Machinery and Equipment," was initiated by the Materials and Equipment Branch, Production and Marketing Administration, of the Department of Agriculture, on June 25, 1945. This order provided that county ACA committees could issue veterans' preference certificates for new farm machinery to World War II veterans who wished to establish or reestablish themselves in farming. When presented to farm machinery dealers, satisfaction of the certificates was required regardless of prior contracts and commitments; thus providing holders of certificates with priority over other purchasers.

During July 1945, only 751 certificates were issued, increasing to 4,244 the following month. With the end of hostilities and the accelerated rate of demobilization, the issuance of certificates increased monthly until a peak of 60,917 certificates was reached during February of 1946.

The production of farm machinery had increased somewhat from the inception of War Food Order 135 to February 1, 1946, but despite this increase the machinery supply situation remained extremely critical. Total dollar volume of production ranged from \$48.9 million during August 1945 to \$61.1 million in January 1946. During February 1946, unsettled labor conditions resulted in numerous shutdowns within the farm machinery industry and production declined to \$49.1 million.

Veterans' requests for assistance during this period centered mainly on eight of the approximately 300 items of farm machinery for which certificates could be issued. Farm tractors was the largest single item in demand, but only during February of 1946 did the issuance of certificates for tractors actually exceed production. The issuance of certificates during the entire program for each of the other items was substantially less than current monthly production.

In order to clarify existing procedure and provide better administrative control, War Food Order 135 was amended February 20, 1946. Principal changes were the imposition of time limits, both on the life of the certificates as well as the period during which they might be presented to dealers, and restriction of the preference to equipment received subsequent to the certificates' presentation to the dealer. More effective eligibility criteria were also established for the guidance of county ACA committees in processing applications.

During March 1946, the issuance of certificates declined and this downward trend continued until during June a total of 35,212 certificates was granted. Industrial unrest during March and April seriously retarded farm machinery production and, consequently, satisfaction of certificates. During May, however, an increase was recorded and farm machinery production surged upward until the record high of \$66.7 million was reached during August. The issuance of certificates also increased substantially during July and August to a high of 58,030 during September.

Despite the fluctuation in both production and the issuance of certificates during this period, lag time on satisfactions remained fairly reasonable. Of the items on which demand was heaviest, average lag time based on monthly production ranged from ten days to two months. Reports from the field, however, indicated a wide variation between dealers, some being able to give prompt satisfaction, while others reported a large backlog of certificates.

During October and November successive reductions in certificates issued were reported. Farm machinery production of \$70.3 million in October established a new high, exceeding the previous August record output. Although November production declined slightly, a satisfactory rate was maintained.

On December 6, 1946, a plan for the termination of WFO 135 was announced, providing for revocation of the order on February 8, 1947 and suspension of the issuance of additional certificates after December 9, 1946. This action was

in line with the Government's policy of removing controls when they had served the purpose for which they were instituted.

During the life of the order 620,860 veterans' preference certificates were issued. Items most in demand were tractors with 175,258 certificates, plows 96,392, cultivators 76,909, and harrows 67,638.

Under the provisions of WFO 135, any person who believed that the operation of the order was causing him unreasonable and exceptional hardship could appeal for relief. Appeals were received on 184 cases, 52 of which were approved and 132 denied.

Tables summarizing activity in connection with this order follow. Table 1 shows the monthly issuance of certificates by items for the United States, Table 2 the quarterly issuance of certificates for six of the more popular items by States during 1946, and Table 3 the total number of certificates issued during the program for each of the various items of equipment.
