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
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
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

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Economic Indicators of the Farm Sector: National Financial Summary, 1990. Agriculture and Rural Economy Division, Economic Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. ECIFS 10-1.

Abstract

Net farm income rose 1.5 percent in 1990 to \$50.8 billion, while net cash income increased 4.0 percent to \$61.8 billion. Both income concepts reflect cash income minus expenses. But, unlike net cash income, net farm income takes into account noncash items, such as the value of change in inventories. Farmers expanded inventories by more than \$3 billion for the second consecutive year after drawing down inventories for 3 consecutive years when they sold crop inventories at high market prices to raise net cash income. Direct Government payments fell 14.6 percent to continue a downward trend since the 1987 peak of \$16.7 billion, when it was 80 percent above the 1990 level. Production expenses rose 2.9 percent. Equity in farm assets rose again in 1990, as farm debt declined for the sixth consecutive year and the value of farm assets rose for the fourth consecutive year.

Highlights

Farmers continued to receive record high levels of net cash income. It rose \$2.4 billion in 1990, reflecting the large harvest for most crops and favorable prices for most crops and livestock. Gross cash income rose 3.4 percent to more than offset the 3.1-percent jump in cash expenses. Cash expenses increased across the board, led by large percentage increases in fuel, livestock purchases, hired labor, property taxes, and net rent to nonoperator landlords. Intermediate product expenses, which include such major expense categories as fuels, pesticides, and seed, were generally up, but feed and fertilizer expenditures were down slightly.

U.S. agriculture in 1990 was in its fifth year of recovery from the farm recession experienced in the early 1980's. In the mid-1980's, farmers restructured their operations to control costs, and commodity prices rose. Both forces helped alleviate the price-cost squeeze on farm income. Since 1986, cash expenses increased slightly more than the prices-paid index for farm inputs. The higher outlays reflect guarded optimism among producers, who increased production to take advantage of the more favorable earnings opportunities.

The record high net farm incomes for 1989 and 1990 resulted from three factors: (1) efforts by farmers to increase production, (2) excellent crop yields due to favorable weather, and (3) higher prices received for most major commodities. Farmers used a portion of the increased crop production to replenish inventories sold in prior years to take advantage of higher prices and maintain cash income.

Total farm production expenses rose 2.9 percent in 1990, led by substantial boosts in pesticides (up 5.3 percent), livestock and poultry purchased (12 percent), labor (13.0 percent), and property taxes (9.7 percent). Prices paid for inputs were generally up, but farmers purchased larger quantities to boost production in response to higher commodity prices that existed early in the year when they were in the planning phases of their operations.

Total farm assets (excluding operator households) rose nearly 2 percent to \$835 billion. Farm real estate values climbed 1.5 percent, continuing the increase started in 1987. The net worth of farm-asset owners rose for the fourth year in a row to \$698 billion. Farm debt (excluding operator households) declined to \$136 billion.

Introduction

Most farm income and balance sheet statistics in this publication are for 1945-90, and are derived from five measures of farm income and two of the farm sector balance sheets. Capital gains and return on assets and on equity are also included in the publication. The cash income from farming and the balance sheet accounts are presented by the value of gross sales classes to allow readers to evaluate the economic conditions for different size farms. Dependence on any one measure would give a misleading picture of the financial conditions of the farm sector. Because there are differing concepts and definitions of income and equity, readers are urged to choose carefully the most appropriate measures of farm income for their purposes. For help in choosing the appropriate income measure, refer to illustration 1 and the following text. The reader may wish to read the handbooks on farm income and the balance sheet for more information on these accounts.1

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) defines a farm as any establishment that sells or normally would sell at least \$1,000 of agricultural products in a calendar year. The Census of Agriculture adopted this farm definition in 1974, and USDA began using this definition in the 1975 income series. The principal operator of a farm is the individual making the largest number of day-to-day management decisions of planting, purchasing, harvesting, and marketing. When partners share equally in the decisionmaking, the oldest partner is considered the principal operator. The operator category includes owner-operators, partners, tenants, paid and unpaid managers associated with corporate or institutional farms, and contractees that raise crops or livestock for a fee.

The net income accounts, returns to operators, net farm income, net cash income, and net business income, do not represent income to a single owner/manager per farm. Rather, the net income represents the income earned by the farm operation and accrues to a group of individuals who share in the risks associated with production. These individuals are the owner-operators, partners, tenant-operators, shareholders in farming corporations, and contractors. Hired managers, although operators of farms, do not share in the net income proceeds because their salaries are treated as an expense in the hired labor account.

Concepts and Data Sources of Income Accounts

The organization and presentation of income and expenses of the farming sector is determined by the concept being measured. This publication presents statistical series for five major income concepts (see illustration 1): (1) net farm income, (2) returns to operators, (3) net cash income, (4) net cash-flow, and (5) net business income. All of these income series are based on calendar years rather than crop or fiscal years.

Net Farm Income

The oldest and most widely recognized series, net farm income, is an approximate measure of the net value of production during a calendar year. Net farm income includes all income and expenses, both cash and noncash, associated with the farm business and dwellings located on farms. Net farm income measures the economic profit from current-year production of commodities, whether or not sold from the producing establishment, and the net income generated by onfarm dwellings.

Gross farm income includes cash receipts from the sales of commodities, all other farm cash income (direct Government payments and other farm-related income earned from farm assets), noncash income (the value of home consumption and an imputed rental value for operator, hired laborer, and other farm dwellings), and the value of the change in inventory during the calendar

year. Cash receipts from sales of agricultural commodities are the major component of gross income. In calculating cash receipts, we treat placements of commodities under Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loans as sales at the time the commodity is placed under loan because the producer can decide not to reclaim the commodity and keep the loan proceeds. If the producer decides to repurchase the commodity for later resale, the payment to CCC is deducted from the commodity's value in an open market sale, and the difference is included in cash receipts in the year of redemption.

We adjust gross income to reflect changes in inventories to account for production that occurred during the year but remained unsold and unused at the end of the year and to offset sales from inventories carried over from the previous year. Conceptually, the inventory adjustment represents the difference between additions to inventories from current-year production that remain unsold and unused as of December 31 and sales from production in the prior year that reduce inventories between January 1 and harvest. Depending on which is larger, the net effect can be positive or negative. Positive changes infer net additions to beginning-year inventory, and negative changes infer net drawdowns of beginning-year inventory. In most years, the inventory account principally reflects the year-to-year differences between the frequently volatile supply of crops and the more stable demand for crops. Livestock inventories are comparatively stable within multi-year cyclical trends.

We calculate the value of the change in inventory by determining the quantity change between January 1 and December 31 and valuing it at the calendar-year weighted market price. Due to a lack of reliable information regarding farmer-owned stocks stored both on farms and off, the quantity change in inventory, particularly for crops, is computed as total production less quantities sold and used on the farm where produced. We deduct the value of commodities such as feed and seed used or consumed on the farm where produced to avoid double-counting. The value of commodities used on the farm where produced is eventually reflected in gross income in home consumption or cash receipts.

The value of the change in inventory quantities differs from the change in the value of inventory. The change in the value of inventory equals the difference between the value of inventory at the beginning and at the end of the year, and is affected by changes in both quantities and prices. The concept used in the USDA income accounts eliminates the effects of changes in the value of inventory produced in previous years and a price appropriate to an assumed disposition of the inventory.

In addition to cash expenses, we include estimates of the value of in-kind perquisites to hired labor and capital consumption (depreciation and accidental damage). The depreciation provisions measure the replacement costs of assets used during a year, based on normal rates of wear and obsolescence.

USDA's net farm income measure is the basis for the U.S. Department of Commerce's measure of net farm income to proprietors and corporations, which is a component of the National Income and Product Account (NIPA). The Department of Commerce computes its own capital consumption figures based on different procedures and service lives rather than using USDA's figures. However, both capital consumption estimates reflect the replacement value of capital items.

The Department of Commerce has decided not to incorporate a change in the treatment of wages paid to operators that USDA is implementing this year. USDA will exclude wages paid to operators on self-proprietorships, partnerships, and family corporations from hired labor expenses. (See "Improvements and Changes to the Accounts," page 7.) The Department of Commerce will continue to include all reported wages paid to operators in its farm labor expenses. The Department of Commerce also subtracts Federal fines and salaries of corporate officers and adds monetary interest received by farm corporations to the USDA net farm income estimate.

Returns to Operators

Returns to operators is the residual income generated by farm businesses after all nonfactor payments and factor payments to nonoperators are made. Factor payments are the returns earned by the factors of production, such as capital, labor, and management. Owners of the factors of production receive returns earned by the factors. Factor payments are divided between farm operators and nonoperators. Factor payments to nonoperators are expenditures made by farm operators for their use of the nonoperators' capital, labor, and management.

Returns to operators, within the farm production transactions account, is similar to net farm income, with only one difference. Net farm income measures the net income generated from the farm business and the operator's onfarm dwelling, while returns to operators measures the net income generated by the farm business. The difference between the net farm income and the returns-to-operators figures is the amount of net income attributed to the farm operator's dwelling.

Both the gross income and expenses for these accounts differ only by the income or expense for the farm

operator and other farm dwellings, although the expenses for the farm production transaction accounts are listed in a different sequence to show returns to nonoperators. Thus, returns to operators is equivalent to net farm income, excluding operator dwelling components (see illustration 2).

Net Cash Income and Net Cash-Flow

NA = not applicable.

Net cash income and net cash-flow from farming exclude all noncash income, inventory adjustments, noncash expenses (capital consumption and perquisites to hired labor), and the income and expenses associated

with operators' dwellings. Net cash income measures cash earnings that farmers receive in a calendar year from their farm businesses. Farmers use their net cash income from farming to purchase farm capital items, reduce farm debt, and meet family obligations. Farm operators have some choice over their level of net cash income from farming since they can choose whether to sell or store commodities and can defer or incur some farm expenses.

The net cash-flow account expands on the net cash income concept to account for internal and external sources and uses of funds by adding changes in the level of farm debt and farm operators' other financial assets to gross cash income and adding capital purchases to cash expenses. Because analysts in the Economic Research Service (ERS) do not have measures of farm debt that distinguish farm operators from nonoperator landlords, the net rent to nonoperator landlords is added to represent net cash income for both nonoperator landlords and farm operators. The resulting net cash-flow is unique among the farm income accounts because it measures net income to nonfarm landlords and farm operators from farm businesses rather than net income to farm operators. Net cash-flow is an indicator of the financial position of farm businesses and their ability to meet current obligations.

Net Business Income

The net business income account provides a measure of income that is conceptually similar to the net income from farming reported to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). IRS allows farmers to treat capital consumption (depreciation and accidental damage) as an expense item. The ERS net business income account is likewise computed by subtracting the sum of cash expenses and capital consumption from gross cash income or, alternatively, net cash income less capital consumption. It should be noted that taxable farm income reported on Schedule F to the IRS does not agree with ERS's measure of the farm sector's net business income because of several conceptual differences. One major difference is the treatment of depreciation. IRS allows farmers many choices regarding the parameters of the depreciation schedules, and farmers employ many variations for tax purposes. In contrast, the ERS depreciation account represents economic depreciation, which is defined as the decline in the present value of future earning capacity during the calendar year. Because economic depreciation is measured at replacement cost rather than original purchase price, the ERS depreciation estimates also indicate the amount that must be spent on capital items so that the end-of-year stock can provide the same services as the beginning-of-year stock.

Off-Farm Income

Off-farm income is measured only for principal farm operators and their family members and includes only cash income. Off-farm income is the sum of cash income from nonfarm wages and salaries, nonfarm businesses and professional income, interest and dividends, retirement and disability income, royalties, wages and salaries earned on other farms, and other cash income.

Sales Class Distributions

Financial conditions vary greatly by the size of the farm. A customary way to measure farm size is according to the value of agricultural sales. This publication contains net cash income and its components by seven sales class categories (see table 30). Considerable care must be exercised in interpreting the averages computed on a per-farm or per-operation basis by sales class. Per-farm sales class statistics should not be interpreted as being per-farmer statistics, which would be lower if the number of operators in each class could be determined and used as the divisor. Farms may have more than one operator and a farm operator may be involved in more than one farm. In the larger sales classes, a higher proportion of agricultural operations involves multiple operators who share in the risk of farming. These operators conduct business under various legal arrangements, including corporations, partnerships, multifamily farms, and other multiple-interest operations. Under some operating arrangements, defining who the "operator" is may be difficult and of questionable benefit. For example, a feedlot operator may provide custom feeding services to a livestock investor. The investor/owner of these animals bears the production risks, while the (more traditionally defined) onsite operator controls the production facilities and provides a service under contract for a predetermined, risk-free fee.

Other Data Assessments

Data for the five income accounts are based on many sources that change over time based on improvements of methodologies and more available data. Some general comments can be made regarding sources of the current data base. Cash receipt data, by commodity, State, and month, are based on production data from USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS). Inventory adjustment is also based on NASS data. Data on direct Government payments and CCC loans made and repaid come from USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The 1987 Census of Agriculture (Vol. 1, Part 51, Nov. 1989), the 1987 Census of Agriculture: Agricultural Economics and

Land Ownership Survey, 1988 (AELOS) (Vol. 3, Part 2, July 1990), and USDA's Farm Costs and Returns Survey (FCRS) provide data used to compute the other gross income and production expense figures. Data from private industry and Government agencies are also used to estimate production expenses. The distributions of income and expense items, by value of agricultural sales classes, are based on the FCRS, and the 1987 Census of Agriculture: Government Payments and Market Value of Agricultural Products Sold (Vol. 2, Part 5, Sept. 1990).

The Census of Agriculture is a reliable source of data but is available only every 5 years. Therefore, a benchmark-mover system is employed in accounts dependent on Census of Agriculture data. Under this system, we incorporate census data as they become available and move the census data according to the most appropriate annual data between census benchmarks. FCRS data are usually the most appropriate and, often, the only annual data available.

Overview of the 1990 Agricultural Sector

Net farm income rose 1.5 percent and net cash income was up 4.0 percent as 1990 was generally a good year for farmers. For the second consecutive year, there was no major drought, crop production was up slightly, and prices for most commodities were at a relatively high level during the first half of the year.

Cash receipts were up about \$9.1 billion, with both crops and livestock having substantial increases. Corn accounted for most of the increase in crop receipts as farmers boosted sales after rebuilding inventories in 1989 following the drought-induced drawdown of 1988. Cattle and hogs each contributed more than \$2 billion to the rise in livestock receipts as 1990 was a year of higher prices for both. Hog prices topped \$60 per hundredweight (cwt) for part of the year. U.S. cattle prices reached levels not attained in recent years, with beef cattle prices topping \$70 per cwt for every month in 1990. Dairy receipts contributed \$800 million to the jump in cash receipts due to higher milk production.

The farm sector balance sheet continued to improve in 1990 as farm equity increased 2 percent. The value of farm assets (excluding operator household) rose for the fourth consecutive year with a nearly 2-percent increase, and outstanding debt (excluding operator household) decreased another \$1 billion. A further softening of financial stress among many farmers with debt was mirrored in improved income-to-wealth ratios and other wealth measurements that reflect financial conditions in the sector (see table 12).

Income Accounts

Following are the highlights of the trends in the six major accounts.

Net Farm Income

Net farm income in 1990 was \$50.8 billion, up from \$50.1 billion in 1989. Gross farm income rose 2.5 percent (\$4.8 billion), and production expenses rose 2.9 percent (\$4.1 billion). Cash receipts from farm marketings climbed \$9.1 billion, with a \$3.6-billion increase in crop receipts and a \$5.5-billion increase in livestock receipts. Crop producers maintained production at the high levels of 1989, used a portion (\$3.1 billion) to replenish inventories drawn down in the mid-1980's, and received \$1.6 billion less in direct Government payments. The quantities and prices for livestock and livestock products were mostly unchanged or higher, with hog and cattle producers enjoying market prices that were among the highest received in recent years.

Returns to Operators

The returns-to-operators category, which differs from net farm income by excluding all income and expenses related to operator dwellings, rose 2.2 percent to \$49.4 billion in 1990. Gross receipts of farms, which differ from gross farm income by excluding the imputed rental value of operators' dwellings, climbed 2.6 percent (\$4.8 billion) to \$189.9 billion. Nonfactor payments rose 2.3 percent (\$2.4 billion), while factor payments increased 2.9 percent (\$2.4 billion).

Higher nonfactor payments resulted from increases in intermediate product expenses, particularly livestock and poultry purchased, and pesticides. Among factor payments, labor expenses accounted for most of the increase, with net rent to nonoperator landlords adding a little. Payments for interest were relatively stable. As a result, returns received by operators for their factors of production (management, labor, and equity capital) rose a respectable 2.7 percent. The modest (3.4 percent) increase in net rent received by nonoperator landlords was related to the improvement of farmland values.

Net Cash Income and Net Cash-Flow

Net cash income achieved another record high in 1990 after setting records in each of the last 5 years. Net cash income rose 4.0 percent from the previous year to \$61.8 billion. Gross cash income was up 3.4 percent, which was a little higher than the 3.1-percent rise in cash expenses. Receipts rose as farmers, with the benefit of improved weather conditions, maintained

crop production at 1989's high level. In particular, receipts from the sale of corn, hogs, and cattle were each up by more than \$2 billion.

Net cash income represents earnings that are available for principal repayment, capital purchases, and family living expenses. When droughts do not occur in 2 consecutive years, farmers can adjust inventories to manage their cash income despite the variability in production reflected in net farm income. The farm sector's liquidity and debt-servicing ability have improved since the mid-1980's because of increased net cash income from farming and lower levels of farm debt.

Net cash-flow rose 7.3 percent in 1990 to \$56 billion, the third consecutive high for this account. The record highs are due to a combination of rising net cash income and the slowdown in the decline in farm loans since December 1987. Net cash-flow is the sum of net cash income, changes in farm loans outstanding, changes in holdings of other financial assets, and the net rent to nonoperator landlords, minus capital expenditures. The value of farm loans continued to decline through 1990, but at a slower rate than the declines from 1987-89. Continuation of this trend may lead to an increase in total farm loans in 1991 for the first time since 1984. Capital expenditures rose 5.9 percent in 1990, as farmers continued to show a cautious interest in purchasing equipment and facilities in 1990.

Net Business Income

Net business income is a measure of farmers' earnings based on accounting methods that correspond to those used for tax purposes. Under the IRS's cash accounting method, which is used by most farmers, income equals payments received less the sum of payments made and capital consumption. Net business income has recently tracked net cash income closely, but at a lower level, reflecting the additional noncash deduction for capital consumption, which changed little until recently. Both net business income and net cash income rose by \$2.4 billion in 1990, as capital consumption remained virtually unchanged from the prior year. The rise in net business income represented a 5.5-percent increase, slightly more than the 4.0-percent increase in net cash income.

Off-Farm Income of Principal Farm Operators

Off-farm cash income of principal farm operators and their household members in 1990 was \$67 billion. This income buffers to some extent the financial risks of farming by contributing to the improved liquidity and debt-service capability of the farm sector.

Balance Sheet Accounts

The balance sheet accounts are used to assess wealth in the farm sector. They include assets, debt, and equity, where equity equals assets minus debt. Assets are valued at market prices on December 31 of each year, or as close to December 31 as possible. Nominal and real capital gains on farm assets and debt are estimated as well as the total rate of return on both assets and equity. The total rates of return include the rate of return from current income plus the rate of return from real capital gains. These financial measures provide useful indicators of farm sector profitability.

The balance sheet accounts contain one set of statistics that includes farm operator households' assets and debt, and another set that excludes them. Both sets include operators' and landlords' shares of the assets and debt for the farming operation. The balance sheet account excluding operator households subtracts the value of the operator dwelling, the household portion of automobiles and trucks, household equipment, financial assets, and related debt on these assets from the balance sheet account including operator households. Debt is classified as either real estate or nonreal estate, depending upon how the loan is secured. If the loan is secured by farm real estate, then it is classified as real estate farm debt, regardless of how the loan is used.

Assets, Debt, and Equity

Farm assets (excluding operator households) as of December 31, 1990, rose 1.8 percent from a year earlier to \$835 billion. Real estate assets rose 1.5 percent, and nonreal estate assets rose 2.5 percent, primarily due to increases in the values of livestock and poultry, and machinery. Total farm debt continued its decline since 1984, from \$137 billion a year earlier to \$136 billion. Real estate debt fell to \$73 billion in 1990 from \$75 billion. Nonreal estate debt increased over \$1 billion to \$63 billion. Reflecting the increase in farm asset values and the decrease in debt, equity in farm assets (excluding operator households) rose 1.8 percent to \$698 billion.

Debt-to-Asset Ratio

The debt-to-asset ratio provides insight into the collateral security of loans, the relative indebtedness of farm businesses, and the risk borne by lenders. The farm sector's debt-to-asset ratio (excluding operator households) declined during 1990 from 16.7 to 16.3.

Rates of Return

The total real rate of return on assets (excluding operator households) was 2.5 percent in 1990. The rate

of return on assets from current income was 5.2 percent, and the rate of return from real capital gains was -2.6 percent.

The total real rate of return on equity in 1990 was 2.0 percent. The rate of return on equity from current income was 4.2 percent, and the rate of return from real capital gains was -2.2 percent.

Improvements and Changes to the Accounts

Several improvements have been made to the sales class tables in direct response to suggestions from users. The release of the 1987 Census of Agriculture: Government Payments and Market Value of Agricultural Products Sold provided additional information, making it possible to implement these changes.

For one, direct Government payments have been added to cash receipts from farm marketings to determine the establishment's size and thus the appropriate sales class for its inclusion. This addition is important for farms where resources were withheld from production in exchange for receiving payments. Classifying such farms solely on sales receipts underestimates the size of the farm and results in its assignment to a smaller sales class. It also results in changes over time in the population of farms within sales classes as farm programs change and as incentives to participate in programs vary.

Second, the sales classes have been redefined at the upper and lower ends. A new sales class consisting of farms with sales of \$1 million or more has been introduced to provide additional information about the largest producers. At the lower end, the two smaller categories now include farms with sales less than \$20,000 and those between \$20,000 and \$39,999. Sales class divisions below \$20,000 have declined in usefulness, as \$40,000 has gained acceptance as a minimal size for commercial farms and is increasingly used as a working definition for meaningful policy analysis.

Third, additional sales-class tables have been included to provide a single source for time series data on the key components and the total for net cash income.

Farm Production Expenses

Beginning with the 1982 figures, we have excluded from hired labor expenses wages paid to farm owner/operators by their own establishments under two forms of farm organization: partnerships and family corporations. Operations may choose one of these

forms of organization and pay their operators wages for several reasons, for example, to facilitate the flow of funds, to minimize income taxes, to treat the cost of benefit programs as business expenses, or to reflect the operator's extra work or responsibility. Paying the operator wages is an alternate way of distributing profits from farming. Therefore, these wages normally represent the true income return to operators' labor, management, and equity capital. Furthermore, excluding wages paid to operators of partnerships and family corporations is consistent with the Recommendations of the Farm Financial Standards Task Force: Financial Guidelines for Agricultural Producers (1991), which are rapidly becoming the adopted standards for farm financial accounting.

Under self-proprietorships, a third form of organization, operators may not pay themselves wages. Instead compensation is included in the residual profit. However, operators of self-proprietorships have reported paying themselves wages on the FCRS and, therefore, have probably included them in *Census of Agriculture* responses. We have removed the amount that these operators have reported paying themselves.

Under the remaining two forms of farm organization, nonfamily corporations and farm cooperatives, the operator is usually a hired manager who has little or no ownership interest in the establishment. The level of compensation would be expected to be set by an independent board of directors to reflect prevailing labor market forces. Thus, wages paid to the operators/managers are clearly business expenses.

In U.S. agriculture, it is common to have within a single operation: (1) two or more generations of family members as owner/operators or (2) two or more siblings. The former situation is typical of the intergenerational transition phase and the second is the subsequent phase. Both situations are necessary to realize economies of scale and be cost competitive. Many of these farm operators are technically self-proprietors because they file separate tax returns. However, these farm operations act as if they were partnerships because of the close cooperation among relatives. Sometimes, they go the additional step of incorporating but continue to operate as described above.

Under most partnerships and family corporations, the wages paid to farm operators are not likely to represent the true value of their labor due to the absence of market forces, outside stockholders, and regulatory authority. A more realistic approach is to treat wages paid to these operators as returns to uncompensated labor. Obviously, all farm partnerships and family corporations are not homogeneous. On a small number

of these operations, the operators are hired managers, and their wages should be treated as labor expenses. Currently, we have insufficient data to make meaningful distinctions between these operations.

We have compiled statistics on wages paid to operators for each of the five organizational types: partnerships, family corporations, self-proprietors, nonfamily corporations, and cooperatives. Should users prefer a different definition of farm income requiring adjustments for any of these five items, we will provide the numbers upon request without charge.

Because we incorporate the value of all agricultural production in our income estimates, they include the value of commodities owned by nonoperators. The service fees that these nonoperator-owners pay to operators to produce these commodities are intrasector transfers. The service fees are an expense to the nonoperator-owner and income to the operator who receives the fee for raising the commodity. The income from service fees for 1982 and after are contained in farm-related income. To reflect the intrasectoral nature of these transactions, we have added fees received by operators to miscellaneous expenses for the same years. We have chosen to offset the fees because they are significant income sources for some farm operators and the information may be valuable to some analysts.

Most of the revisions in this publication resulted from further incorporation of 1987 Census of Agriculture data and the incorporation of 1988 AELOS data for the first time. Using 1987 census data, ERS analysts have added new benchmarks for 1987 and interpolated the benchmark ratios for 1983-86 between the 1982 and 1987 census benchmarks. State distributions of census-benchmarked expenses are normally used without adjustment until new census data are released. When analysts obtain new census data, they substitute the new census distribution for the census year and after and interpolate State/U.S. ratios between the census years.

The AELOS provides the first census information on landlord income and expenses since the 1978 Census of Agriculture: 1979 Farm Finance Survey (FFS) (Vol. 5, Part 6, July 1982). These surveys are the only sources for national landlord interest and capital consumption figures and for most of the State distributions of landlord expenses. Analysts have incorporated AELOS and FFS data employing the benchmark/mover procedure used with 1987 Census data. The updating process caused substantial revisions in the figures for net rent to nonoperator landlords.

Analysts have also revised State distributions of property taxes by interpolating State/U.S. ratios for real estate taxes between the 1987 Census/AELOS and the

FFS. Estimates for 1989 and after are based on the 1987 Census/AELOS State distribution moved by changes in State figures from the Real Estate Taxes Survey conducted by the Land Branch of ERS's Resources and Technology Division.

ERS analysts have again expanded 1990 FCRS data to represent expenses for all farms, since small-size farms are underrepresented in the FCRS. This adjustment takes into account the difference in the number of farms in the FCRS and NASS June Agricultural Survey.

Off-Farm Income

The off-farm income figure for 1990 is significantly above earlier levels because of improved wording of the off-farm income question in the 1990 FCRS. The sharp jump in the off-farm income does not represent a large increase in the off-farm income of principal farm operators and their families. Off-farm income should not be added to any of the farm income accounts because the incomes are measured for different populations.

Value of Agricultural Sales Class Estimation Note

The categorization of farms into sales classes is based on the gross market value of all agricultural products that are sold, placed under the CCC loan program, or otherwise removed from the farm plus the value of direct Government payments for 1987-90. Prior to 1987, the value of direct Government payments is not included in the definition of a sales class category.

The estimates by sales class are based on information from many sources. The majority of data used to compute the sales class accounts are derived from the *Census of Agriculture* and the annual Farm Costs and Returns Survey (FCRS).

More specifically, annual farm income and expense items are generally distributed to sales classes based on per-farm benchmarks from the last census. Because our data are based on the census, our sales class definitions follow census's definitions. Census data are collected every 4 or 5 years, and there is a considerable lag in their availability. Estimates for years following 1987 are based on the 1987 census benchmarks by sales class. Therefore, these estimates may be subject to substantial revisions when data from the next census become available. The distribution of Government payments to sales classes for 1983-90 are based on FCRS survey data.
