

#### FOREWORD

"Agricultural technology has made possible outstanding gains in productivity of farm labor. Compared with 40 years ago, a man hour of farm labor produces 200 percent mora food grains, 100 percent more feed grains, 75 percent more fruits and tree nuts, 50 percent more truck crops and cotton, about 50 percent more milk and poultry products - in short, twice as much farm output for human use. .... Prospects are excellent in most parts of the economy for further gains in labor productivity." (U.S.D.A. Technical Bul. 1020 - Dec. 1950.)

The gains in productivity are primarily a result of:

- Larger volume of business.
- Higher rates of production.
- Proper balance of enterprises.
- Greater use of equipment.
- Better work methods.

Educational assistance to farmers along these lines has been a regular part of the Extension program of agricultural engineers, plant and animal scientists, and farm management specialists for many years. It will continue to represent an important part of our educational work having a direct bearing on future gains in the productivity of farm labor.

#### Labor Utilization

In recognition of the increasing significance of labor and equipment as a cost factor in farming, it is desirable to supplement these regular Extension activities in mechanization, science, and management with special attention to a more efficient "utilization" of the labor and equipment available to agriculture. This is particularly true during periods of a labor shortage. The experiences of the Extension Service during World War II demonstrated the possibility of substantially increasing output per worker through better utilization - without increasing volume of business, introducing new practices, shifting enterprises, or adding new machinery.

This area of educational work involves such things as:

. Work simplification.

- Job instruction for workers.
- Labor relations and management.
  - Labor saving equipment and devices.
- Farm work planning and community cooperation.
  - Housing and camp man'agement,
  - General farm labor information.
