A Quick Look at Numbers

- 24,000 Poultry Growers
- 42 Major Poultry Companies
- 7 billion broilers produced each yr.
- 14 million cubic yards of manure/ year
- **Tyson Foods #1**,

42 processing plants <u>in 17 states</u>, 65,222 employees in 35 complexes, <u>7000 contract farmers - approx.</u>

■ Gold Kist #2, 12 processing plants, 5 states

Cost & Income Numbers USDA/FRA Broiler Grower Survey 2001

Build & equip 1 poultry house=\$125,000
Annual net income (1 house) = \$4,000
Build 3 to 4 houses = \$1/2 million
45% of growers earn \$14,000 or less
76% of growers earn \$29,000 or less

Essence of Poultry Contract

From Prof. Neil Hamilton's Broiler Contract Analysis, 2001

- Growers described as "independent contractors" & liable for operation
- Ranks growers for pay (tournament)
- Company alone decides what is acceptable performance
- Company decides to continue to use the grower facilities or not
- Company decides dispute resolution methods

How Will Contracts Improve ? Most Likely Possibilities

- Competition from other/better contracts
 Courts prohibit certain contract terms
 State or federal officials set higher
 - standards for the contracts
- Companies write fair terms because it is "the right thing to do"
- Grower bargaining power forces it

Major Items for Negotiation

- Return on farmer investment
- Control over farm costs
- Limits on demands for expensive upgrades
- Length of contract (most are flock-to-flock)
- How payments will be made (now ranked)
- Dispute resolution methods & court access

How are the Growers Doing?

NCPGA, founded in 1990, weakened More than 30 leaders forced out Court cases few though important Fear still "rules the roost" Many suicides and some murders "Waiting list" for contracts - means "no clout" for bargaining

Grower Gains

- New allies consumers, enviros, churches, etc.
 Political Empowerment -
- Farm Bill wins Removed confidentiality clause, made arbitration voluntary,
- Recent Court victories for growers
- New grower groups organizing
- Better communications

Course of Action Get Protections First

- Pass Rep. Kaptur's bill
 Pass state contract protoctic
- Pass state contract protections
- Regain access to the courts
- Connect many new groups nationwide
- Improve communications w/growers
- Work with allies (churches, enviros, consumers, farm)
